R. L. Jones of Yamhill has accepted employment at Martin Box and is making his home with Velvie Jones, a brother.

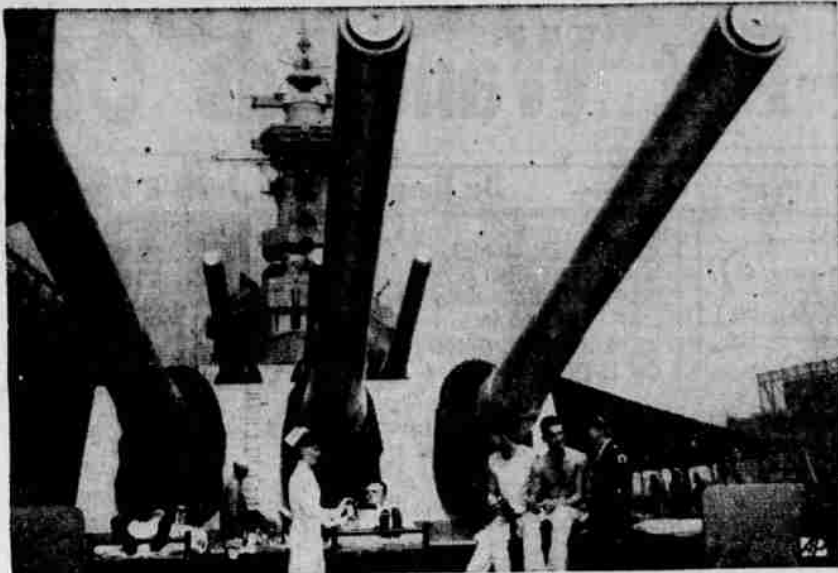
Dick Rone, Sherman Smith and Louie Smith enjoyed the 4th of July holidays at Paulina lake fishing.

HOME BUYERS GET BREAKS

CHICAGO — (AP) — If you don't think it's easy to buy a home today, consider Grandpa's day. The United States Savings & Loans League, citing current interest rates of 4 to 5 percent — 4 percent for veterans — points out that in 1900 the typical rate was 8 to 10 percent.

From 1900 to 1925 the usual mortgage expired in one to five years. Today terms run 15 to 20 years and in some cases 25 to 30 years. In the old days the borrower was expected to pay the full principal of the debt on the expiration date. Today principal and interest are paid off in equal monthly installments.

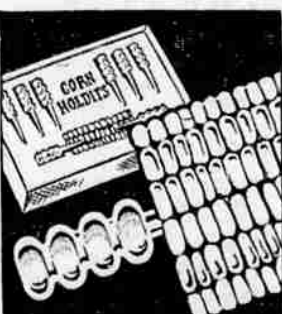
Carnation Creamed Tuna
