Couple Observes Golden Anniversary One-Dish Oven Meal Suggested

BY GAYNOR MADDOX NEA Staff Writer One-dish oven meals simplify summertime cooking. To make certain your one-dish meal has eoough nutritive value and flavor appeal, add cheese and milk to the other add cheese and milk to the oth ingredients. All dairy foods, no in abundant supply, are rich essential food values. Egoplant Parmesan (Serves 4)

Tomato Sauce: Four tablespoons butter. 1 onion chopped fine, 1/2 cup chopped celery, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley, 1 small bay leaf. 1/2 teaspoon thyme, 1/2 tablespoon flour, 1 tablespoon sugar, 4 cups complex. tomatoes, 1 can tomato paste (6 ounces), salt and pepper to taste 1 basil leaf.

Melt butter in skillet. Add onlon, celery, parsley, bayleaf, and thyme. Cook until onlon is transparent. Stir in flour and sugar and blend until smooth, Add tomatoes, tomato paste, salt, pepper and ba-sil leaf, Cook, tightly covered, for

60 minutes over low heat.

Eggplant: One large eggplant,
Peel eggplant. Slice in very thin
strips. Fry in butter until golden

To combine: Fried eggplant, ooked tomatoe sauce, slices of American cheese, grated Parme-

Place eggplant in glass casserole
dish alternately with layers of sliced cheese and tomato sauce. Top
generously with grated cheese.
Bake 15 to 20 minutes in moderate oven (375 degrees F.).


