Canyonville Acts On School Affairs

Glen White, newly elected director, was sworn in at the Canyonville school district 8 meeting, July 8. Mrs. Kathryn E. Baird was hired as school clerk to take the place of Mrs. Marian Lamm, who resigned.

The problems of the new highway location in the vicinity of the school and possible acquisition of land for school use were discussed. John Bingham, board member, advised that a meeting of the highway engineers with the city council is scheduled soon. It was suggested that members of the board be present.

The board arranged for repair of cabinet drawers in the new class room. Bills in the amount of \$1,581.62 were approved. The securing of a bus driver for the coming year was discussed.

Bids On Reedsport Substation Opened

The Bonneville Power administration opened bids in Portland Monday for the construction of the Reedsport substation. The following bids were received:

The Electric company, Port Angeles, Washington, \$23,321; Mike B. Porter, Salem, Oregon, \$23,782; C. T. Malcom Co., Portland, Oregon, \$25,794; Olson Electric Co., Vancouver, Washington, \$26,129; Howard Halvorson, Portland, Oregon, \$33,372; and M. A. Pihoud, Vancouver, Washington, \$38,948.

All bids are under study prior to making of the award. Upon the completion of the work proposed under this construction contract, BPA utility crews will install the 6,000 kva substation transformer on a schedule that will permit completion of the Reedsport substation during October.

Beverage Distribution Started In Douglas

Fullerton Beverage Co., located north of Winston, has begun distribution of "Grapette" in Douglas county.

The announcement was made by Bill Cornie of the parent Grapette company of Camden, Ark. Cornie is here assisting Fullerton's in placing the popular beverage on the market locally.

Fullerton's will bottle "Grapette" in its plant. In the past it has been distributed out of Eugene.

Cornie said Grapette has almost complete national distribution, and impressive foreign coverage, including Alaska, and Central and South American countries.

Registrants Must Tell Draft Board Of New Address

Calls received at Oregon state headquarters, selective service system indicate there is a great lack of understanding by the general public that the selective service act requires registrants to keep their addresses on a current basis with their local board. It was reported by Colonel Francis W. Mason, deputy state director.

"The responsibility for keeping his local board advised as to his current address lies entirely with the registrant," said Colonel Mason; "the local board depends on him for this information and if a registrant, subject to call, cannot be located because he has failed to advise of his whereabouts, he immediately becomes a delinquent."

"All delinquents" continued Colonel Mason, "are reported to the United States attorney, who turns their cases over to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for handling."

Penalties under the selective service act, pointed out Colonel Mason, are very severe - carrying a maximum of five years imprisonment or a fine of \$10,000 or both the imprisonment and fine.

Registrants who have filed their questionnaires" concluded Colonel Mason, "must not only advise their local board of their current address but also of any change in marital or employment status that occurs subsequently. Prior to filing the questionnaire the major requirement is in keeping the board advised of any change in address."

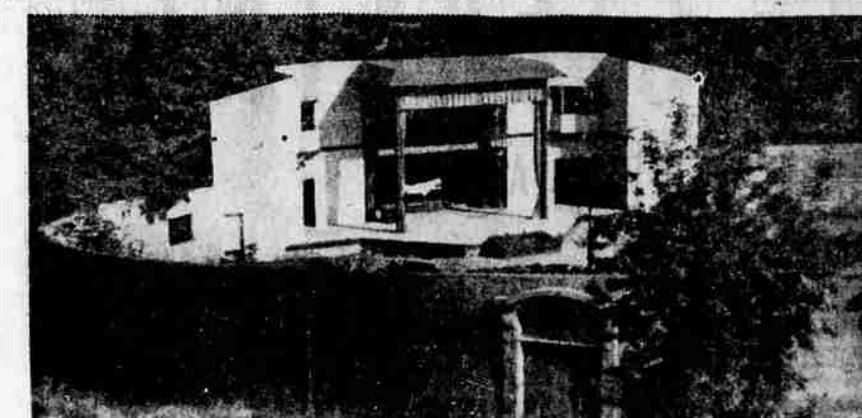
Divorced Man Slays Former Wife And Self

The coroner said witnesses to the shooting told him that Don Foley, 48, shot Mrs. Margaret Foley, 45, twice as she left St. John's hospital where she was employed.
