The recommended improvements would place the city in a class five insurance rating, which would lower insurance rates paid in the city. The chief explained the fire rating point system. On its basis, Roseburg rates about 50 percent.

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Bank Sues Logging Co. On Promissory Note

The United States National bank, Roseburg branch, has filed suit in circuit court against the Irvin Logging Co., Inc., to collect \$31,912.48 as a balance alleged due on a promissory note.

Other defendants named are R. L. and Moda Whipple, William A. and Naomi E. Oerding, who, with the Irvin Logging Co., signed an indenture mortgage on specified real and personal property.

Named with the above as a defendant is Oregon Truck sales as guarantor of the promissory note.

The State Industrial Accident commission has also been named as a defendant as holder of a prior claim on personal property specified. The plaintiff asks that this claim be made inferior to the right, title, and lien of the plaintiff.

Aldridge Death Hearing Is Held At Elkton

A hearing on the recent accidental death of Frederick Aldridge was held Monday, July 17, at Elkton before Robert M. Evenden, a representative of the State Industrial Accident commission. The hearing was called to establish all pertinent facts in connection with the fatal accident. The employers, Binder Brothers Logging company, is a subject firm covered through acceptance of the Workmen's Compensation act which is administered by the Industrial Accident commission.

The hearing elicited testimony of all eye-witnesses or other persons who had knowledge of the accident to determine what situations, actions, or other circumstances may have contributed to the death. This determination of cause is essential to the prevention of like accidents in the future.

A record of the proceedings will be filed in Salem. Some of the facts will be used in the educational, instructional, and remedial program of the accident prevention division to prevent similar accidents.

They said: "Discussion of classified material, reception rooms and public places is dangerous."

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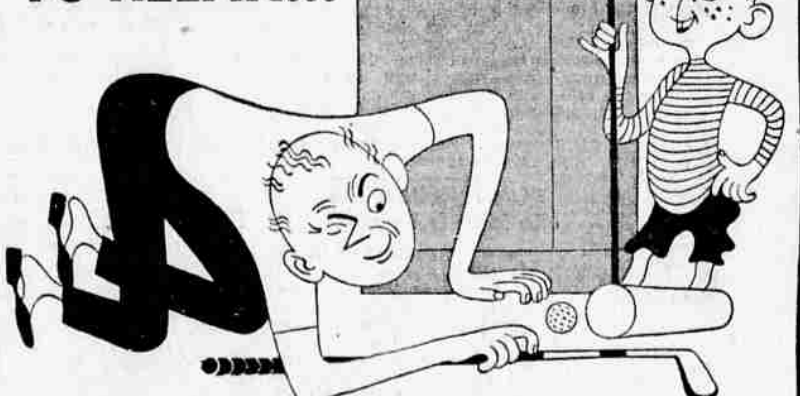
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
