Lutheran Unit Continues Effort Towards Accord

MILWAUKEE. — (AP) — A plea for continued efforts toward unity among all Lutherans was made to the 873 delegates representing 5,366 parishes in the United States and Canada at the 41st triennial convention of the Lutheran church-Missouri synod here.

Dr. John W. Behnken, president of the Synod, declared the organization will renew its attempts to encourage "free" conferences among clergy and laity of all Lutheran bodies in the nation to discuss unity.

A doctrinal agreement with the American Lutheran church will be submitted to the delegates for ratification during the nine-day session. It would not amount to a merger, officials said, because each group would retain its administrative setup.

Beaver Boys State Scheduled At Corvallis

OREGON STATE COLLEGE — The 14th annual American Legion sponsored Beaver Boys State will bring some 250 boys to the campus here for a week-long session June 25 to July 1.

The affair provides practical training for selected boys, 15 to 17 years of age, from all parts of the state. They receive instruction in the operation of government.

The 1950 session will be directed by the Rev. James L. Wilson, Toledo, with L. E. Darlington, assistant dean of men here, acting as liaison officer for the advisory committee.

The boys will form political parties and conduct elections.

PORTLAND. — (AP) — The Democratic party's top officials will visit Oregon next weekend, taking part in a round-table discussion at The Dalles.

William M. Boyle Jr., party chairman, and Mrs. India Edwards, vice chairman, will arrive in Portland Saturday. They will view Bonneville dam, then attend the meeting at The Dalles.

These representatives of farming, labor, education and transportation will take part in a discussion of "What the people of Oregon expect of the Democratic administration."

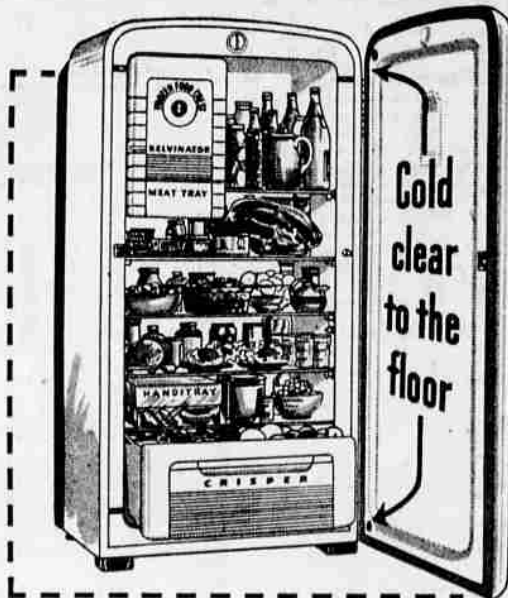

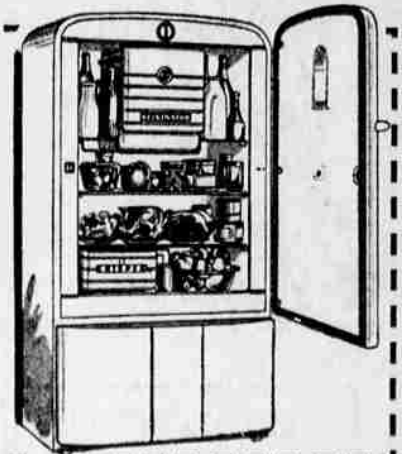
