Blast Victim's Body To Be Sent To California

The body will be shipped by the Roseburg Funeral home to El Monte, Calif. for funeral services and interment.

Harry Bridges' Union Faces Loyalty Checks

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — The government says Harry Bridges should be kept in jail because the right of free speech does not "protect an enemy agent... in time of armed conflict."

And the armed forces today took steps to subject to loyalty checks all members of Bridges CIO Longshore union who work on army and navy docks.

Government arguments were placed before the U. S. circuit court of appeals yesterday. The court is weighing several motions by Bridges' attorneys to free him on bail.

The armed forces waterfront worker screening will affect an estimated 6,000 stevedores, warehousemen and ship clerks.

The coast guard is already running loyalty checks on sea-going personnel shipping out on foreign bound vessels.

Army Barrier To Reds Urged By Churchill

Formation Of Unified European Force Asked At Consultative Meet

STRASBOURG, FRANCE — (AP) — Winston Churchill today urged the immediate creation of a unified European army to shield the West against the Soviet Union. Britain's wartime prime minister formally introduced a motion on the floor of the European consultative assembly asking for such an army "subject to proper democratic control."

Churchill's motion said such a European force should act in full cooperation with the United States and Canada in support of the United Nations Security Council.

Churchill demanded the prompt creation of "a real offensive front in Europe."

"The United States and Britain must send large forces to the continent, and France must revive its army," Churchill declared, calling upon the nations of the West to do their share in protecting civilization.

The wartime leader asserted that the whole west is "in great danger" with the "freedom and civilization of Western Europe under the shadow of Soviet aggression."

Soviet Force Stronger

"The Soviet forces in Europe," he said, "measured in active divisions, in air force and armored vehicles, outnumber the forces of the Western union by at least six or 10 to one."

"These are terrible facts," he pronounced, "and it is a wonder that we sit here in our new houses of Europe calmly discussing our plans for the future happiness and concord of our peoples."

He said the great danger lay in the fact that the western democracies disbanded their armies after the war, "while the dictatorship of the Kremlin maintained gigantic armies and sought by every means to re-equip them."

Churchill complained that his warnings to the West in the past had fallen on unheeding ears, or were used to sustain the false accusation by the East of warmongering.

"Now, however," said Churchill, "suddenly the lightning flash in Korea and the spreading conflagration which has followed it has roused the whole free world to keen and vehement realization of its dangers; and many measures are now proposed which, if they had been taken two years ago would at least have yielded some fruit."

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Reserve Officers Called Up For Active Service

for first lieutenants 41 and for captains 45. Officers over age for combat arms may be ordered to active duty in the service branches.

All officers selected will be ordered to the nearest army post for physical tests, the army said. It found physically fit, they will be given 21 days to wind up their private affairs unless they are willing to report sooner.

The army said that in selecting officers in the medical, dental and veterinary corps it will make every effort to obtain them on a voluntary basis.

Exemptions Listed

It said army commanders, unless otherwise ordered by the department of the army, will not call up:

1. Reserve medical officers who have not completed a year's internship.

2. Reserve medical and dental officers who are senior residents prior to completion of the current year's training.

3. Reserve officers in all four corps taking full-time post-graduate courses, until completion of the current academic year.

4. Reserve officers in all four corps whose activity in teaching, research or other activities is necessary in the national interest.

5. Reserves in all four corps whose call-up would unduly jeopardize the health of communities in which they live.

The army said selection will be made, as far as possible, from among reserves of the medical and related corps with no previous military experience, followed by officers with less than a year of active duty, and so on.

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Woman Ignores Ban On Expected Vision Of Virgin

NECEDAH, Wis. — (AP) — Mrs. Anna Van Hoof intends to proceed with her anticipated vision of the Virgin Mary next Tuesday even though her Roman Catholic church bishop is skeptical.

"I must go ahead with it or our Blessed Mother will punish me," the 40-year old farm wife said yesterday.

If she (the church) doesn't recognize it, then I will have to bear my cross all the harder."

Bishop John Treacy of the La Crosse diocese has forbidden special religious services in this small village on the day when Mrs. Van Hoof says the Virgin will appear to her for the seventh time since last November.

He has termed her claims of apparitions as being "of extremely questionable nature."

The prelate reminded Catholics that next Tuesday also is a church holy day, the feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin, and that members of his faith must then attend mass.

By his order, St. Francis church here will have only its usual two parish masses.

The Milwaukee road canceled its planned special trains from Chicago and Milwaukee after the bishop's statement Wednesday.

Before that, indications were that as many as 100,000 persons planned to be present at the farm home.

The Portland air base is the processing center for reservists in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana.

High School Grid Star Killed, Brother Wounded

FOLEY, Ala. — (AP) — A well-to-do truck farmer was held today on a murder charge in the gun-shot killing of a star Gulf Coast high school football back.

Sheriff Taylor Wilkins blamed a neighborhood feud for the fatal shooting of 18-year-old Rex Beech and the critical wounding of his brother, Joe Beech, 21.

Clarence Walters, 45, surrendered to Foley officers after the gunplay and was placed in jail on a murder charge.

Wilkins said previous trouble between the neighboring families preceded the fatal outburst. He said Walters related he fired when members of the Beech family advanced on him in a threatening manner.

Smoke-Bomb Tossed In Belgian Parliament

BRUSSELS, Belgium — (AP) — A Belgian army major smoke-bombed parliament today as the lawmakers voted finally to make King Leopold III a monarch in name only.

No one was hurt, but the senate hall was filled with gray smoke. The officer was arrested immediately.

The senate and chamber of deputies were meeting in a joint session to approve a bill transferring Leopold's royal powers to 19-year-old crown prince Baudouin.

Airmen Sentenced For Theft Of Bed Sheets

BURTONWOOD, Eng. — (AP) — Two U. S. air force enlisted men were sentenced to three years by a court-martial here for stealing 1,300 bed sheets. They were also ordered dishonorably discharged. The men, both stationed at the U. S. air force depot here, were Staff Sgt. John C. McCarty of Ottumwa, Iowa, and Private Alan Hill of Vernonia, Ore. The sentences, like all others by court-martial in the U. S. armed forces, are subject to review by higher authority.

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
