Snead Faces Byrd In Golf Defense

COLUMBUS, O., June 23.—(P)—Sam Snead began defense of his national PGA crown today jingling \$250 as the meet's medalist. Never since the birth of the PGA tourney in 1919 has a defending champion, automatically exempt from the 36-hole qualifying round, condescended to compete anyway for the sake of picking up extra cash. That is, until Snead, who tops the money winners with more than \$21,000 came along.

Yesterday over the tough 7,332-yard Scioto course Snead's lethal chip shots, which left him with only 25 putts for the round, supported a dazzling 68.

This four-under-par effort matching the competitive course record set by Wild Bill Mohr and the late Mac Smith in the 1928 national open, gave him a 36-hole total of 140 for medalist honors.

In today's first round Snead faces an imposing opponent, Sam Byrd, who lost to Byron Nelson 4-3 in the 1945 finals.

Mountain Goats Seen In Wallowa Region

Four and possibly a fifth mountain goat have been sighted high on a mountain near Wallowa lake in Northeastern Oregon by Mike McFetridge, Wallowa lake packer, and Ted Laughlin, state Game commission field agent.

According to Laughlin, the goats were scattered on sheer rock formations at 7,000 feet altitude. The animals were observed through field glasses but swirling clouds and rough terrain prevented a close approach.

The five goats were last seen in March when released by game agents on the slopes of Chief Joseph mountain which rises above Wallowa lake. Prior to this introduction, mountain goats were unknown in Oregon.

The Oregon State Game commission has permission to trap 19 more of the shaggy cliff dwellers in northern Washington sometime next winter. These animals will be used to supplement the Wallowa band.

Spring Egg-Take Operations Ending At Diamond Lake

Over 4,000,000 trout eggs have been obtained from wild rainbow by Oregon State Game commission spawning crews. The last of four spring egg-take operations are now being completed at Diamond, East and Paulina lakes, the commission reports.

Diamond lake spawning have produced nearly 2,000,000 eggs. The fish are trapped as they enter tributary streams and the lake outlet, Lake creek. The spawned-out fish are returned to the lake.

At East and Paulina lakes, spawning rainbow seemed from shoal areas have been stripped of 370,000 eggs. Egg-take crews must be on hand at these lakes when the ice breaks up, for spawning takes place immediately afterwards. A sno-cat was used to transport the crews and their supplies into the lakes in mid-May.

Lampblack was used at East Lake to hasten the ice break-up. An aeroplane dusted the fine soot over the surface of the lake in long strips. The altitude of the lake, 6,400 feet, prevents early melting of the heavy ice cover, and many of the trout are overripe before spawning crews are able to seine them. Bob Borovicka, central Oregon fishery agent, conducted the first lampblack experiments at East lake in May, 1949. The lampblack coated ice melted at the rate of two inches per day.

DENVER, June 23.—(P)—Two of the nation's top women pros and a pair of crackjack amateurs from Ohio tangle today in two tussles that will decide the pro-amateur lineup for Saturday's final in the women's western open golf championship.

Mrs. Babe Didrickson Zaharias, the Chicago siege gun, will shoot for her first match play win over Patty Berg, the pride of Minneapolis, in an all-pro semi-final test at 18 holes.

Mrs. Zaharias was a 4 and 3 winner over Betty Mackinnon of Dallas yesterday while Miss Berg defeated Mrs. Betty Bush of Hammond, Ind., by the same margin.

Peggy Kirk of Findlay and Claire Doran of Cleveland make up the all-Buckeye bracket on the simon pure side. Miss Kirk hung a 1-down defeat on Betty Jameson of San Antonio, only pro in the upper bracket yesterday, while Miss Doran continued a great run of par golf in defeating Mrs. Lyle Bowman of Portland, Ore., 3 and 2.

Before they were last seen in March when five were released in the area to introduce mountain goats to Oregon. Nineteen more are to be tapped in northern Washington next winter to augment the band.

Illegal Traffic In Deer Charged

DENVER, June 23.—(P)—Two St. Louis businessmen and the former operator of a Colorado hunting camp, are charged with shipping illegally-killed deer from Colorado to Missouri in a complaint on file today in U. S. district court.

Named in the complaint are Thomas Lee Omahundro of St. Louis, W. F. J. Fienup of Overland, Mo., a St. Louis suburb, and Forrest F. Voss, 36, of Metairie Falls, Wash.

Frank Poley, U. S. game management agent, said he had evidence that between 1946 and 1948 the three shipped a total of 23 illegally killed deer out of the state from Voss' hunting camp. He said he had statements from the two Missourians that they wanted the meat to give away to friends.

The accused men face possible maximum penalties of \$500 fine or six months in jail, or both.
