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Protein Needed In Salad Meals

A large salad for lunch on a hot day may be all you want. However, your body needs some protein despite the weather. That's why many chefs in famous restaurants add strips of cheese to their salads. The cheese, rich in protein, turns the refreshing salad bowl into a one dish hot day meal.

Sour cream, another dairy food growing steadily in popularity, makes a refreshing salad dressing. Try these two recipes together and stay cool and well fed at the same time.

Cheese Vegetable Salad

(Serves 6)
One-half pound American cheese, 1 package frozen peas, cooked, 10 to 12 black olives, 6 stalks celery, 3 green pepper rings, 1 bunch radishes, lettuce leaves.
Cut cheese into strips about 1/4 inch wide. Arrange lettuce leaves in bottom of a red or yellow glass bowl. Place olives in the center of the dish. Spoon cooked peas on each of three sides. Slip cheese strips through green pepper rings and place between the mounds of peas. Place the celery stalks and radishes in remaining corners. Serve with sour cream dressing and tall glasses of cold milk.

Sour Cream Dressing

(Makes about 1 cup dressing)
One cup sour cream, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 tablespoon prepared mustard, teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon lemon juice.
Combine sour cream, sugar, mustard and salt. Slowly stir in lemon juice. Serve with cheese vegetable salad.
