"At a time when things look dark for the library service in the State of Oregon," said Governor Douglas McKay, addressing the assembly gathered in Cottage Grove last Saturday afternoon for the dedication of the W. A. Woodard Library, "the gift of this beautiful Colonial building is a cheering note. I hope that there will be similar gifts elsewhere in our state by other citizens as public spirited and generous as Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Woodard."

"I have often thought of the State library as the poor man's university. It is amazing to see how many people are using the facilities of our State library for sources," Governor McKay is chairman of the State library board. Miss Eleanor Stephens, state librarian, was also present.

"Oregon's progress cannot be a real progress unless it is a balanced progress," asserted the governor, deploring the fact that when increased public service brought increased taxes and consequent resentment on the part of the tax-

payers, the library service was the first to feel the effect of such resentment. Governor McKay cited statistics to prove his point. He then paid tribute to "My friends Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Woodard, who have realized the need for better library facilities and have made them possible."

"The United States was the first nation to be founded on world brotherhood; a nation in which the government is the servant of the people and not the people slaves to the government, a nation where free enterprise really exists. The gift of the W. A. Woodard library by a man who has lived fifty years in the community, and has not forgotten his obligation to the community in which he lives, is proof of such free enterprise, its opportunity and its privilege."

Following the ceremonies, charter member library cards signed by Governor McKay and W. A. Woodard were presented to the first fifty guests as souvenirs of the occasion, by Mrs. Nellie Hamant who has been town librarian for twenty-two years.

Naval, Air Bases On West Coast Barred To Public

SAN FRANCISCO, July 5.—(AP)—The bars were up today against casual visitors at naval bases from San Diego to Seattle and west to Hawaii.

Air force bases took similar precautions.

Civilian defense units formed. In some communities, world war II's air raid sirens were set up.

A naval task force was being formed at San Diego, centered on the aircraft carrier Philippine Sea, for dispatch to Hawaii.

Air, naval and army commanders in the San Francisco area jointly announced readiness to carry out any orders from President Truman.

Thus did the impact of the fighting in Korea make itself felt upon the life of the west coast.

The radar and jet fighter defense against bombing raids from out over the Pacific have been tested and proved. The western air defense at Hamilton field, north of the Golden Gate, said that B-36s flying in from Hawaii on a simulated atom bombing attack were detected by radar before they reached the mainland. And three minutes later B-29 Superfortresses intercepted the bigger six-engine bombers, whose home base is Carswell field, near Fort Worth.

The carrier Philippine Sea was due in San Diego today. She will sail at an undisclosed date for Honolulu. Also going there are the cruisers Helena and Toledo.

Stalin Again Gouges Soviet Language System

MOSCOW, (AP)—Prime minister Stalin has published another pronouncement of philology, the study of languages.

This one, in the magazine Bolshhevik, took up four pages, and was dated June 29. The earlier one was June 20, and took up a page and a half in Pravda.

Latest addition to the philology debate was made up of answers of the Soviet leader to questions of "Young Philologist E. Krasheninnikova," and developed some of the theses stated in the last one.

(Stalin's Pravda article June 20 demolished the previously accepted Soviet school of philology as developed by the language scientist N. Y. Marr. Observers still are arguing about why Stalin did it.)

'Atom Water' Quack, Wife Are Sent To Prison

CHICAGO July 5.—(AP)—William (old Doc) Estep, the "atom water" man and his wife have been sentenced to prison for fraud and unauthorized practice of medicine.

Fifty-four year old Estep got three to five years and was fined \$2000 yesterday by Judge Donald S. McKinlay of criminal court.

A \$2,000 fine also was assessed against his wife Dora, 48, and she got a one to two-year sentence.

A criminal court jury that convicted them heard that the couple treated patients with "atom water." The two were charged with violating the state medical practice act, operating a confidence game, and conspiracy to obtain money under false pretenses.

Two Children Drown In Oregon Accidents

Electric Line Crossing Permit Asked By Co-Op

Douglas Electric Cooperative, Inc., Roseburg, has applied to the department of the army for permits to construct six overhead electric transmission lines across the Umpqua and Smith rivers near Reedsport. The crossings, consisting of wires on wood poles, include:

1. Across the Umpqua two miles upstream from the Southern Pacific railway bridge, minimum vertical navigation clearance 102 feet above mean lower low water; 2. across Umpqua 300 feet upstream from the head of Brandy Island, eight miles upstream from Reedsport, 138 feet clearance; 3. across Umpqua 11.5 miles upstream from Reedsport, 138 feet clearance; 4. across Umpqua 600 feet downstream from the mouth of Mill creek, 11 miles upstream from Reedsport, 138 feet clearance; 5. along the south bank of the Umpqua, 6,000 feet east from the mouth of Dean creek a distance of 940 feet, with 43 feet four inches clearance; 6. across Smith river five miles upstream from the confluence of Smith and Umpqua rivers, 130 feet clearance.

Maps and plans may be seen in the army district engineer's office 626 Pittcock block, Portland 5, Ore. Letters expressing views concerning the effect of the proposed work on navigation are requested from interested parties and should be received any July 10, announced R. E. Hickson, chief, engineering division.

U.S. Natl. Bank Ups Interest Rate

The United States National bank directors Friday increased the interest rate on savings accounts and announced a proposed 20 percent stock dividend.

Beginning July 1, savings depositors will receive an increase from one to 1 percent on savings accounts under \$10,000 and one percent on amounts over that sum, announced E. C. Sammons, president. The increase will mean a savings "dividend" to depositors of approximately \$375,000 in 1950 and \$750,000 in 1951.

The 20 percent stock dividend will be paid if the directors recommendation is approved by the stockholders at a meeting called for Aug. 11, and if the plan meets the controller of currency approval, said Sammons.

Youths Get Three-Year Terms For Auto Theft

Two Lane county youths were sentenced July 1 to the state penitentiary for three years, following pleas of guilty to larceny of an auto, District Attorney Robert G. Davis reported.

Sentenced by Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly were Lauren Clark Johnson, 18, of Eugene, and Albert LeRoy Van Landingham, 18, Springfield.

BERLIN, July 5.—(AP)—East Germany's Communist police army lost five more deserters to West Berlin today. The infantry-trained policemen asked for political asylum in the Allied sectors of the city because their "personal security was threatened" in the Russian zone.

The Story Behind a Claim

Late in the evening of last Thanksgiving, one of our policyowners, who lived in a large midwestern city, left his home to buy some cigarettes. The most convenient place at that hour was a tavern.
