

'Rabbit' Ball Batters Pitchers In Majors; Phillies Drop To Second In National Loop

About that lively ball, now, here's the dope right from the Sunday box scores: The appalling one-day total — 37 home runs, 337 base hits, 188 runs; 65 beat up pitchers in 15 games.

Rabbit? Better make it kangaroo. No bunny can jump that high, that often.

Out in Pittsburgh a little guy named Ted Beard who hit .277 for Indianapolis last year, hit one over the right field stands. Nobody had done that since Babe Ruth in 1935.

Walt Dropo, man-mountain Boston Red Sox rookie lashed three home runs and two doubles in a doubleheader. Duke Snider of Brooklyn went 3 for 5 against the St. Louis Cardinals. One of the Duke's hits was a homer.

The New York Giants and Cincinnati slashed away at one another for a total of 58 hits including 12 homers in a long, weary afternoon.

No less than 53 hits splattered off the walls of Fenway Park where Cleveland and the Boston Red Sox divided a doubleheader. Down in Washington, Bucky Harris sent six pitchers, single file, after the Browns. He barely got them out before dark.

Records Broken

Latest returns, with all districts reporting, show a couple of new marks for the record books. The National league homer total of 25 was the most ever hit in that league in one afternoon. The old mark of 24 was set Decoratin day when the two majors hung up a 40-total. They also hammered out 333 hits May 30 but that's no longer tops.

By some peculiar combination of events there was one shutout. But Walt Dubiel of the Cubs kept in tune with the times by making it a perilous nine-hitter.

Dubiel's shutout was a bitter blow to the Philadelphia Phillies. Barely escaping St. Louis Saturday in a first-place tie, the Phillies dropped two to the Cubs and fell into second place. Dubiel did his stuff in the 8-0 first game when the Cubs chased Russ Meyer with six runs in the seventh inning. In the second game, the Cubs ended rookie Bob Miller's eight-game win streak with a 10-3 wallop. Seven runs in the fifth doomed Miller, a Phil bonus kid.

Rookie Costs Home

Brooklyn pounded four Cardinal pitchers for 19 hits, 10-2, as rookie Chris Van Cuyk coasted home in his major league debut. The young Dodger lefty, just up from Fort Worth of the Texas league, allowed seven hits and struck out seven. Despite the loss, the Cards held first place by a half game. Boston missed a chance to close in on the leaders by losing the second game to Pittsburgh, 6-5, after taking the opener, 9-5, for Vern Bickford's 10th win. A flurry

A's whipped Art Houtteman, 5-2, in the first.

Just when the Yanks were ready to move in on the Tigers, Bob Cain, a 1950 New York Hoodoo, stopped them. Cain, who owns only of homers including two by Gus Bell and one each by Earl Turner and Beards, brought reliever Hank Borowy his first victory of the season in the second game.

Hank Thompson's error on Bobby Usher's grounder with the bases loaded in the 12th gave Cincinnati an 11-10 win over the Giants and a clean sweep of the home run battles. The Reds took the opener, 16-4, with Ted Kuszewski hitting two homers and Johnny Pramesa, Grady Hatton and Lloyd Merriman one each.

Americans Split

Everybody split in the American league, leaving Detroit with its four-game lead over the New York Yankees.

Homers by George Kell, Hoot Evers and Jerry Priddy enabled the Tigers to take a second game from Philadelphia, 7-6, after the

six wins, beat the Yanks for the third time, 5-2, in the second game. Gene Woodling's two-run double won the first 2-1, for Vic Raschi over Billy Pierce.

Dropo hit two homers in Boston's 13-10 opening victory over Cleveland and added another, No. 22, in the second game which the Sox lost, 8-4.

Sid Hudson limited St. Louis to seven hits for a 5-1 Washington victory in the first game but six Senators couldn't stop the Browns, who earned an even break with a 10-8 verdict, in the nightcap.

Catcher Frank McMillan, with a single, double and home run, led the Eugene Larks to a 10-6 victory over Medford.

Pittsburg's Diamonds and Reno Silver Sox split. The Diamonds took the opener, 2-0, to give pitcher Joe Angel his third straight shutout. He yielded only four hits in winning his seventh game.

Reno bounced back in the finale to win 8-5 to snap a three-game winning streak of the Diamonds.

The cellar dwelling Willows Cardinals got some company by beating the Marysville Peaches twice, 6-5 and 7-4. The twin loss dropped Marysville into a tie for last place.

Bob Ferrari hit a two-run homer for the winners in the second game.
