

MAJOR BATTLE IN SOUTH KOREA IMPENDS

New Polio Outbreak Faced
As Record Fund Rapidly Falls

NEW YORK, July 7 — (AP) — A new outbreak of infantile paralysis was reported across the nation today, along with the announcement that the 1950 March of Dimes campaign netted a record sum to fight the disease.

Basil O'Connor, President of the National Foundation for infantile paralysis, said Americans gave \$30,783,000 — more than ever before — to the 1950 drive.

He added that the fund is being used at an "unprecedented rate" to combat a threatened new, severe epidemic.

The number of polio cases so far this year, he said, is slightly above the number in the same period last year, when the nation had a record all-time high of 42,375 new polio patients.

The 30-million-plus total beef 1949's collection of \$25,728,000, then a record. O'Connor said virtually all of the latter sum, plus \$4,000,000 raised in an emergency appeal last September, has been used to care for 1949's patients.

There are 17,000 of these requiring continuing assistance, he said.

O'Connor said 467 of the foundation's 2,822 local chapters already have exhausted their 1949 residue funds and all of the funds contributed in this year's campaign.

As these words are written the Russian tanks are still rolling lines in South Korea. More Russian tanks are reported coming up from behind to support those already in action. For the day after the Fourth of July, the news isn't particularly encouraging.

Let's keep our shirts on. The news from Korea isn't good, but the battle hasn't much more than got started. Remember, in spite of our bad start, we WON the Battle of the Bulge.

There's a sad little story on the wires from Florida. It starts off like this:

"Charges of three major crimes — murder, kidnapping and rape — have been filed against 21-year-old Charles Rogers, just two months out of prison for stealing a motor car."

I suppose this Rogers is just a bad egg, but every time you read of a prisoner who has served his sentence going on the loose again almost before he gets the prison pail off his face it gives you the uncomfortable feeling that our prisons are SCHOOLS FOR CRIME instead of institutions for the reclamation of damaged human material.

That isn't a pleasant thought.

There are some other interesting slants on this Rogers case. When he got out of the Florida pen after five years, he went back for a visit with some relatives. He seems to have taken a few snorts to buck up his spirits. His relatives SCOLDED him about it. So he took more snorts — quite a few more. What followed.

93 Doukhobors Receive Penitentiary Sentences

NELSON, B.C., July 7 — (AP) — Ninety-three members of the Sons of Freedom branch of the Doukhobor religious sect were sentenced yesterday to terms ranging from 18 months of hard labor to 14 years in the penitentiary.

The heaviest sentence went to John Sherstobloff, convicted on six counts of arson.

All of the defendants had been convicted in connection with an outbreak of violence in the Kootenay Doukhobor district during May and June.

Mayor, Four Councilmen To Be Chosen At Election Nov. 7

The city charter provides that the mayor and four councilmen be chosen at the Nov. 7 general election. Two councilmen from ward 1 and two from ward 2 will be up for election; City Manager M. W. Slankard reminded.

The city charter revision, passed Aug. 31, 1946, provides that two councilmen from ward 1 and two from ward 2 be elected for two-year terms. After termination of this period Dec. 31, 1950, they will be elected for four-year terms.

The charter also provided that councilmen from wards 3 and 4 be elected for four-year terms, expiring Dec. 31, 1952, so that offices of the councilmen would be staggered.

The office of mayor terminates Dec. 31, 1950, and every two years thereafter. The mayor is elected at large by the voters of the city.

Councilmen are elected from the ward in which they qualify and by the electors who may vote only in their respective wards. Persons living in wards 3 and 4 will not

'Berserk' Woman Uses Gun On Her Son And Daughter

VERNON, Conn., July 7 — (AP) — What impelled Mrs. Mary Guzman, 55, to enter her son's home before dawn and pump five pistol bullets into his body as he lay sleeping?

State police, checking for a motive for the slaying of Arthur F. Guzman, prominent, 29-year-old poultryman, said today they may have found an explanation of why his mother "obviously went berserk" yesterday morning. In addition to shooting her son, Mrs. Guzman is accused of beating her daughter-in-law, Dorothy, 28, on the head with the butt of the empty pistol.

The state police said that in a day-long investigation they learned:

That Mrs. Guzman had been in a depressed mood lately, brooding about the death of her husband five years ago this month.

That she had been disappointed when her son married and settled down to run her poultry farm. She wanted him to go to law school instead.

That she had objected to his spending more than \$50,000 last year to build the new house in which the slaying occurred.

Mrs. Guzman, injured when she jumped or fell from atop a two-story henhouse after the shooting, and her daughter-in-law were reported in "satisfactory" condition today at a hospital.

Deputy Coroner James W. Webster listed the case as murder and suicide, committed by the author.

The tragedy followed by a few hours the visit of Mrs. Gilpatric to a physician, who told her she had a breast cancer.
