Production In Fir Mills Soaring

PORTLAND, June 22. — During May, Douglas fir mills continued their climb toward the greatest production year since 1929. H. V. Simpson, executive vice-president of the West Coast Lumbermen's association, announced today.

Douglas fir lumber production for the first 22 weeks of 1950 totaled 4,081,052,000 board feet—an increase of more than \$1,000,000 feet above production for a similar period in 1949, Simpson said.

"Although production still does not match the recent record high set in 1948, there is an excellent possibility that the latter will be surpassed before the end of the year," Simpson predicted. "The log supply is improving, new small mills are coming into production, and most longer established mills are working at full capacity."

"The Douglas fir industry is making every effort to provide an adequate supply of lumber to meet this year's unprecedented demand for housing and construction lumber."

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Chicken In Casserole Easy

Here's chicken again for Sunday. But it's one of the best meat buys today, is easy to cook and most people enjoy it.

Casserole of Chicken With Vegetables

Stewing chicken, 3 to 4 pounds ready to cook (4 to 5 pounds dressed weight), salt, pepper, flour, 2 tablespoons fat, 2 cups hot water, 2 medium-sized carrots, sliced 1 cups chopped celery, 1 small onion, chopped, 1 small green pepper, chopped.

Cut chicken in serving pieces. Season with salt and pepper, sprinkle with flour. Heat fat in a heavy pan and brown the chicken in it. Remove chicken to a casserole, or leave in the pan if it is suitable for oven use. Add hot water and teaspoon salt. Cover closely.

Cook in the oven at 325 degrees F. (slow) until almost tender—about 2½ hours. Add water as needed during cooking to keep liquid at original level. Add vegetables and cook 30 minutes longer. Mix 2 tablespoons flour with a little cold water. Add several spoonfuls of hot liquid into liquid in casserole. Stir mixture into liquid in casserole. Cook 10 to 15 minutes longer.

That recipe is from "Family Fare" published by the United States Department of Agriculture.

Creamed Chicken (4 servings)

Two tablespoons table fat, ½ cup chopped celery, 1½ teaspoons chopped onion, 1 tablespoon 1½ cups chicken broth, ½ cup milk or cream, 1½ cups diced chopped green pepper, ¼ cup flour, cooked chicken, salt to taste.

Heat the fat and cook the celery, onion and green pepper in it until tender. Blend the flour into the fat and vegetable mixture. Stir in the chicken broth and milk or cream and cook to a smooth sauce, stirring constantly. Add chicken to sauce and season with salt. Heat the mixture thoroughly and serve on rice, toast, or biscuits.

Northwest Forests Have Fewer Visitors In 1949
