Recruiter Dated For Coast Guard

The following ratings are open for ex-navy and ex-coast guardsmen who have held the ratings previously: electronics technicians first, second and third petty officer; radioman, second and third; fire controlman and sonarman for first, second and third class petty officer ratings.

Gerald Macomber May Get Long Prison Term

MEDFORD —(P)—Two charges of assault with intent to kill have been filed against Gerald Macomber, 27, wounded last Thursday and captured in a gun battle with state police.

District attorney George Nielson filed the two new charges that stemmed from an earlier gunfight involving two city policemen. Macomber was captured after exchanging shots with state policeman Dick Korner, who was wounded slightly.

Nielson said Wilma May Nichols, at whose home Macomber was arrested, had been charged with being an accessory in the commission of a felony. Her bond was set at \$10,000.

The district attorney said if Macomber was convicted of assault, he would charge the ex-convict with being an habitual criminal. Conviction on the latter charge would result in a long term in prison.

Atomic Bomb Use Condemned By Churches' Council

TORONTO —(P)—Leaders of the world's largest body of Protestant and orthodox church members have approved United Nations military action in Korea but condemned any use of atomic or bacteriological weapons.

Representing 160,000,000 church adherents in 44 countries, the policy-making central committee of the World Council of churches adopted a resolution urging also that a "just settlement" in Korea be sought through negotiation and conciliation.

With only two dissenting votes, the 90-member committee agreed: "Armed attack as an instrument of national policy is wrong. We therefore commend the United Nations, an instrument of world order, for its prompt decision to meet this aggression and for authorizing a police measure which every member nation should support."

At the same time, governments must press individually and through the United Nations for a just settlement by negotiation and conciliation.

As a general principle applicable to the Korean situation, the committee unanimously endorsed this statement:

"Such methods of modern warfare as the use of atomic and bacteriological weapons and obliteration bombing involve employment of force and a destruction of life on so terrible a scale as to imperil the very basis on which law and civilization can exist."

"It is imperative that they be banned by international agreement and we welcome every sincere proposal to this end."

OSC Bulletin Wins First At National ASAE Meet

The first place blue ribbon award in the national bulletin competition of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers was won this year by a publication of the Oregon State college agricultural experiment station.

The prize publication, "A Home Freezer You Can Build," was written by Myron G. Cropsey, associate agricultural engineer.

Announcement of the award was made at the annual national meeting of the ASAE in Washington, D.C. last month. J. B. Rodgers, head of the agricultural engineering department, was present at the sessions when the award was made. Entered in competition were bulletins from the various departments of agricultural engineering of the nation.

The home freezer described in the publication was designed by Cropsey to meet the needs of rural families. Easy and inexpensive to build, the 14 cubic-foot freezer has front-opening doors that make it easy to put in and take out food. It may be placed on a floor cabinet to bring the freezer doors up to working height. Steps involved in the construction of the freezer are outlined and illustrated.

Ralph E. Karcher Passes Away

Ralph E. Karcher, 58, well known resident of Roseburg, died suddenly at his home at 1635 Brown Ave., Sunday evening.

He was born Oct. 30, 1891, in Butte, Mont., and came to Roseburg with his parents about 53 years ago. He was married to Ruth Ellison at Gold Beach March 5, 1937.

He was employed as shop foreman for the U. S. Forest service in Roseburg for the last ten years. Prior to that, he was associated in the Lawson and Karcher garage in Roseburg for a number of years.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of Long and Orr mortuary Thursday, July 20 at 11 a.m., with the Rev. Willis F. Erickson of Faith Lutheran church, officiating. Concluding services will be conducted by Umpqua post 16, American Legion, at the IOOF cemetery at Oakland, where vault interment is to take place.

Russian Using Korea To Test U.S. Strength, Theory

WASHINGTON —(P)—Russia may be trying to lure the United States into so great a military effort in Korea that could be helpless to challenge large-scale aggression elsewhere.

Illustrating this is a question posed for President Truman at a news conference and his cautious reply.

He was asked, "Are we prepared to resist aggression everywhere in the world?"

His reply was that the situation would have to be met as it developed.

Military leaders at the Pentagon attach importance to persistent rumors of concentration of Chinese Communist forces and the enrollment of Russian volunteers for the aid of the North Korean Communist army.

But this foreign-power help may not be thrown suddenly into the war to crush South Koreans and drive American forces out of Korea for a quick victory. Instead, the Moscow-dictated strategy may be to feed the help in gradually, always maintaining superiority in force—and compelling the United States to put more and more divisions, planes and warships into the campaign.

Meanwhile in these early months of the war, the Korean campaign will afford Russia opportunity to measure the battle-skill of American troops, airmen and sailors—and equally important—the effectiveness of American weapons.

It can also provide an index for the Russians to decide how determined and how prepared the United States is to fight at a point where Moscow pushes the remote-control button of war.



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
