

ENUMERATION AGAIN

New Roseburg Directory Being Compiled May Be Completed In September

Enumerators are hard at work again in Roseburg and the immediate vicinity—but they are not census takers.

Six enumerators are now engaged in gathering information for a new directory for the city of Roseburg, to be published by T. W. Salisbury and company of Portland.

The workers are asking such questions as name, address, occupation and the number of children under 18. Salisbury, in Roseburg to supervise the project, figures it will take about a month to gather this information, another month to check it for accuracy and a third month to print the pages and assemble them for binding. Salisbury said he hoped to have the new directory ready for distribution in September.

This is the company's third experience in providing Roseburg with a city directory, a fact which Salisbury says will help the workers by giving the workers a sounder footing on which to start. Another point he values is the policy of using as many local persons as possible in gathering the information—on the theory that Roseburg residents know the city better than do strangers.

Past Experience Counts

Working from a street guide, enumerators cover various zones which include the city and the immediate vicinity. Workers also compile information of persons served by all rural routes out of Roseburg. Some of the enumerators worked in the same capacity for the census bureau and will knock on the same doors and talk to the same persons they did a few months ago. Other workers are on file with the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce.

Approval Sought For Plan To Arm Western Europe

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Administration forces opened a drive today for senate approval of a program which would place America's most modern weapons—except atomic bombs—along the defense frontiers of western Europe.

Senator Connally of Texas had the job of guiding the \$1,222,500,000 foreign arms plan into its second year of operation. There was a trouble ahead—mostly from Republicans.

The major points of dispute were:

(1) A provision to give President Truman authority to hand over \$122,500,000 worth of arms to any European nation whose defense he considers vital to the security of the United States.

(2) An amendment which would permit the U. S. government to sell arms on credit to any friendly nation.

(3) A proposal by Senator Lodge (R-Mass.) to permit Marshall plan nations to draw on \$5,000,000,000 of European recovery funds for military purposes. These funds are local currencies deposited by European countries to match recovery dollars.

Two senate committees strongly emphasized yesterday that new type weapons developed since World War II would go into Europe's defenses.

While many of these arms are not yet being produced in any numbers, the senate foreign relations and armed services committees said in a report that new weapons capable of mass-production will make it possible to defend western Europe without matching an invader division for division.

"Our armed forces and those of our partners must have well equipped forces available—men armed with the most modern weapons science can develop," the committee said.

Any show of weakness at this time, the committee argued, would be a confession "which the soviet union would not be slow to interpret as an invitation to aggression."

Under present law, the United States cannot arm European nations with atomic weapons. But other arms can be supplied as they become available, and it was to these that the committee referred.

The report spoke of recoilless guns, shaped explosives for use against tanks, non-magnetic mines and new uses of vacuum tube fuses.

"These new weapons of defense," the report said, "give us greater assurance that our plans can be carried out successfully without the necessity of matching the enemy division for division, tank for tank, or man for man."

Connally was confident that the senate would approve the bill virtually as it came out of the foreign relations and armed services committees. Indications were that a final vote would not be reached until early next week.

'SPIES' SENTENCED

BERLIN, June 23.—(AP)—The Albanian supreme military court sentenced four men to death and six others to long prison terms yesterday as "spies and saboteurs of the Yugoslav secret police." The Soviet licensed news agency Aps reported today. Only one of eight defendants was found innocent in the trial, conducted at Tirana.

Assignments Affect Highway Officers Here

Five assignments affecting the Roseburg office of the Oregon State Highway department have been announced by R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer.

L. H. Young, presently resident engineer for the commission at Roseburg, is being promoted to the position of district maintenance superintendent at Baker. Raymon Asbury, presently division office engineer, is being transferred to resident engineer at Roseburg.

Harold E. Roadman, presently a draftsman for the commission at Portland, is being promoted to the position of division office engineer at Roseburg.

Tom Edwards, presently district maintenance superintendent for the position of assistant division engineer at Roseburg, is being promoted to the position of assistant division engineer at Roseburg.

B. A. Martin, presently assistant division engineer, is being transferred to the construction department office in Salem.

Young's new position involves responsibility for all maintenance activities in the Baker district. Young received his engineering training at Oregon State college, and has been employed by the department since 1934, except for a period in the United States navy during World War II. He has held a variety of positions, including head chairman, draftsman and transitman. At Baker he will replace H. J. Miller, who is resigning to enter private business.

Edwards new position will involve duties as assistant to the division engineer in the administration of all engineering and maintenance activities in division III, which covers all of southwest Oregon.

Edwards received his engineering education at Oregon State college and has worked continuously for the department since 1927. He has held a variety of positions including: transitman, draftsman and resident engineer.

Student-Laden Vessel Halted As 'Firetrap'

NEW YORK, June 23.—Six hundred dejected college students were stranded in New York today after the coast guard branded their chartered ship a "firetrap" and halted its scheduled sailing for Europe.

The coast guard eloped its ban on the 6,800-ton Norwegian liner Svalbard, yesterday, just hours before it was to sail with college men and women from all parts of the United States.

The vessel, owned by the Norwegian government, had been chartered for \$200,000 by the National Student association, whose president is Robert Kelly of St. Peter's college, Jersey City, N. J.

It had been scheduled to dock at Rotterdam on July 3 and leave there Aug. 31 for the return trip.

Coast guard inspectors told Miss Helen Bryan, 24, Sarah Lawrence college student and N.S.A. travel organizer, that the vessel's stairways were too narrow, its wooden bunks did not meet safety regulations and there was no automatic fire alarm.

The students heard the news as they waited on the pier ready to board the ship. A loud man went up. Girls wept on one another's shoulders and one big college boy vented his anger by booting a suitcase into the water.

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Apportionment Plan Petitions In Circulation

V. Vivian Logsdon of Roseburg is heading a county-wide movement to secure petition signatures to put on the November ballot the so-called "balanced apportionment" plan for determining the membership of the Oregon state legislature.

The plan provides that representation shall be determined on a basis of population. Equal proportion shall be used for determination, except that no county shall have more than one-third membership of either house. A county with insufficient population for a member shall be attached to or grouped with an adjoining county or counties for representation. The reapportionment would be made on July 1, 1951, and of the same date for each tenth year, following the latest federal census.

Petitions are being circulated throughout the county. The Roseburg Business and Professional Women's club is sponsoring the movement here, said Miss Logsdon.

Those circulating petitions in other parts of the county are: Canyonville, Bill Weaver; Drain, Mrs. William Cool; Myrtle Creek, Mrs. Alvin Helgeson; Riddle, E. C. Logsdon; Glendale, Robert S. King of Eugene; Yoncalla, Mrs. Robert Crawford; and Roseburg, Mrs. Edith Gilmour.

The plan has the backing of the Oregon Farm Bureau.

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
