Spokane's Al Mengert Wins NW Golf Title
VANCOUVER, B. C., July 3.—(AP)—The hottest thing in Northwest golf—that's Spokane's Al Mengert.
The 19-year-old two-time national junior champion buried the Seattle veteran, Harry Givan, beneath a brilliant assortment of approach shots and putts Saturday, winning 5 and 4 to capture the Pacific Northwest Golf association crown.
When the match closed out on the 32nd green, Mengert was 12 under par. His first 18-hole round, which left Givan seven down, was nine under par. Only the day before, Mengert had gone 10 under par to set a new Capilano course record.

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Major League Games Packed With Action

Bobby Feller racks up his 200th major league triumph. Joe DiMaggio becomes a first baseman. Philadelphia drops defending champion Brooklyn Dodgers into fourth place in the National league standings with third straight whopping. Cleveland rookie Al Rosen ties Ted Williams for the home run lead. Chicago Cubs thrash Cincinnati, 16-0.

These are but a few of the baseball headlines today following one of the most action-packed Sundays on the diamond in many seasons.

The Phils retained first place in the National league, whipping the Dodgers, 6-4, in the first game of a doubleheader. The second game ended in a 10-inning 8-8 tie, halted by Pennsylvania's curfew law. Held hitless through six innings by Curt Simmons, the Dodgers rallied for eight runs in the seventh, eighth and ninth to overcome an 8-0 deficit.

The St. Louis Cardinals remained three percentage points behind the Phillies. The Red Birds edged out the Pittsburgh Pirates, 2-1.

Boston's Braves climbed into third place, two games off the pace, sweeping a doubleheader from the New York Giants, 11-5 and 6-3. Ex-Giants ruined the New Yorkers. Walker Cooper, Sid Gordon and Buddy Keer homered for the Braves.

Long John Sain allowed only six hits in the first game to become the first hurler in the majors to notch 11 triumphs this season. He won 10 last season. Cooper, his battery-mate, suffered a sprained ankle and was sent to medical center where x-rays showed no fracture. He will be out of action for several days.

It took a fine relief performance by Hal Newhouser to enable the Tigers to salvage one of the four-game series from the red hot Indians. Newhouser stopped a Cleveland uprising in the eighth inning and was called for three runs in the ninth to win the opener, 8-5. Luke Easter's homer with two on climaxed a five-run sixth inning to give the Tribe a 5-3 victory in the second game.

Feller Gets Help
Feller, who received credit for the second game victory, needed help from Al Benton after the Tigers had put the tying runs on base in the ninth. The 31-year-old Feller, is the 42nd pitcher to win 200 or more games. The last to enter the select circle was Bobo Newsom in 1948.

Home runs by Joe DiMaggio, Yogi Berra and Johnny Mize proved Red Sox slugfest. Berra got two others hit to drive in five runs. Allie Reynolds got credit for his seventh victory which pushed the Yanks back in second place, three and a half games behind the Tigers. The Indians trail by four and the Red Sox by six.

Rookie Bob Hooper won his eighth game as the Athletics won from Washington, 7-4. The A's pounced on Bob Kuzava for five runs in the third inning. Ray Scarborough and Gus Zernial teamed up to give the White Sox a 5-2 triumph over the Browns in the first game. The Browns won the second game, 4-3, when Bob Cain walked pinch hitter Roy Sievers with the bases loaded in the 11th inning to force in the winning run.

Purdue Golfer Wins NCAA Championship
ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., July 3.—(AP)—Matter-of-fact Fred Wampler of Purdue has annexed the National Collegiate Athletic association golf crown to an already-impressive list of links titles.
Wampler took the collegiate golf classic championship Saturday by defeating husky Bob McCall, 1950 Colgate football captain, 2 and 1.
His victory climaxed the week-long 53rd annual NCAA tourney which started with a field of 165 on the 6812-yard University of New Mexico layout.

With the holiday festivities still to come, the Duwamish slough runs red with the blood of the San Diego Padres today, and all the boys are whooping it up in Emil Sick's saloon.

A little behind schedule maybe, the Seattle Rainiers have arrived last in the Pacific Coast league's first division. This is the same club, remember, that couldn't buy a victory earlier in the season.

The Rainiers hit the comeback trail exactly two months ago, fazed trail exactly two months ago, fazed trail at a 600 clip, won nine series in a row, and now repose in fourth place a game and a half behind San Diego. That's pretty decent baseball, as the Padres can attest.

San Francisco also swept a Sunday doubleheader. Manny Perez shut out Los Angeles, 2 to 0 in the second game. The Seals fashioned two fat innings to whip the Angels, 10 to 9, in the opener. Perez yielded only two hits in the seven-inning contest.

Hollywood and Oakland, the No. 1 and 2 clubs, divided theirs. The Oaks took the opener, 5 to 3, by putting down a Hollywood uprising. The Twinks took the nightcap, 9 to 3, turning in a four run second inning.

The final game between Sacramento and Portland also went into overtime. Relief pitcher Harry Gumbert singled home the winning run to give the last place Solons a 6 to 5 triumph.

CHICAGO —(AP)—The major league's all-star fireworks don't explode until July 11: but the rival American and National leagues today had their big guns lined up and ready to boom in baseball's midsummer classic.

The Boston Red Sox and St. Louis Cardinals, each with three positions, dominated the nationwide balloting for the 16 all-star starters—exclusive of pitchers—which ended last weekend.

A total of 3,167,326 fans participated in the poll for the 17th annual "dream game" at Comiskey park. The 20-day balloting was conducted by 290 newspapers and radio stations.

Only three other clubs besides the fence-wrecking Red Sox figure in the lineup. American League Manager Casey Stengel of the New York Yankees must play his starters at least three innings. They were the Detroit Tigers and Yankees with two players each and the Cleveland Indians with one.

National league pilot Burt Shotton of Brooklyn has two of his own Dodgers and one each from the Philadelphia Phils, Pittsburgh Pirates and Chicago Cubs, along with the Cardinal trio.
