Speculators Rapped By Agriculture Secretary

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Secretary of Agriculture Brannan today accused profit-bent speculators in farm and food products of trying to cash in even at the expense of the nation's economy and war effort.

Such trading on the nation's futures market by a "considerable" number of speculators, Brannan said, has contributed to recent sharp price advances. He called the speculation "excessive and unrestrained" and said it is threatening the country's economic stability and the war effort.

It is obvious, he said in a formal statement, that some means must be set up to stop, or at least curb, excessive speculation if the futures markets are to provide price insurance to merchandisers and processors.

He said the government would be set trading margins in the trading markets.

Mother, 3 Sons Accused Of Luncheonette Theft

NEW YORK — (AP) — A mother and three sons were charged today with robbing a luncheonette of \$670.

Police said Mrs. Beatrice Pollock, 49, acted as lookout and engaged a policeman in conversation while her sons, Joseph, 20, and William, 16, burglarized the place.

A third son, James, 19, allegedly planned the job.

It wasn't until police found them to steal," Mrs. Pollock said as she and her sons were held in \$5,000 bail.

"They did it of their own accord—just to help me, I guess."

Noted Arctic Explorer Killed In Plane Crash

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Col. Charles Joseph Hubbard, 48, famed arctic explorer and a former Harvard football great, was killed Monday in a plane crash 500 miles from the North Pole.

The weather bureau announced that Hubbard and eight Canadians died in the crash. They were dropping supplies by parachute to a weather station on Ellesmere island, where the plane crashed and exploded.

Hubbard was chief of the weather bureau's Arctic section.

Higher Fence Permit Asked By Mickey Cohen

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Gambler Mickey Cohen has asked zoning authorities for permission to erect a five and one-half foot steel wire fence around his home. Zoning regulations permit only three and one-half foot fences in his neighborhood—Brentwood.

Cohen has had considerable trouble with bomb planters and pranksters. The latter have been tossing firecrackers onto Mickey's lawn. It wasn't a prankster who blew thru the front of his house last year, though.

Farm Bureau Of Douglas County Is Organized

The Douglas County Farm Bureau federation was organized and officers were elected at a meeting Monday night in the Knights of Pythias hall.

The meeting was called for the purpose of officially organizing the Douglas county unit. Robert King, area representative of the Oregon federation, introduced Director Blaine Johnson of Cow Creek center, Robert Findlay, director of East Douglas center and other members present.

Russ Cary, president of the East Douglas Farm Bureau center presided for the election of officers. Elected were C. E. Young, Glendale, voting delegate; J. B. Moore, Glendale, president; Cary, Dixonville, vice president; Mrs. Lynn V. Beckley, Dixonville, secretary-treasurer; Mrs. Joe Brumback, Dixonville, associated women's chairman; Mrs. George Wilcox, Oakland, assistant associated women's chairman.

Temporary chairmen for the commodity groups were elected as follows: Paul Newman, Azalea, dairy commodity chairman; Russ Cary, Dixonville, poultry; Joe Brumback, Dixonville, livestock; and George Wilcox, Oakland, field crop. The positions of chairman of vegetable and fruit and edible nuts commodities is to be filled at a later meeting.

King introduced Marshall Swearingen, chairman of the Oregon Farm Bureau federation, who talked briefly on "structure of Farm Bureau and its purposes."

The Douglas county is the 25th county Farm Bureau to be organized in the state. Swearingen said that the Farm Bureau is a place where the farmers could meet and discuss their problems and thinking and that the Farm Bureau is an important link between the farmers and state and federal governments. He congratulated the group on organization.

King announced that the study committee will meet in Hood River Aug. 8. He extended an invitation to any who wished to come. He also advised that the annual meeting of the Oregon federation will be held in Klamath Falls Nov. 12.

A general discussion was held regarding farm problems.

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — The Building Service Employees union was picketing the Bakers union today because bakery workers have been washing windows and doing janitorial work for their employers.

Three pickets patrolled the sidewalk in front of Bakers' hall. The Building Service Employees union wants the beginning classification of the Bakers union to switch its affiliation.

The Bakers union since 1936 has relegated to its beginners the task of cleaning and janitorial work while helping out with the baking.

Diocese Gets \$1 Million From Mrs. Henry Ford

DETROIT — (AP) — Mrs. Henry Ford, widow of the automotive pioneer, today announced the gift of a fund of approximately a million dollars to the Episcopal diocese of Michigan for a church in Detroit.

The church will be built on an eight-and-a-half acre site surrounding the private cemetery where Henry Ford is buried. The site will be deeded to the diocese.

Bank Loan To Spain Is Voted By U. S. Senate

WASHINGTON, — (AP) — The Senate Tuesday voted, 85 to 15, for a \$100,000,000 export-import bank loan to Spain.

The vote was the first official friendly gesture to Franco's government since the United States, acting with other members of the United Nations, withdrew its ambassador from Madrid.

Senator McCarran (D-Nev) had proposed earmarking \$100,000,000 of economic recovery funds for Spain, but the Senate decided instead to direct the export-import bank loan.

The vote came after a debate in which there were frequent references to Spain's strategic position in the world.

Chairman Tydings (D-Md) told the Senate at one point that Spain "necessary" to the defense of the United States.

Timber Auction Slated By State Forestry Dept.

SALEM — (AP) — The state forestry department says it would hold an auction early in September to sell 31,000,000 board feet of timber located in the Sardinie creek section of eastern Marion county.

The minimum price on 21,500,000 feet of Douglas fir is \$20 per 1,000 board feet. There is 8,500,000 feet of hemlock and cedar with a minimum price of \$3 a 1,000 and 1,000,000 feet of noble fir and white pine, with a minimum price of \$8 a 1,000.

CITY COURT CASES

Morris Everett Ray, pleaded guilty to charges of drunkenness and vagrancy in municipal court Tuesday, and was committed to the city jail for 30 days. In lieu of fines of \$40 on the drunk charge and \$20 on the vagrancy charge, reported Judge Ira B. Riddle.

Patrick John O'Brien, transient, charged with drunkenness and vagrancy, and John Robert Swan of Murphy, charged with vagrancy, were given suspended fines and "floated." Mark Clem Hucksins, Roseburg, charged with drunkenness, was fined \$20, according to Riddle.

Grant Business College OK'd For Training Vets

The Grant Business college of Roseburg has been granted Veterans administration's approval for training veterans of World War II under public law 346, and public law 16 (G. I. bill).

Ola Grant, in charge of the college is taking enrollment up to its maximum capacity, after which enrollees will be put on a waiting list. Hours and courses have been arranged to fit the student's individual needs. They may attend during the day or in the evenings after working hours.

The laws under which the training is approved provide that a course of education or training shall be initiated before the terminating of four years after the date of discharge, or by July 25, 1951, whichever is the later. Therefore a veteran must have commenced and actually be pursuing his course of education or training on July 25, 1951, or the date four years after discharge, except when his attendance is interrupted because of reasons beyond his control.

The courses to be offered, said Mrs. Grant, are wide in scope and concentrated in subjects. The enrollment is open to non-veterans as well. Evening classes are from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. five nights per week. Consultations without obligations are invited.

Bicycle License Fee Slow In Being Paid

City Recorder W. A. Gilchrist today called attention to the new city ordinance requiring that all bicycles be licensed. The licenses were due July 1, but to date they have been coming in very slowly. The fee is 50 cents annually.

The new ordinance was passed by the council last spring, as a means of keeping a closer check on bicycles. In the past, a license was required but it was good indefinitely. Many licenses were on record which had been long out-dated.

He was a charter member of the Sutherlin American Legion post 121. He enlisted June 26, 1918, at Junction City, Kan., and was discharged June 15, 1919, at Fort Riley, Kan. He served as a private in a machine gun company of the 20th infantry.

Surviving are two brothers, Ralph W. and Edwin F. Pearce, both of Sutherlin, and a sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Werner, Kansas City, Mo. Services will be held at the Veterans hospital cemetery Friday at 11 a.m., with Chaplain Albert F. Feller officiating. Long and Orr mortuary is in charge.
