Federal Land Bank Reports Biggest Year Of Business

SPOKANE — During the year ended June 30, 1950, more than 2,700 farmers and ranchers in the four northwest states obtained \$15,000,000 in loans from the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, Henry Matthews, president, reported.

"This is the largest single year's business placed on the books since 1935," Mr. Matthews said. "A large percentage of the loan funds were used by farmers to refinance, including the conversion of short-term loans to a long-term basis. Other uses were for construction of farm homes and buildings, improvement of farm land in accordance with soil conservation practices and the purchase of farms and machinery."

Mr. Matthews said agriculture, generally, in the four states continues in a healthy condition, as evidenced by the payment of some \$5,500,000 on loans now in effect. Furthermore, the Federal Land Bank currently enjoys the best financial condition in its history with relatively few delinquencies and no acquired real estate on hand.

According to Mr. Matthews, the bank's earnings during the past year were about three and one-half times the six percent (\$194,000) dividend paid on its outstanding capital stock. This dividend was paid to the 70 cooperative national

Net Income Reported By U.S. Steel Corporation

NEW YORK, — (AP) — United States Steel corp., the industry's biggest producer, reports net income of \$69,961,496, equal to \$2.44 a common share, for the second quarter of 1950.

Directors declared a 65-cent dividend on common stock payable Sept. 9 to holders of record Aug. 4. A similar payment was made in June.

The net income figure was the highest for any three months since \$90,811,588 in the final three months of 1946 which was an all-time record.

Income for the latest quarter compared with \$49,217,742, or \$1.64 a share, in the preceding three months, and with \$44,123,595, or \$1.45 a share, in the second quarter a year ago.

DURBAN, Union of South Africa, — (AP) — Rear Admiral John Weston, 80, South Africa's pioneer airman, died Monday night of in-

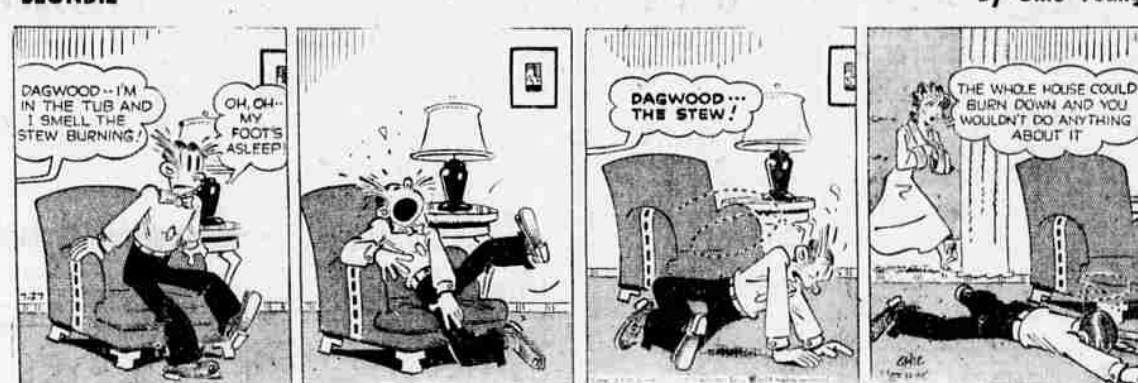

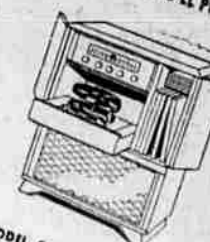
