

Britons Must Buy Own Bath Salts, Ministry Rules

LONDON (AP)—The national health service has drawn the line at buying Britons their bath salts. Neither, said the health ministry, will it honor prescriptions for smelly lotions to make mosquitoes go away.

This also applies to vanishing cream, shaving soap, tooth paste, talcum powder and hair tonic.

"Prescriptions for such preparations have not actually been submitted," said a ministry spokesman, "but the point was raised because there are some border-line cases. A man with the itch, it might be argued with some reason, needs medicated soap."

Now an expert committee, on which members of the British Medical association served, has cleared up the doubts. In other words,

no soap. The health service will, however, continue to supply free medicines, spectacles, wooden legs, glass eyes, false teeth and wigs.

Mrs. Carl Stephens and son of McMinnville spent last weekend at the Roy Stephens home here.

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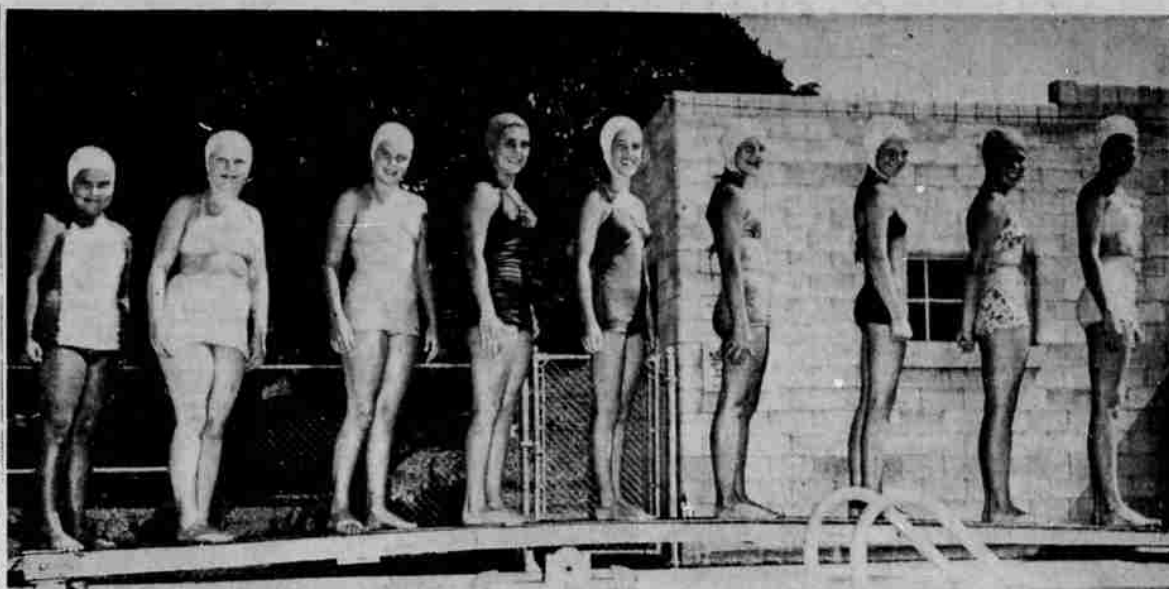
