## Use Strawberry For Cool Dessert

Looking for an exciting summer dessert? Then here's a cool answer. It's good nutrition, too, for containing protein, calcium and riboflavin.

### Quick Strawberry Alaska Serves 4

One quart strawberry ice cream (bulk), 6 large size cup cakes, 3 egg whites, 6 tablespoons sugar, 1 teaspoon lemon juice, 1/4 cup strawberry jam.

Place ice cream in freezing compartment of refrigerator until ready for use. Cut the centers from the cup cakes, leaving a hollow large enough for a scoop of ice cream. Reserve the centers for another dessert. Beat egg whites until stiff enough to stand in peaks. Fold in sugar a tablespoon at a time, beating after each addition. Add lemon juice.

Just before serving, place the cup cakes on a bread board. Put a teaspoon of jam in hollow of each cake and top with ice cream. Completely cover the ice cream and cake with a thick layer of meringue. Bake in preheated oven (450 degrees F.) for 5 minutes. Place on serving plates and serve immediately.

To use leftover cup cake centers: Cut cake into cubes and toast in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for about 10 minutes or until golden brown. Place on serving dishes and top with pistachio ice cream and crushed sweetened berries.

With the berry season in full swing, it's only sensible to take advantage of this year's luscious crop for some really mouth-watering desserts. Here's another one which utilizes ripe, red raspberries.

(Make about 1 to 2 dozen Cookies)

**COOKIES:** one-quarter cup butter, 7 cup powdered sugar, 1/4 cup milk, 1 cup cake flour, sifted, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract.

Cream butter add sugar gradually. Stir in milk a little at a time. Add flour and vanilla extract. Spread very thin with bread-long-bladed knife on well-buttered inverted dripping pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) until delicately browned (about 10 to 12 minutes.)

Remove from oven and quickly cut into 3-inch squares. Roll in the shape of a cornucopia. If cookies become too crisp to roll return to oven to soften. It is important to work quickly to get the best results.

Filling: 1 pint heavy cream (whipped) 1 cup raspberries crushed 1/4 cup powdered sugar. Mix whipped cream sugar and raspberries. Fill cooled cookies with raspberry whipped cream mixture.

## U.S. Contracts For Air Supply Job To Far East

WASHINGTON (AP)—The defense department has contracted with seven airlines to make special flights hauling men and supplies to the far east. The flights will be in addition to the regular operations of the Military Air Transport service.

The department declined to say how many planes will be used, how many passengers or how much material will be shipped, or exactly where they are going.

The charter arrangements were described as similar to the contracts under which scheduled and non-scheduled air transport companies carried men and material to England and Germany in support of the Berlin air lift. The special operations will be carried out within the next few weeks, the department said.

The contracts are with Pan American World Airways, North West airlines, United airlines, Transocean air lines, Seaboard and Western air lines, the Flying Tigers and Overseas National airlines. In addition, the department said, other airlines will supply planes through sub-contracts.

A defense spokesman said the charter planes will use both the central route by way of Hawaii and the northern great circle route—the shortest course—through Alaska and the Aleutians.

This means the air force will continue operations of Shemya air base near the western tip of the Aleutians and at least one other air field needed for refueling and as alternate landing fields on the long trans-Pacific haul.

## Ancient Auto Winner Of Vintage Of 1905

The "ancient model motor vehicle entered in the Sutherland Timber Days celebration event is owned by Mr. and Mrs. T. W. Davis. Davis is motor truck sales manager for Sig Fett.

The Davis' won the \$100 prize, when the car was entered in the July 3 old-car race. The auto buggy was also entered in the July 4 street parade.

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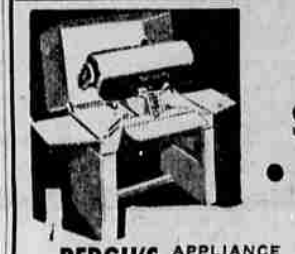
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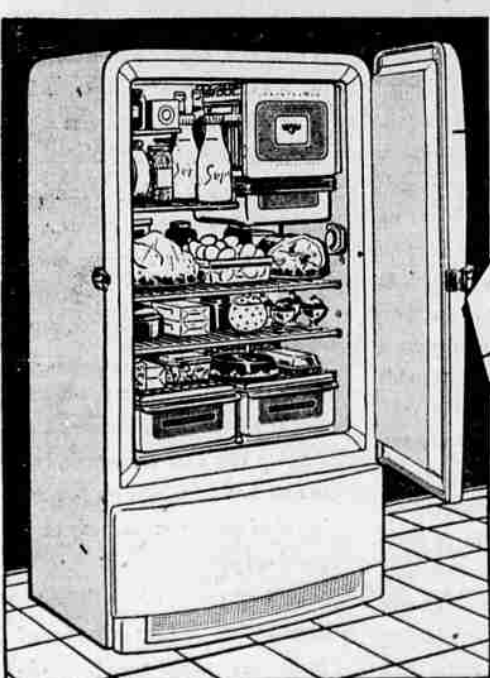
