### Here's Rarebit For Warm Day

Here's a budget dish full of color and flavor that's perfect for hot day meals:

#### Tuna Tomato Rarebit

(Serves 4)

Four toast rounds or 4 Holland rusk, butter or fortified margarine, 1 can tuna fish, 4 thick slices tomato, salt.

Spread each toast round or Holland rusk with butter margarine; cover tops generously with flaked tuna. Place slice of tomato on top of each; sprinkle with salt. Bake in hot oven (425 degrees F.) 10 to 15 minutes. Top with cheese sauce.

#### Cheese Sauce

(Serves 4)

One tablespoon butter or fortified margarine, 1 tablespoon flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard, 1/2 cup milk, 1/4 cup grated sharp cheese, 1/4 cup chopped green pepper.

Melt butter or margarine in top of double boiler, over boiling water. Blend in flour, mustard and salt. Add milk and stir until thickened. Add cheese and green pepper and cook over low heat until melted.

With the cost of food so high, the importance of budget menus increases. The following examples have been worked out by expert nutritionists.

Dinner: Smoked tongue slices with raisin sauce, baked sweets, snap beans, mixed green salad, bread, butter or fortified margarine, rhubarb sauce, coffee, milk.

Dinner: Stuffed shoulder of lamb with spinach, baked acorn squash, cucumber relish, bread, butter or fortified margarine, fresh

cherry pie (crumb crust), coffee, milk.

Dinner: Clam chowder, kidney bean salad bowl, hot biscuits, butter or fortified margarine, floating island with blueberries, coffee, milk.

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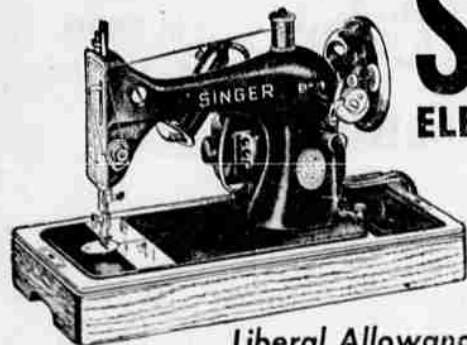
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
