Death Toll in Crash Of Army Plane Upped To 39
MYRTLE BEACH, S. C., July 25 — (AP) — Thirty-nine bodies have been recovered from the wreckage of an army air force transport plane that crashed near here Sunday, the air force reports.
First reports placed the death toll at 34—30 Tennessee air national guardsmen and four air reserve crewmen from Florida.

Possibility Of Global War Seen By Rep. Vinson

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Rep. Vinson (D-Ga.) said Tuesday "a global war is a real, distinct possibility at any time" and American forces must be built up for that possibility.

Vinson, chairman of the Armed Services committee, made the statement in a speech prepared for House delivery in support of a bill that would add a year to the service period of enlisted men now in the Armed Forces.

On the U.S. side of the military ledger, he said there are these assets:

"Governmentally, we are far stronger than our potential enemies... in any long term effort our system can outlast and surpass the dictated, regimented system of the Communists. Our industrial potential... is the envy of the world."

"Our seapower is vastly greater than that of Russia and her satellites. Our strategic air power is unmatched anywhere in the world. We are still far ahead in the atomic arms effort and will probably stay ahead for some years in the future."

history in alphabetical order. West of Jackson they are named for cities in alphabetical order. A limited number of present names, would be retained, such as Cass street, changed to Cass avenue; Jackson street to remain; Rose street to remain; Stephens street to remain, and possibly one or two others.

All other streets have been renamed and present names would not be reused. This is necessary, order that the confusion during the period of re-adjustment be a minimum and that after the new names have become generally accepted and familiar, those occasional, obsolete addresses would not cause mail deliveries to the wrong addressee.

The committee announced that it would not be adverse to accepting a suggested name change, other than that given for a definite street, so long as the change was in accord with the general pattern.

Man Who Hanged Nazis Is Reported Killed

WICHITA, Kas., July 25 — (AP) — M-Sgt. John C. Woods, the U. S. army non-com who hanged top Nazi war criminals in October, 1946, is dead, an uncle said. He said Woods still was in the army but the family did not know if he was killed in Korean combat.

Rube E. Woods, Sedgwick county court house custodian and an uncle of Woods, told reporters word of the death reached him in a telegram from the sergeant's brother-in-law, Enlue Chilcott of Boise, Idaho.

The sergeant's widow, Hazel Woods, at Boise said she had no information other than that her husband had been killed, and his body would be sent to Honolulu.

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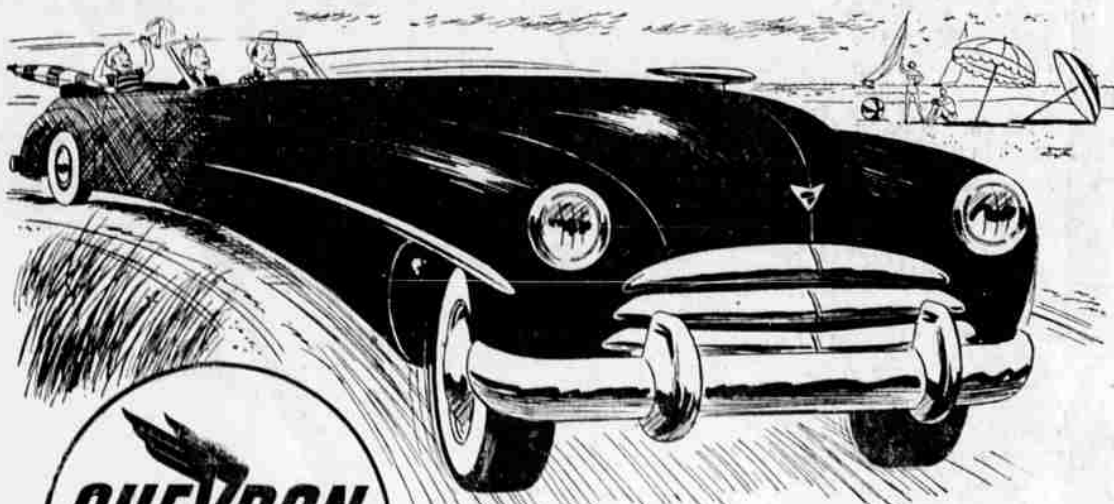
