Husband To Pay Tax To Free His Wife From Jail

TOLLAND, Mass., July 15 —(AP)—Homer Fargo isn't going to let his wife stay in jail another day for alleged non-payment of an automobile excise tax.

She's been there since last Friday on the town of Sandisfield's claim that she didn't pay the tax. She contends she paid it to her home town — Tolland.

Tax Commissioner Henry F. Long ruled that it should have been paid to Sandisfield as the car was garaged there.

Fargo, 65, said he is going to pay \$37 today to gain her freedom even though she's willing to stay in jail a year if she has to.

"I told her 'no, sir' you are not going to stay in jail a year," Fargo said. "I told her if Mr. Long is dictator enough to keep her in jail with out a hearing, what's the use of her staying."

"I told my wife she's sacrificed enough for the state and if the people of Massachusetts won't take action to help, I'm not going to let her make any more sacrifices."

A court battle, he said, would be too costly.

Long said Mrs. Fargo was "trying to upset the whole machinery of the tax laws" and that she had been engaged "in a running fight for some time with the Sandisfield tax collector."

He explained that motor vehicles are subject to taxation in the community in which they are garaged.

Ammunition Barges At British Port Blow Up

GOSPORT, Eng., July 15 —(AP)—Nine ammunition barges and part of a munitions train blew up at night in a series of blasts which rocked Portsmouth naval base and started a harbor blaze.

Thirty persons were reported injured in the blasts which showered live shells over a quarter-mile area and shattered windows two miles away.

There was no indication as to what caused the blasts, but the admiralty said sabotage seemed unlikely.

IN STEEL BARREL

Sixth Person Ready To Brave Niagara Falls

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., July 15 —(AP)—(AP)—Lloyd Hill made his last preparations today for a plunge over Niagara Falls in an 11-foot-long steel barrel.

The 32-year-old Canadian veteran of War World II plans to shove off from an undisclosed point above the Canadian, or Horseshoe falls shortly after 1 p.m. (EST), tomorrow.

If he does, he will be going against the advice of Jean Lussier of Niagara Falls, N. Y., who made the trip in 1928 in a huge rubber ball.

Lussier took one look at Hill's barrel and remarked: "I wouldn't try it in that for \$50,000."

"There won't be anything to it," the riverman declared. "I've already made several appointments for next week and, after all, I'll have to keep them."

Five persons have taken the plunge over the Horseshoe falls. Two besides Lussier lived to tell about it.

Knudtson's Ad Gains National Recognition

National recognition of an advertisement of Knudtson's jewelry is given in the July issue of *Guilds*, published by the American Gem society, Los Angeles, Calif.

The publication calls attention to an advertisement of Knudtson's in which a "handsome engraving of a prehistoric scene is the illustration for one of a series of unusual advertisements" which appeared in the *News-Review*.

G., his gifted son, Alan, who engraves the plates for the ads and writes the copy, and his son, Jim, who is in charge of the watch-repairing department, are to be congratulated for having designed a dynamic and distinctive style of ad which is practically a trademark," states the *Guilds* article.

The ad referred to was illustrated by the engraving of a prehistoric scene, which showed the earth erupting in violence and enormous animals long extinct.

The headlines pointed out that diamonds are more than ten million years old. The copy elaborates on the theme by explaining that, on the day your diamond was formed the earth was still in its early stages of development; the Grand canyon was little more than a creek and many of today's mountains were barely a bulge on the surface of the ground. This leads to the discussion of the durability of this gem, and of the enduring love for which it is the symbol, the article points out.

All member organizations of the American Gem society must submit copies of all their advertising for study and criticism.

Judgments Awarded In Three Money Actions

NEW YORK, July 15 —(AP)—Three women and a man circulating the Communist-sponsored world peace petition were arrested yesterday after arguments started in a crowd of several hundred near Union square.

They were booked on charges of disorderly conduct, causing a crowd to collect, and refusing to move on police orders.

All pleaded innocent. One was paroled and the others held in \$500 bail.

The petition bore the name of the "Campaign Committee for World Peace Appeal," police said. The World Peace Appeal is circulating an American version of the Communist-sponsored "S to L" petition, supported by the Soviet union.
