Here's An Ideal Summer Dessert

Here's a pleasant summer picnic — an oblong heat-resistant glass utility dish filled with pineapple cherry cobbler. And on top of each individual cobbler goes a large scoop of bulk ice cream. Interested?

Pineapple Cherry Cobbler
a la Mode
(Serves 6)

One quart vanilla ice cream (bulk), 6 slices canned pineapple, 2 cups canned pitted sour cherries, drained; 1/2 cup chopped nut meats, 2 cups sifted flour, 1/4 cup sugar, 3 teaspoons baking powder, pinch of salt, 1/4 cup butter, 1/4 cup milk, 1 egg, beaten.

Sift flour, sugar, baking powder and salt together. Cut butter into flour mixture until particles are the size of small peas. Combine milk and beaten egg. Stir into flour mixture mixing just enough to dampen the dry ingredients. Pat dough out lightly on a floured board about 1/4-inch thick. Cut into 6 rounds with a 3-inch biscuit cutter.

Place rounds on top of cherries in approximately the same position as the pineapple slices. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for one hour. When serving, invert each serving so that the slices and cherries in a buttered 2-quart heat-resistant glass utility dish. Sprinkle with chopped nut meats.

Place ice cream in freezing compartment of the refrigerator until ready to use. Arrange pineapple biscuit on the bottom. Top with a large scoop of ice cream.

Apple Cheese Crisp

(Serves 5)

Five cups sliced apples, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1/2 cup grated Cheddar cheese, 2-3 cup sugar, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, 1 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup uncooked oatmeal, 1/4 cup butter. Arrange apple slices in a greased
