

Loss In Dillard Fire Estimated Near \$12,000

The two barns and granary which burned Sunday south of Dillard were located on the property of Mrs. Victor Phipps and Helen Phipps. The property previously had been leased by Abner Rice and some of his equipment still stored in the barns, along with some hay, was lost.

Mrs. Phipps reported that the loss was estimated at from \$10,000 to \$12,000, although a complete inventory of the contents had not been made. The buildings were not covered by insurance, nor was the equipment, baled hay and grain. A small amount of alfalfa stored in the barn was insured, she said. Hardly anything of value was saved.

The larger of the two barns had stood for many years, but was still considered to be in good condition. A new roof was put on last year.

Farmer, 71, Accused Of Purchasing Bride Of 17

VANCOUVER, B. C. —(AP)—A 71-year-old Edmonton district farmer, accused of "buying" a 17-year-old girl for \$700, was charged here Monday with contributing to juvenile delinquency by "aiding and abetting a fraudulent marriage contract."

Similarly charged were the girl's 18-year-old brother and a sister-in-law. All names were withheld pending further investigation.

Police said the wedding was held here last Friday with the girl's brother posing as the bridegroom and the farmer representing himself as her father.

After the "marriage" the elderly man took the girl as his wife and turned over the \$700. The brother was to receive \$200 and the remainder was to go to the girl's mother. Investigators, however, said the mother was unaware of the arrangement.

Brussels Pact Nations To Speed Armament Job

THE HAGUE, The Netherlands —(AP)—Foreign ministers of four of the Brussels treaty nations acted today to speed armament production and manpower training in their countries.

The ministers of Britain, France, Holland and Luxembourg decided to press their parliaments for the speed-up and to urge higher defense expenditures. Belgium, also a member of the alliance, was not represented at the meeting. Her foreign minister was held at home by the royal crisis.

After a three-and-one-half-hour closed meeting it was reported that the general consensus among the four ministers was that the defense problems of the Brussels pact countries must be integrated into the overall decisions of the Atlantic pact nations.

The decisions were made as the 12-nation Atlantic pact military board was discussing similar defense problems in London.

monetary consideration, in its effort to find a street naming plan that followed a definite system. Two Bids Rejected

The other business of the meeting was the opening of bids on the extension of South Kane street and installation of sidewalks and sewers. Only one bid was submitted on the overall project, and one bid on the sidewalk only. Both bids were rejected as above the engineer's estimates.

Roseburg Paving Co. submitted a bid of \$21,000.25 for the project. The engineer's estimate was \$18,280.80. Desbines and Schafer bid \$2701.80 for the sidewalk only. The street committee was advised to study the matter and report to the council as to whether the project should be readjusted, or whether the city itself should do the work.
