Local Pee Wee Teams Split With Portlanders

It was just a matter of too much experience and pitching for the Roseburg Pee Wees Saturday as the classy Bashor Bombers raked up a 20-0 score over their opponents.

The Papooses in the 12-and-under age bracket vindicated their older brothers in the first game however by scoring five runs in the last inning to down the Bashor Bees, 7-2.

Only 17 Roseburg boys faced Bashor pitchers Keith Krupke and Jack Nance. In the meantime the Bombers were hitting almost at will. In the fourth inning 16 Bashor batters came to the plate and the first 12 scored.

Every one of the starters on the Portland team got at least one hit and scored at least one run. In the hitting department center fielder Dwight Umbarger came to bat four times, got four hits, and scored four times. There were 15 hits altogether by the team. They scored two in the first, two in the second, four in the third, and 12 in the disastrous fourth.

While his team was hitting all over the lot, Keith Krupke was setting the local Pee Wees down in order until the third when he allowed a walk by Duke Ricketts and the only Roseburg hit of the game, a single by Allen Talbot. In the third Jack Nance came in to relieve and struck out the only six men who faced him.

The early game was a crowd pleaser as the Papooses played like veterans, committing only one error. They scored a run in the first on a walk by LeRoy Sargent, a single by Lee Burghardt and a double by Fred Hargis. Gary Crenshaw helped his own

Sutherland, Albany Go To Defeat

Medford succeeded where it failed last year. The team became southern Oregon's Junior Legion champion last night by downing a tough Albany squad, 3-1 at Drain. This was the second game for the day for Albany. In the afternoon game they easily swept Sutherland out of the playoffs, 10-1.

The Medford champs combined four hit pitching with some timely hitting to automatically gain a state tournament berth. They earned every run—starting in the fourth with two. In this inning Ray Smith was hit by the pitcher to be followed by Terry Maddox's lefty triple for the first run batted in. With Maddox in scoring position, shortstop Dennis Conner lashed a single to score him. Conner also batted in the other run in the sixth by smacking a double with Ned Landers on second.

Albany scored its only run in the fifth which had all the makings of a rally. Cub Sexton grabbed the first pitch for a triple and came in on a passed ball. Then with two men out Bill Parr singled, got to second on an error by the second baseman which allowed Don Breneman to get on base with the potential tying run, but the rally died when Dow Poling filed out.

Winning pitcher was Terry Maddox and the loser was Vern Vannice. Vannice was relieved in the fifth by Marlin DeHaas who pitched the entire Sutherland game in the afternoon.

Sutherland, Douglas county entrant, just couldn't master the three-hit pitching of DeHaas in the earlier game. The flashy left hander struck out 14 without walking a man. Only in two innings, the fourth and sixth did more than three men face him. Third baseman Dale Robertson got the best hit of the tournament when he smacked a homer inside the park, off Sutherland's only run.

In the sixth, Albany's right fielder Bob Gathercoal overplayed the fly to right field and it rolled to the corner of the stadium. Albany gathered one each in the second, third, sixth, and eighth; four in the fourth and two in the fifth. Losing pitcher was Don Joslin.

Medford reached the finals Saturday night on a two-hitter by Darryl Wooten to hand the home Albany team their first loss in the double elimination tournament, 5-1.

In the first game Saturday night, Roseburg's Mickey Coen pitched Sutherland to their only tournament win to eliminate Brandon, 8-0. The state tournament will begin Thursday, Aug. 10, in the new memorial stadium at Albany.

Willows Tops Klamath Falls

(By the Associated Press) Willows may not win the Far West league pennant, but it will certainly go down in the record books as the graveyard of league leaders.

The Cardinals last week toppled Redding from the No. 1 spot to allow Klamath Falls to take the lead. Then they knocked the Klamath Falls Gems from the top.

The Gems succumbed twice yesterday 9 to 2 and 6 to 4. They beat Willows 9 to 4 Saturday.

Redding, meanwhile, swept three weekend games with Marysville. The Browns won Saturday 4 to 3, and twice yesterday, 4 to 0 and 11 to 6.

With hitting pitchers working in both games yesterday, the Reno Silver Sox twice subdued Medford 6 to 4 and 6 to 1. Jim Luker limited the Rogues to six hits in the opener and doubled in the winning runs. Then Mark Torres allowed only one run and pummeled a three run triple himself. The Rogues won Saturday 11 to 4.

Pittsburg took its Saturday game with Eugene 10 to 7, but lost two games yesterday 4 to 1 and 11 to 6.

Poor Men Take Tournament Lead

CHICAGO, (AP) — The \$15,000 all-American tournament, supposed to be a proving ground for gold's sharpest gold-diggers, today shaped up as a poor man's outing as it plodded into the third round.

The three top half-way shooters, led by Dave Douglas, the string-bent Scot from Newark, Del., with a 3-under-par 141, own a combined paltry 1950 golf bankroll of roughly \$7,000. That includes a year's take of \$3,518 by Douglas, \$3,313 by runner-up Ed Fergol of Royal Oak, Mich., who has 142, and \$377 earned by third-spot Skee Riegel of Tulsa, Okla., riding two strokes off Douglas's pace with 143.

This trio paces such prodigious money-grabbers as Sammy Snead, leading the pro dollar list with \$26,223; Jim Ferrier, runner-up with \$16,246; Jimmy Demaret, who has banked \$14,676; defending all-American champion Lloyd Mangrum, with \$12,855, and visiting British open champion Bobby Locke.

Snead is in the best position to head off the dark-horse three-somes. Sam has notched at even par 144 with three others, Fred Hawkins, Herman Keiser and Skip Alexander.

The 72-hole all-American is paying off a \$2,500 winners swag. It is more or less a qualifying affair for the \$50,000 "world" meet which starts at Tam-O-Shanter next Thursday.

N. Y. Giants Move Higher On Twin Win

(By the Associated Press) Look out! The Giants are coming.

While Philadelphia, Boston, Brooklyn and St. Louis have been battling in vain to take a commanding lead in the National league pennant scrap, Manager Leo Durocher's New York Giants have been moving up unobtrusively on the outside.

The Giants have won 15 out of their last 16 games. Only a 6-3 defeat by the Cards on July 30, which interrupted a nine-game winning streak, mars the surge. Yesterday the Giants reached the peak of their current drive as Larry Jansen and Sal Maglie turned back the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-0 and 3-0.

Jansen gave up only five hits, walked none and fanned seven in posting his 13th victory and fourth shutout.

Meanwhile, the Cardinals checked their downward plunge and tightened up the race by taking a doubleheader from the Phils, 7-1 and 2-0. The Cards had lost seven out of nine games and dropped 6½ games behind before righting themselves.

Rookie Floyd Boyer pitched a four-hitter to win the opener, his third straight victory. The second place Boston Braves advanced to within three games of the Phils by dividing with the Chicago Cubs. Johnny Sain pitched the Braves to a 5-2 decision in the opener, his 16th victory of the year, top output in the National league. The Cubs took the nightcap, 9-1, behind the six-hit pitching of Frank Hiller.

Brooklyn missed an opportunity to pick up a big chunk of ground by losing an 11-7 game to the Cincinnati Reds. The Reds mauled four Dodger pitchers, starting with Ralph Branca, for 16 hits. Ewell Blackwell went all the way to square his record at 11-11.

Old Dizzy Trout pitched the American league's front-running Detroit Tigers to a 4-0 seven-hit victory over the Washington Senators. The conquest boosted the Bengals' margin to three games over the New York Yankees, who regained second place from Cleveland by beating the Indians, 9-0 on Tommy Byrne's three hitter.

The Yanks put the slug on Bob Lemon, who was gunning for his tenth straight and 18th victory, in the third inning when they knocked him out with a four-run rally.

Boston took a pair from the Chicago White Sox, 9-2 and 4-3. Ellis Kinder stopped the White Sox on five hits in the first game and drove in six runs, four on a grand slam homer.

The Red Sox pulled the nightcap out with two in the ninth to give Joe Dobson his 12th victory.

Wallick Takes Win Over Peters

Leo Wallick pounded out a two fall decision over villainous Mel Peters Saturday night at the armory, in one of the roughest matches ever witnessed in the Roseburg ring.

In the opener, George Drake was awarded the third fall by Referee Jack Poppenheimer, to take his match with Rod Fenton.

Peters, who along with Wallick is one of the dirtiest wrestlers on the coast, made a run at Wallick before the bell rang and jumped on his back, but Wallick pulled a neat judo trick and threw Peters across the ring on his back.

Wallick, who didn't look up to his usual par, lost the first fall, when Peters slugged him a few times and got him groggy, then applied a hangman's hold. Wallick looked better in the second fall, and seemed to lose his temper after about two minutes were gone. He jumped all over Peters and soon had opened a cut over Peters' neck so badly he was unable to return for the final fall, and Wallick automatically won the match.

For the first time since he started wrestling in Roseburg, Wallick had the majority of the fans on his side, and they cheered wildly, when he won the match. Fenton was all over Drake in the opening fall of the Semi-final and won the first fall in 14 minutes with a surfboard.

Drake came back to take the second with body slams, and a stepover toe hold. Fenton batted Drake around the ring again in the third fall, using a punishing hammerlock. Then he started ramming Drake's shoulder into the ring apron. After warning Fenton a number of times, Poppenheimer awarded the match to Drake.

Oakland Oaks Have League All Sewed Up

Associated Press Sportswriter The club that wins the Pacific Coast league championship will pocket about \$40,000 this year, and the Oakland Oaks already are deciding how they'll spend the money.

Although the season has nine more weeks to run, it is becoming increasingly apparent that nothing less than an act of Congress can dislodge the high riding Oaks. Some good teams have tried it and suffered miserably in the process.

Nobody gained an inch on Oakland Sunday. All the combatants, the Oaks included, split their doubleheaders, Oakland played eight games at Portland during the week and won half of them.

This was the same Portland team which pulled the rug on Hollywood the week before. Yesterday the Beavers succumbed by 12 to 2 in the first game, but salvaged a 5 to 4 triumph in the finale on newcomer Vic Mastro's pinch hit homer in the last inning.

That leaves Oakland still holding a comfortable nine game bulge and relegates the race to a battle for second, third and fourth money—worth \$20,000, \$12,000 and \$7,500, respectively.

Jim Wilson, Seattle's stylish righthander, needs one more victory to become the first 20-game winner of the campaign. He racked up No. 19 yesterday as the Rainiers edged Hollywood, 4 to 3, in their second game. The Stars captured the opener, 8 to 4.

San Diego's Padres wore out their welcome at San Francisco. The Padres nicked their cousins, 3 to 2, in the first game, but the Seals turned pitching wildness and a Brooks Holder single into a 6 to 3 triumph in the nightcap.

Sacramento drubbed Los Angeles, 7 to 4, in the first game, but lost the afterpiece, 5 to 0. The shut-out, a four hitter, belonged to Ralph Hamner.

The clubs will spend Monday traveling. Tuesday's series opens finds Portland at Hollywood, Seattle at Oakland, San Francisco at Sacramento, Los Angeles at San Diego.

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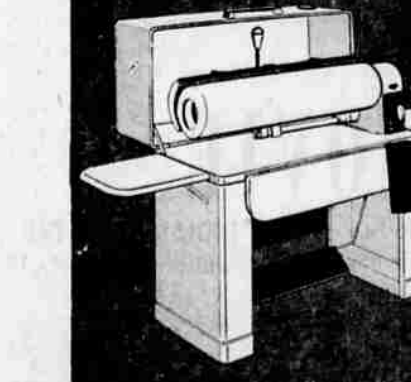
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
