Group Urges Set-Aside Of Excise Tax Cut Bill

WASHINGTON—The Commerce and Industries association of New York City has urged Congress to put aside the \$1,010,000,000 excise tax-cutting bill "until the world situation is clarified." Donald E. Chafey, speaking for the organization which he said represents 4,000 New York City businesses of all types, told the Senate Finance committee: "Although the association consistently has advocated elimination or reduction of excise taxes, it realizes that if full-scale war should break out in Korea or other troubled areas, an increase in taxes will be required."
