

CHIEFS LOSE

Errors, Freak Triple Give Reedsport 3-2 Tourney Win

Lady Luck and a couple of Roseburg errors combined to help Reedsport edge the Umpqua Chiefs, 3-2, last night in the first round play of the Oregon State Semi-Pro Baseball tournament at Silverton.

Errors by Virg Sanders and George Sanders in the first and a freak triple by Reedsport's Hanauka told the story of the ball game.

The statistics were all in favor of Roseburg — all but the final score. The Chiefs rapped out seven hits to Reedsport's three. Sporer struck out four while none of the Chiefs fanned. Twenty-nine Chiefs

Tricky Triple

Then in the fifth Reedsport's relief hurler Bill Hanauka got the hit that broke the Chiefs' back. It was an average fly to right fielder Dick DeBernardi, who was standing under it to make the catch. As the ball came down, however, it hit an electric wire and flipped out of DeBernardi's reach allowing Hanauka to reach third. Umpire Fleskes ruled him safe according to ground rules. With Hanauka on third, center fielder Pete Goodbrod hit a single to right to push across the winning run.

Roseburg threatened for the last time in the sixth. With two outs, Stan Aune playing his first time as a center fielder hit a single and scored on Norval Ritchey's rebounding triple, but DeBernardi grounded out to the pitcher to retire the side.

Team Manager Sargent made a surprising change in the lineup in the sixth. He moved Baker from second to short, George Sanders to left field from short, and Smith, who didn't go in until the fourth, to second.

Since it is a double elimination tournament, the chiefs will play again Tuesday against an opponent as yet unnamed.

Swim Marks Fall In AAU Outdoor Tilt

SEATTLE, July 22 (AP) — Two swimming stars out of New Haven, Conn., played rough with the records yesterday and one of them — sturdy John Marshall — showed a clean pair of heels to the hope of Hawaii, young Ford Konno.

Marshall, the human equivalent of a battle cruiser, bettered the world and American marks when he went the mile in 20 minutes, 8.5 seconds in the A.A.U. Men's Outdoor Swim championships.

His teammate in the New Haven Swim club, Jimmy McLane, bettered by two-tenths of a second the American record of 2:10.7 chalked up in 1942 by Bill Smith of Hawaii for the 220-yard freestyle.

"atching the record-breaking fever, the Cincinnati trio of Dick Fetterman, C. Sohl and Dick Thomas, twice bettered the recognized American mark of 3:22 for the 330-yard medley relay. They backstroked, breaststroked and freestyled the distance in 3:18.7 in the preliminary and won the finals in 3:19.4. The Chicago Town club held the old record.

New Dive Champ
Wiry Joe Marino of Columbus, Ohio, scored a mild upset by dethroning Skippy Browning of the University of Texas as three-meter diving champion. Browning led the afternoon but got off to a slow start in the finals and never could catch Marino.

Ahead of his Thursday timing all the way, Marshall also was ahead of the 17-year-old Konno for the full route, finally winning by some 15 yards. Konno was timed in 20:17.8, also bettering Nakama's record for the second straight day.

McLane anchored the New Haven team in the medley but had to be content with third behind the well balanced Cincinnati threesome and a trio from the University of Iowa at Iowa City, Hawaii's H. Athletic club was fourth.

Up for grabs today are titles in the 100-yard freestyle, 110-yard backstroke, 220-yard breaststroke and 880-yard relay.

Revived Mize Leads Yanks' Pennant Bid

Johnny Mize, who terrorized National league pitching for so many years, is blasting away as of old for the New York Yankees in their American league pennant bid.

Big Jawn, who a short while ago was on the brink of drawing his release, has hit a fantastic .367 for his last four games. He began to purr against St. Louis Tuesday, and has banged out 13 hits in 15 trips — including five home runs — since then.

Mize ascended the heights of his comeback last night as he belted out two homers, a pair of singles and drove in five runs to lead the Yanks to a smashing 14-5 victory over the pace-setting Detroit Tigers in the opener of a vital three-game series at Yankee stadium.

The pennant race in the National league also tightened up as the Philadelphia Phils tied the St. Louis Cardinals for the lead.

The Phils, behind the eight-hit pitching of rookie Bubba Church, beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 4-1. Eddie Waitkus scored three of the victors' runs and Dick Sisler drove home two. Ralph Kiner accounted for Pittsburgh's run with his 28th homer in the eighth inning.

St. Louis dropped a 5-4, 11-inning decision to the New York Giants. An error by Eddie Miller allowed Alvin Dark to score from third with the winning run. Stan Musial sent the game into overtime with a two out homer in the seventh, his 12th, off Sal Maglie, who went the distance for the Giants. Cloyd Boyer went all the way for the Cards.

The third place Boston Braves remained a game off the pace by dropping a 4-3, 13-inning game to the Chicago Cubs. Bill Serena singled home Andy Pafko from second with the payoff run, snooling Johnny Sain's bid for his 13th victory.

Brooklyn's fourth-place Dodgers moved to within two games of the co-leaders by trouncing the Cincinnati Reds, 7-1. Veteran Preacher Roe tamed the Redlegs on eight hits to pick up his 12th victory.

Little Con Marrero prevented Cleveland from gaining ground in the American League chase as he pitched the Washington Senators to a 3-2 victory over the third-place Indians.

Boston's powerful Red Sox pounded the St. Louis Browns into the dust, 7-4, and the Philadelphia Athletics edged the Chicago White Sox, 7-6, in 10 innings.

Wilson Fails In Pitching Record Try

With the pressure off after failing to notch his 16th straight Pacific Coast league pitching victory, Seattle's Jim Wilson feels much lighter about the head and shoulders today.

While hard luck and a ninth inning squeeze play jinxed Wilson in his 4 to 3 setback at Hollywood last night, Mickey Rocco and Eddie Malone found occasion to fist each other during the Portland-Oakland game. Umpire Pat Orr had to ask them to leave.

Portland won, 9 to 8, in a home run orgy surpassed in freakishness only by the affair at Hollywood. Wilson experienced enough tough breaks in that one to last him another 28 years.

He was trying to tie the 41-year-old PCL pitching record of 16 victories in a row. He tried too hard. In the last of the ninth, Eddie Sauer tripled Hollywood's tying run across and then scored with the clincher on Gene Handley's squeeze bunt.

In the Portland scrap, Joe Brovia and Luis Marquez of the Beavers each hit three runs homers and Dick Wakefield slammed one for the Oaks with two on. Doubles fell all over the place. In a wild Portland seventh, pinch hitter Hillis Layne batted twice—and reached first both times on errors.

The fight? It seems that Malone, the Oakland catcher, accused Rocco of using a doctored bat, and honor by way of a punch to the Malone jaw.

Elsewhere along the circuit, Sacramento beat Los Angeles, 3 to 1, as massive Matt Surkont posted his 15th win of the year, and San Diego walloned San Francisco, 13 to 5, in a 16 hit assault.

Surkont became the first hurler to pass the 200 inning mark.

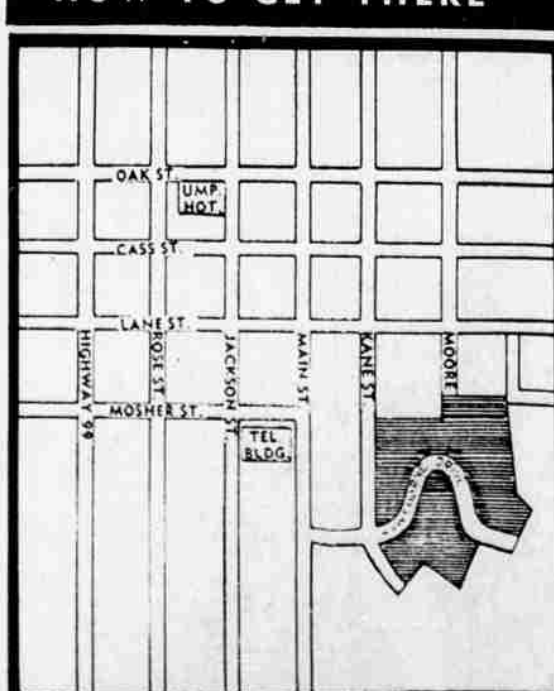
