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What's Your Watch

IQ?

Here are 10 key questions concerning watches. If you answer 8 correct, you are well-informed, and probably getting good time-keeping from your watch.

TRUE or FALSE:

NOTE—If any part of a question is false, the whole question is to be considered false.

1. Parts for Swiss watches are sometimes more difficult to obtain than for American-made watches.
2. New watches usually need some adjustments soon after purchase.
3. Watch cleaning is one of the most difficult and delicate watch repair jobs.
4. Some individuals cannot wear watches because of personal habits, electro-magnetism in the body, or because the nature of their work puts a watch to too severe a test.
5. All "name brand" watches have excellent guarantees covering their watches' timekeeping qualities.
6. The American-made watches are ELGIN, GRUEN, WALTHAM, HAMILTON, and BULOVA.
7. A 21-jewel wrist watch is always a better watch than a 15-jewel watch of the same make.
8. Some watches are made, which for practical purposes, are absolutely shock-proof and water-proof.
9. Choice of a reliable jeweler is actually your best form of guarantee.
10. Finding a reliable jeweler in a strange town is sometimes a trial and error problem.

Please turn the page upside down; answers are printed below.

1. FALSE—Swiss parts are as easy to obtain as American parts. During the war American Gem Society, you can be sure of the integrity of those who are members.
2. TRUE—There are no restrictions regarding who may call himself a jeweler. Qualifications consist of training or operating a store. Although there are many qualified jewelers of unquestionable ethics who are not members of the American Gem Society, you can be sure of the integrity of those who are members.
3. TRUE—Because of the delicate adjusting that must be made after cleaning, this is one of the most delicate repair jobs. Good cleaning requires that a watch must be almost completely disassembled.
4. FALSE—There are watches for every person and every job. Getting the wrong watch for your needs causes trouble.
5. FALSE—No company places any guarantee on time-keeping. This is wholly dependent upon the jeweler.
6. FALSE—Only Elgin and Hamilton are American made; all the rest are Swiss. Waltham is now out of business.
7. FALSE—"Up-jeweling" sometimes makes for worse time-keeping capabilities.
8. TRUE—"Practical purposes" consists of replacing waterproof case every two years, and replacing balance staff free of charge if they are broken (usually never necessary in a good shockproof watch).
9. TRUE—The strands for all counts.
10. TRUE—There are no restrictions regarding who may call himself a jeweler. Qualifications consist of training or operating a store. Although there are many qualified jewelers of unquestionable ethics who are not members of the American Gem Society, you can be sure of the integrity of those who are members.

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
