

Heads Hired For 3 Departments Of New Hospital

J. W. McAlvin, Douglas Community hospital manager, announced today he has secured three department heads who will report here prior to the opening of the hospital, tentatively set for Oct. 15.

They are Mrs. Mary Angelo, who has accepted the position of director of nurses. She will come to Roseburg from Goldendale, Wash., where she held the same position in the Klickitat Valley hospital. Previous to that she was a member of the staff of instructors in the clinical division at the University of Oregon training school for nurses in Portland. She also was a nurse and superintendent at the Multnomah county hospital. A graduate of the University of Oregon school of nursing, she also received her bachelor of science degree in nursing procedure.

Mrs. Angelo will report for duty during the month of October, to interview prospective nurses, nurses' aides and practical nurses to be hired in the Douglas Community hospital, said McAlvin.

Mrs. Monte Ashby of Roseburg has been employed as dietitian. Previous to moving to Roseburg she was employed by the Eugene clinic and hospital as dietitian, where she served one year. She is a graduate of Oregon State college. She then went to Lincoln, Neb., and took additional work in dietetics. While there she worked in the dietetics department at the university hospital in Lincoln.

Richard Carlos Webber has been employed as X-ray technician. Webber, who is 22 and married, is a graduate of Ann Arbor, Mich., at the University of Michigan hospital at Ann Arbor, completing his course in 1949. He has continued the school's hospital as X-ray technician since that time. He will take all X-rays here and assist the radiologist in therapy treatment. He will report here about Oct. 15.

U.S. Official Victim Of Tragedy In Alaska

WRANGELL, Alaska, July 24 —(AP)—An inquest will be held tomorrow into the death of Richard J. Suratt, 55, whose body was found in his home Saturday by his wife.

He had been U.S. commissioner here since 1936.

U. S. Marshal Jack Kreeps said Suratt apparently slipped and fell on a machete. The large-bladed knife was found on the ground where Suratt had been clearing brush. A trail of blood led into the house.

Suratt came to Alaska more than 30 years ago as a wireless operator.

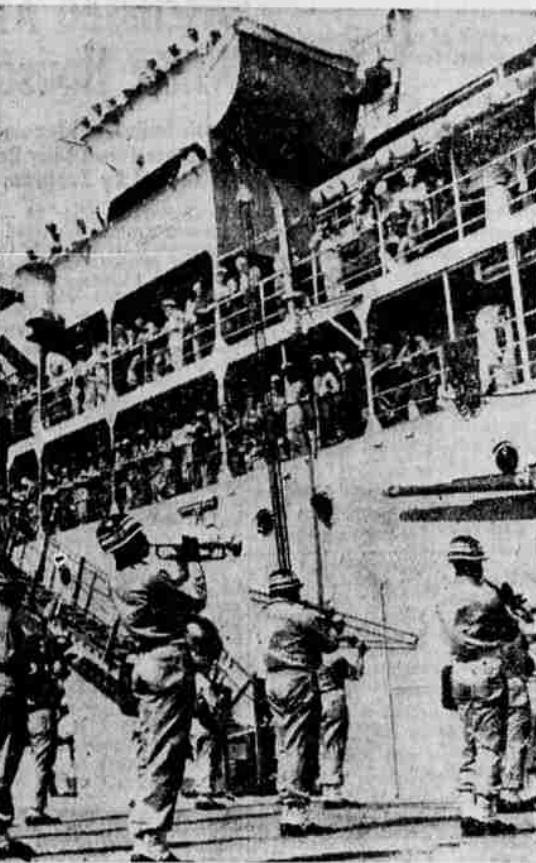

Negress Held For Torso Slaying Of Neighbor

RICHMOND, Va., July 24 —(AP)—Police held a 42-year-old Negro woman today on a charge of murder in the bloody torso slaying of one of her next-door neighbors.

Henrico county authorities said Mamie Granton, a washerwoman, had confessed she bashed Matt Farrar, 40, over the head with an axe, hacked off his arms and legs, and buried his torso in an outbuilding near her home.

Farrar's arms and legs were found Wednesday near a pigsty in a small Negro community just east of here. The torso was dug from the outbuilding Saturday night. Farrar also was a Negro.

Police Capt. W. J. Eacho said the woman told him she hit Farrar with the blunt edge of the axe when he "jumped at me" after following her home last Monday.

LEAVE CUT SHORT

John Elmer Brown, home on leave, has had his furlough cut short. He was ordered to report today at his base at Valejo, Calif. He was scheduled to have 24 days, but his time was cut to 10 days. Brown, the son of Mrs. E. M. Phelps of Roseburg, has been on destroyer patrol duty between Korea and Japan the last nine months. The Phelps moved to Roseburg about two months ago.

Pardon Denied Former Congressman Thomas

WASHINGTON, July 24 —(AP)—The U. S. Parole board today refused to parole former representative J. Parnell Thomas (R-NJ) who is serving six to 18 months on conviction of padding his congressional payroll.

As usual, the board gave no reason when announcing it had rejected Thomas' parole application.

Members noted, however, in response to inquiries, that in addition to his prison term, Thomas was also fined \$10,000 and that no arrangements for paying this have been made.

The former congressman made a direct appeal to President Truman several weeks ago for a presidential pardon which would cancel the remainder of his sentence and also delete the fine.

The President referred the appeal to the Justice department.

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Auto Items' Price Boosts Add To Industry's Worries

Fourth Strike In Year Hits Alaskan Projects

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, July 24 —(AP)—The fourth crippling strike of the year threatened vital construction projects here today. Members of the FAL Plumbers & Steamfitters, local 357, have voted overwhelmingly to go on strike Wednesday in support of wage and other contract demands.

The union is seeking a 50-cent hourly increase to \$3.50 with double time for all overtime in addition to board and room on all jobs outside the city limits. The master Plumbers' association has offered \$3.15.

Local construction work has been crippled earlier this year by strikes of the painters, electricians and carpenters' unions.

DRIVER EXAMS SLATED

A driver's license examiner will be on duty in Roseburg on Thursday and Friday, July 27 and 28, at the city hall between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., according to an announcement received from the secretary of state's office.

DETROIT —(AP)—Many of the auto industry's materials and sub-assemblies have advanced in price recently to add to its problems. This is true of numerous items besides tires and it makes remote the likelihood of any major reductions in new car prices for the near future.

More than a few industry sources had been expecting lower prices with the introduction of new models later this year.

Some informed sources say there not only will be no price reductions during the remainder of this year but add that increases are wholly possible.

The same sources say that some current refinements may have to be taken off forthcoming models if present price levels are to be maintained.

There hasn't been any complaint so far this year about anything having been left off new cars. Most car buyers have been so eager to get new cars that extra equipment has been easy to sell. Delivered prices, too, seem to have been of less importance than when the car could be made available.

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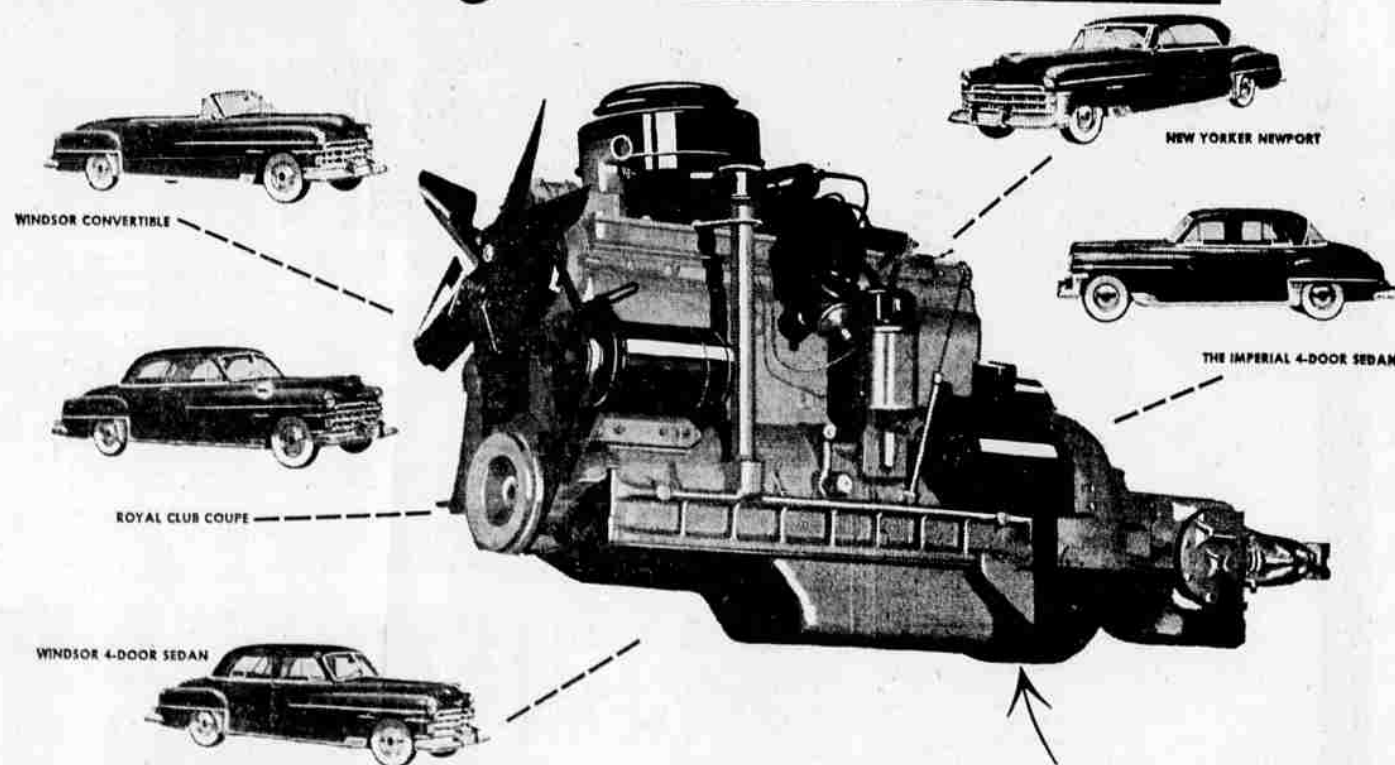
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
