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**U. S. Agents Crack
Italian Smuggling
Of Alien People**

DETROIT. — (AP) — With 80 ar-
rests, United States immigration
agents claim they have cracked
activities of an Italian gang re-
ported to be smuggling aliens into
the Detroit area.

Fifty arrests in Detroit were an-
nounced, and 30 more in New York.
The roundup began four months
ago.

Among those bagged, said im-
migration service district Director
James W. Butterfield, was 29-year-
old "Tony Hood"

in southern.
Badalante, described as a
former lieutenant of Sicilian gang
Chief Salvatore Guiliano, was ar-
rested last month in downriver
suburban Wyandotte, Butterfield
disclosed.

The Italian is wanted by Italian
police on charges of robbery, kid-
naping and murder, the immigra-
tion official said.

"The case is far from closed,"
Butterfield said in announcing the
roundup. "There will be further
arrests."

All aliens reportedly smuggled
into this country came from the
area of Cinisi, Italy, according to
Butterfield.

Some, he said, were rowed across
the Detroit river from Canadian
shores.

Others apparently slipped in at
New York, New Orleans and Gal-
veston, Tex.

Badalante, the only one of the
80 arrested who was not freed on
bond, is in Wayne (Detroit) county
jail. He has been ordered de-
ported. Disposition of the other
cases was deferred.

Another reported member of the
Gigliano gang is Giacomo Miskale,
picked up in New York.

"These aliens came here," But-
terfield said, "because of the size
of the city and its big Italian col-
ony. Whether they were brought
here for criminal purposes is more
than we know at present."

The U. S. Department of Agri-

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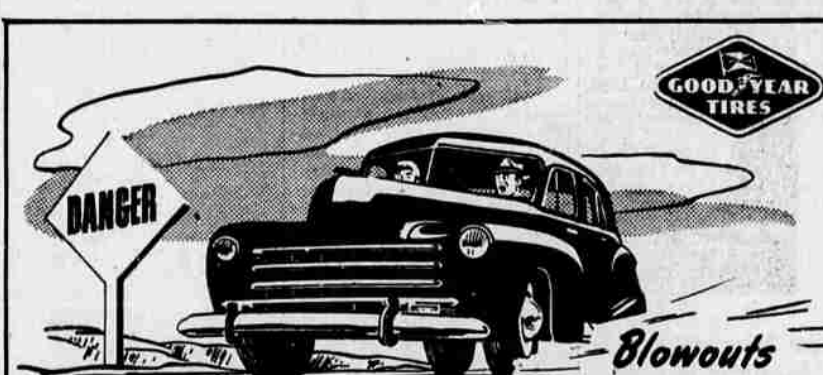
