Here's Detailed Explanation Of Income Tax Boosts Asked Of Congress By President

WASHINGTON, (AP)—This is what President Truman's request for higher income taxes means.

To pay for re-arming, he asked Congress to:

1. Boost the tax on individuals and corporations right now and, if necessary, more later.
2. Leave the present excise taxes unchanged and plug loopholes that allow some to get off tax-free on some investment earnings.

His proposals follow:

An increase about mid-way between your present tax and what you paid on income for 1945, the last big wartime tax year. For example:

Proposed: about 20 percent tax on the lowest taxable income, ranging up to 91 percent on the highest.

In 1945 it was 23 percent on the lowest to 94 percent on the highest. Under present law it's 16 1/2 on the lowest to 82 percent on the highest.

As an example in dollars and cents, take a married man with two children and a taxable income of \$5,000.

In 1945—his tax was \$735; now—\$432; proposed—\$532.

FOR CORPORATIONS—Under present law corporations are divided into two groups: those earning less than \$50,000 and those earning more.

For the under-\$50,000 firms, the present law goes like this: On the first \$5,000—21 percent tax; on the next \$15,000—23 percent; on the next \$5,000—25 percent; on the next \$25,000—53 percent.

The present tax on corporations making \$50,000 or more is a flat 38 percent.

Mr. Truman proposes to change this and make it a flat 25 percent on the first \$25,000 of taxable earnings and 45 percent of all above that.

Strangely, this would mean a tax increase for all corporations except those between \$30,000 and \$70,000. They'd actually get a cut. Why? Government experts tried to work out a simple, usable formula to cover all firms and the formula happens to give the \$30,000-\$70,000 group a break.

The president did not suggest, at this time, anyway—an "excess profits" tax on corporations such as they had to pay in wartime. In wartime, with money rolling in from war orders, a firm had to figure out what its normal, pre-war earnings were.

Then the firm had to pay a regular—but high—tax on its wartime earnings considered equal to its pre-war earnings. But—

On its earnings above its pre-war normal, the firm had to pay an extra tax of 85 percent. This was the excess profits tax.

ON EXCISE TAXES—Excise taxes are special taxes on certain kinds of goods, like furs, jewelry, luggage and toilet preparations. The present tax on them is 20 percent which is what you pay when you buy them.

There are other excise taxes of various size on various things, like telephone calls, theater tickets, appliances, and so on. Altogether

these excise taxes produce about \$7,000,000,000 yearly for Uncle Sam.

This year, before the Korean crisis, Congress had planned to reduce most of them. Now Mr. Truman asks Congress to let these taxes stand untouched. The government, he says, needs the \$7,000,000,000.

On loophole closing and other things—

LIFE INSURANCE COMPANIES—Because of a defect in present law, life insurance companies for the past three years have not had to pay any income taxes on profits they got from investing their money, such as in real estate.

Mr. Truman wants the law fixed so they'll have to pay tax on their invested income, but not the money they get from policyholders.

CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS AND COLLEGES—Under present law they don't have to pay taxes on profits they get from some outside business which they operate to get more money for their treasury.

Mr. Truman wants the law changed so college and charitable institutions will have to pay tax on any income from private business ventures.

Mr. Truman, of course, didn't figure out all this by himself. Congress itself had planned to make some of these changes. And the government's tax experts had figured out the rest which Mr. Truman proposed.

Crime Probers Of Senate Watch For Racketeer Signs

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Senate crime investigators promised today to keep a sharp lookout for any sign of war-spawned black market operations by racketeers and criminal gangs.

They warned that shortages caused by the Korean fighting and an expanded military program are likely to draw "racket money" into trading in scarce commodities. Black markets, in which scarce goods are sold illegally for high prices, traditionally spring up when a government undertakes to control sales.

A statement from the special senate committee to study crime said that investigators "had found many leads tending to show that racket money was at the basis of black market operations of considerable magnitude" during World War II and the postwar period.

"With the present reported rush on the part of many persons to hoard commodities of every type," said Chairman Kefauver (D-Tenn.), "there is undoubtedly a strong temptation for these racketeers to turn again to these lucrative by-ways."

He added that if the committee uncovers evidence of this, it will promptly report to Congress and the public.

The committee statement said investigation already had disclosed that big-scale racketeers frequently attempt to "legitimize themselves and their operations" once they accumulate large sums of money, by investing in lawful enterprises.

Senator Wiley (R-Wis.), a committee member, said that "among these pseudo-legitimate enterprises are meat distributing concerns, grocery distribution agencies, sugar companies, steel and metal concerns, automobile and beer and liquor sales agencies."

He added that "several attempts by well-known racketeers to enter the steel and building supply business when these items were scarce have been uncovered by the committee."

The present heavy demand for these articles, Wiley said, may be tempting to "some of the individuals whose names have come to the committee's attention in connection with interstate criminal operations."

Crude Attempt To Derail G.N. Train Is Revealed

DAVENPORT, Wash., (AP)—Sheriff Frank Rambo said today a crude attempt to derail a Great Northern train was made near Odessa Tuesday night.

A plank and some fence posts were laid across the rails near the Nemo station in the Odessa area. The first train to pass knocked the obstructions off the track without damage to itself, the sheriff said.

The same night a plank was found across state highway No. 7 near Nemo, and an old building beside the road was burned. Rambo said he felt the incidents were the acts of one group.
