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Sutherland Finds Expansion Need In Water System

The first business to come before the council Monday evening was the discussion of the present water system. Carl E. Gree, representing the engineering firm of John W. Cunningham and Associates, Portland consulting engineers, stated that the present filtration unit was of a type vastly over rated by manufacturers and that the unit has been outlawed in Washington state because of its unsatisfactory performance.

Sutherland's \$80,000 filtration plant, completed just one year ago, cannot fulfill present needs of the water system, nor can it be successfully used as a unit in the new proposed system, according to the report given Monday night.

A check on present operation of the plant disclosed that the water passed through in a 20 minute period and standard procedure for this type of unit calls for the water to be treated for a longer time.

The cost was estimated at \$248,500 for a new system for Sutherland, to replace the present water system and make provision for future expansion of the town.

Sutherland agreed to accept the responsibility, formally held by the county, for licensing and control of dogs within the city. Eighty percent of the fees collected will go to the city. Chief Oliver Eggleston was notified of his new duties as dog catcher.

**Sutherland Scout Leader
Calls For Volunteers**

Sutherland Scoutmaster H. K. Halvorsen Jr. has issued a call for "boys" over 21 to act as leaders of the Sutherland Boy Scout group at the summer camp at Tenmile lake.

"While there are several experienced, qualified Scouts in the group fully capable of doing the actual supervising, regulations call for men over 21 who are qualified swimmers and are familiar with summer camp living," Halvorsen said in explaining the need.

The Scout organization will furnish transportation, groceries, and place the men under insurance while on the trip. Halvorsen said he would prefer to contact two men able to stay the full eight days but, failing that, arrangements for four men would be suitable.

**Excursion Ship Crash On
Lake Huron Kills Three**

DETROIT, June 26.—(AP)—The City of Cleveland III, her rear port side splintered in a fog-shrouded crash that claimed at least three lives, straggled home last night.

The excursion ship collided with a Norwegian freighter Sunday on Lake Huron, near Harbor Springs in Michigan's Thumb district. The other ship loomed suddenly out of a "pea soup" fog about five miles off shore.

Besides the three who died in the wreckage, one man still is missing and six others reported injured. Three are in a critical condition at a hospital.

All except one of the victims were with a cruising party of 70 Benton Harbor chamber of commerce members.

An indication of the rodeo color and pageantry to be expected was given both days as individual horsemen, mounted groups and beautiful girls participated in the grand entry. Rodeo Queen Ardis Giles made her individual entrance, preceded by Princesses Pat McKinney, Rita Karsten, Shirley Hart and Fern Osborn.

The queen and her court were barely off the track before the chutes opened and cowboys, bulls and broncs were flying through the air to open the show with a bang.

Trick Riding Pleases
Interspersed with the regular cowboy fare were such crowd-pleasing events as saddle horse races, stake races, pony express races and the ever-popular calf and lamb scrambles.

Roseburg's own Jackie Carstens, working her third rodeo as a trick rider teamed with professional rider Barbara Huntington of Eugene to display excellent poise and balance while performing on their galloping steeds.

Little Brown Jug Reynolds, known to western movie fans as "Little Western," drew applause with his Roman horse act, including fancy trick riding and jumping. His father, Fess Reynolds, entertained the crowd throughout both shows with his clown antics and bull fighting. Mrs. Reynolds, third member of the talented family, was cheered by the spectators as she put her trained brahma bulls through their paces.

Wild bulls on the loose provided thrills for the spectators and chills to those who happened to be in their way during both showings. Three bulls chased cowboys and horses Saturday night and another trio of wild bulls scattered everything and everyone in their way Sunday, jumping five-foot fences as easily as a well trained track star.

Ironie in the eyes of those who left the stands late Sunday afternoon was the fact that the most thrilling bull riding event came after most rodeo fans had departed. Don Boag, Hood River waddy, left the chutes long after the bull riding event was over because his mount's unruly behavior did not allow him to compete.

Slammed twice against the side of the chute, Boag stuck to the maddened beast and barely escaped serious injury from flying hooves and horns when he bounced off after the eight-second required limit.

Another cowboy not so fortunate was Howard Pruett, Roseburg entrant, who left the arena Sunday in an ambulance but was treated on the grounds by a physician attending the show.

**Louisiana Cracks Down
On Alligator Exporting**

BATON ROUGE, La., June 26.—(AP)—Louisiana doesn't like other states muscling in on the alligator business.

The state house of representatives voted to cut off the supply. The bill, passed 65-0, prohibits killing or capturing alligators under three feet long and prohibits the export of live alligators of any size.

Said Rep. E. J. Grizzaffi, one of the authors: "Florida is buying hundreds of our baby alligators and using them to restock their marshes. The alligator is a valuable animal. In a couple of years he grows a very fine skin. Also he eats garfish and gar prey on game fish."

The bill now goes to the state senate.

**Plane Crashes On Edge
Of Bluff; 3 Dodge Death**

WARM SPRINGS, Ore., June 26.—(AP)—A light plane crashed onto a bluff above the Metolius river yesterday, skidded until part of the plane hung over the cliff, then slipped just short of disaster.

Aboard were three Portlanders, who emerged unscathed. They were James Conway, the pilot; Joseph Schallis and Roy Johnson.

Conway said they had flown there in his plane in the morning to go fishing, and were taking off on the return trip when the engine failed.

The tail and one wing were hanging over the canyon when the plane stopped. The three Portlanders were shaken up, but walked out to civilization.

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Ex-Idaho Official Given Ten Years On Funds Charge

BOISE, Idaho, June 26.—(AP)—Former state purchasing agent Harold A. Boyd pleaded guilty today to a charge of misuse of public money.

He was sentenced by Judge C. F. Koelsch to not more than ten years in the state penitentiary.

Immediately after the sentencing the court granted the request of Ada county prosecutor James W. Blaine that execution of the sentence be delayed ten days and granted a motion that four other charges against the former purchasing agent be dismissed.

These were indictments of a grand jury charging grand larceny in the theft of three sets of binoculars; embezzlement in transfer of title to a state-owned automobile; and two charging presentation of fraudulent accounts.

The charge to which Boyd pleaded guilty involved painting of a privately owned motorcycle. Blaine told the court that Boyd had caused \$59 in state money paid to Don Gamble of Boise for the work.

Before passing sentence Judge Koelsch said that "a man who occupies a high position in the government should commit a crime against the state is almost past understanding. Your crime is a most serious one. In a democratic government it strikes at the very roots of government."

In a brief plea for leniency, Boyd's attorney, Claude V. Marcus, said the former purchasing agent had a good record up to this time, that he is married and the father of three small children.

**MacArthur Halts Issue
Of Communist Paper**

TOKYO, June 26.—(AP)—General MacArthur today ordered the Japanese government to suspend publication of the Communist party newspaper Akahata for 30 days.

It was MacArthur's third body blow to Japan's Reds in as many weeks. On June 6 he ordered 20 of the party's central executive committee members purged from Japanese political life.

The next day he banned 17 top editorial personnel from working on Akahata. In a letter to Premier Yoshida today MacArthur said he hoped to eliminate the old leadership from working on Akahata toward "a course of relative moderation."

He said its one sided coverage of the present Korean situation had shown the Communists had not learned their lesson.

SMOKE KILLS SMOKER
ASHLAND, June 26.—(AP)—Herman Bier, 75, suffocated in his small cabin here Saturday. The deputy coroner reported a mattress caught fire, apparently from Bier's pipe. Smoke overcame him, but the cabin did not burn.

JUDGE SOLOMON OK'd
WASHINGTON, June 26.—(AP)—The Senate judiciary committee today approved the federal judgeship nomination of Gus J. Solomon to be U. S. district judge for Oregon. He now is serving under a temporary (recess) appointment.

Charles C. Shinkle, 73, resident of Roseburg since 1932, died Sunday, June 25, in Mercy hospital following a short illness. He was born at Burlington, Ia., March 26, 1877, and was married at Sedan, Kan., on May 30, 1898, to Miss Jennie Martha Ward. He came to Roseburg from Cedarville, Kan.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Jennie M. Shinkle, Roseburg, and four daughters and two sons, Mrs. Ethel Krewson, Dillard, Mrs. Tina May and Mrs. Lucille Lent both of Roseburg; Mrs. Opal Sheherd, Reedsport; Lawrence Shinkle, Roseburg and Francis Shinkle, Reedsport. He is also survived by a sister, Mrs. Eva Brown, Hoquiam, Wash., and 12 grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Long & Orr mortuary Thursday, June 29, at 2 p. m. with the Rev. H. A. Schlatter officiating. Concluding services and interment will follow in the Willis Creek cemetery.

**Northwest Flood
Situation Eases**

(By the Associated Press)
Murky waters of the lower Columbia river were rising toward a predicted peak today as other unruly Pacific Northwest rivers to the north and northeast receded steadily.

River forecaster Elmer Fisher of Portland said the Columbia would reach its crest at Vancouver, Wash., today. A 25.3 foot level has been predicted. Flood stage there is 15 feet.

The river will remain close to the 25.3 level for the next four days, despite upriver declines, Fisher said.

To date, damage there has been slight. Most of the area is diked. Flooding late last week of 1,500 acres of pasture and farming land on Sauvie island, a dairy farming center near Portland, has been the principal damage.

In northern Idaho, the Kootenai river continued dropping steadily after reaching a 34-foot peak Saturday.

But the danger is not yet past, warned Vernon Good of the flood control office at Bonners Ferry last night. Volunteer civilian workers and 175 soldiers were still reinforcing battered dikes to stop seepage at critical spots.

More than 4000 of the 30,000 acres of fertile farming land in the area are under water. The latest break, early Saturday morning, flooded 1000 acres.

In western Canada, the flood crisis seemed definitely over.

Taft And Lucas Blasted By Head Of Negro Assn.

BOSTON, June 26.—(AP)—Negro leader Walter White has charged Senators Taft (R-Ohio) and Lucas (D-Ill.) with "gross insincerity" in their support of civil rights legislation.

The executive secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People sharply criticized the two senators yesterday in an address to the NAACP's annual convention.

"The attitudes of 'Mr. Republican' and 'Mr. Democrat' are typical of the gross insincerity, with but few exceptions in both parties, as the civil rights issue," White declared.

He blasted the "more subtle politicians who clothe themselves in robes of respectability, smile unctuously at those they are about to doublecross, and then piously campaign for reelection on the ground they were prevented from keeping their promises by those pesky Dixiecrats."

"I have in mind," he said, such men as Mr. Taft of Ohio who wrote the 1948 Republican party platform promising unequivocal support of a federal FEPC. But a year later he proposed a toothless measure without enforcement powers.

"I have in mind the majority leader of the Senate, Mr. Lucas of Illinois, who approached the Senate fight for FEPC with quaking knee and quivering voice much as one would march to the electric chair."

**Stanley Glick Takes
Course At Reed College**

Stanley Glick, Astoria high school teacher, is one of a group of college and high school teachers in Oregon attending the five-week regional summer course in radiological monitoring training which opened Monday at Reed college. He was formerly a teacher in the Roseburg schools.

The training is given under the national security resources board which is charged with responsibility in developing civilian defense organizations. Persons taking the training were cleared by the NSRB and by their state governors.

While Mr. Glick is attending the course, Mrs. Glyick and daughter are visiting friends in Roseburg.

**Firecracker Violators
Each Forfeit \$5 Bail**

an unimpeachable source reported. The American embassy burned its important secret papers in a huge bonfire. Air raid sirens screeched. The city was buzzing after four northern planes strafed downtown streets.

From the start things went wrong in the field. Intense artillery fire rocked one division back on its heels. Tanks ripped into them, halting what little forward movement the southerners had been able to make.

Another division ran into trouble at the same time. Northern forces seized their advantage and rolled forward. By 8 p.m. all southern troops were forced out of Uijongbu and had taken a position outside of the city.

No mention of losses was made in late field dispatches but they were presumed to be heavy.

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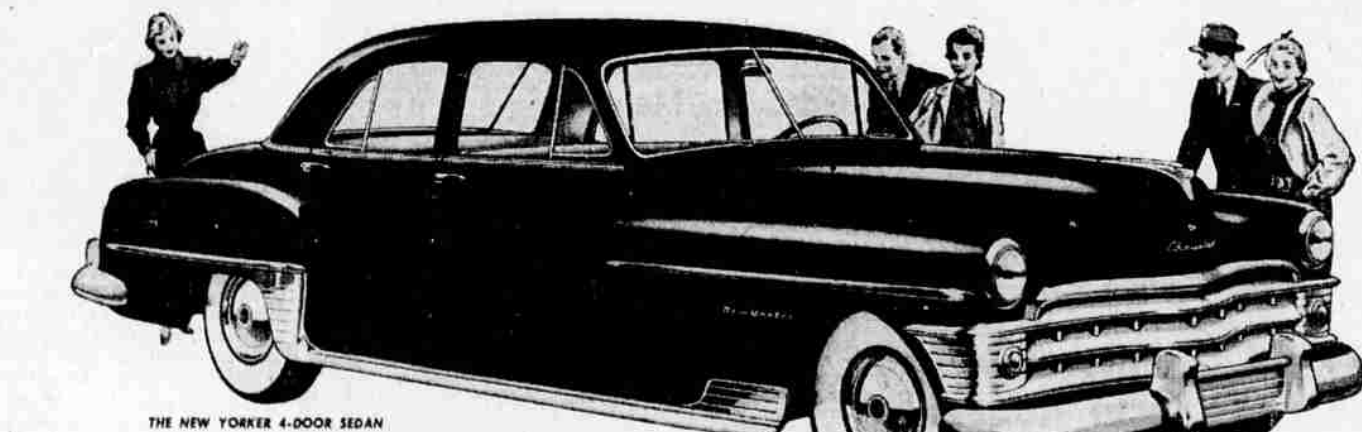
