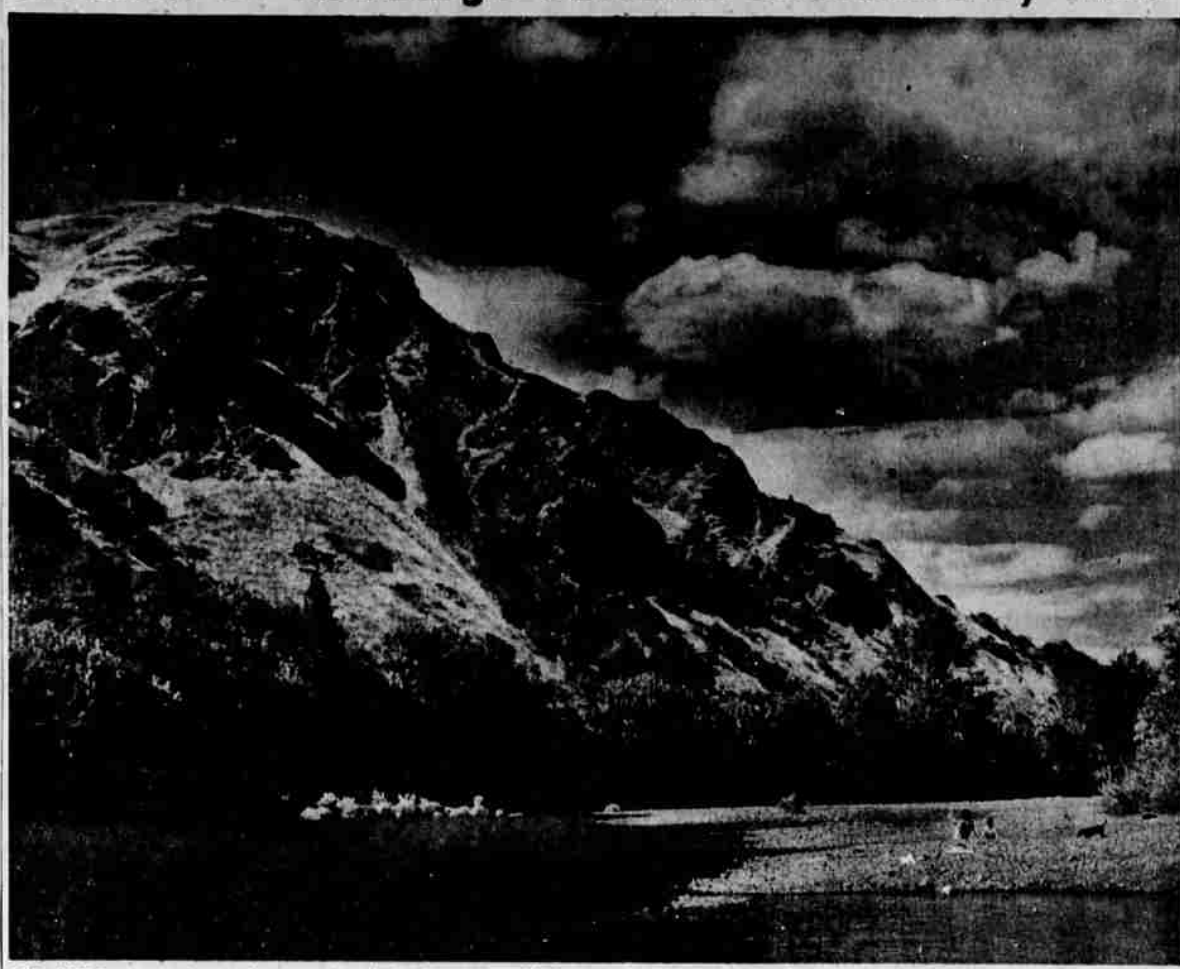

Congress Chat

The House has passed an economic control bill. Although somewhat amended on the floor it is still a "blank check" placed in the hands of the President. Originally the President asked broad powers to control the industries and credit of the country but said nothing about curbing rising retail prices. In other words, he asked for power to do things he did not actually need to do but avoided the question of controlling prices and wages. The Senate will quite likely approve a bill similar to the one passed by the House. The final version will empower the President to control prices and wages and begin rationing.

Since the end of World War II the President and the left-wingers in Congress have fought long and hard, first to keep the war-time controls, then to put them back on. They fought against the removal of OPA. They succeeded in passing the obnoxious housing act of 1946 which is better known as the Wilson Wyatt housing expediter law. The utter failure of that control law brought its repeal in the first month of the 80th Congress, to the relief of everyone.

But the President still demanded economic control powers. His request was refused by the 80th Congress. He called a special session of Congress July 26, 1948 and again demanded control power which was refused.

Re-elected, and again in control of Congress, the President renewed his request for economic dictatorship. Although the Spence bill embodying his demands has been pending since this Congress convened Jan. 3, 1949, the President has not had a rubber stamp majority. The Spence bill was not considered until the outbreak of war in Korea. Immediately a revised and much more sweeping control bill was taken up and will become law.

Most of those of us who normally oppose economic controls over our free country felt compelled to vote for the bill — not because of the war in Korea but because there seems to be a genuine possibility of much more serious conflict in the near future. It seems to be a principle accepted by nearly everyone that we cannot fight a major conflict without rigidly controlling our free economy. So we are going back to the OPA days. I don't like it and I don't think anyone else will, but the people have repeatedly voted into office the administration which has blundered us into the present war situation.

President Of S.P. Has Excuses For Freight Car Lack

PORTLAND — (AP) — The president of the Southern Pacific railroad concedes there is a serious freight car shortage, of which Oregon lumbermen and farmers have complained, and attributed it to these three things:

1. Heavier traffic than expected, with June setting a new monthly high;
2. Service interruption on other lines because of labor troubles;
3. Increased demands because of the Korean war.

The president, A. T. Mercier, here to hold a meeting of the road's board of directors and to inspect the line's facilities in this area, told a reporter, "We will continue to apportion rolling stock among all customers with the utmost impartiality."

For several years western Oregon shippers have complained of the shortage of cars and in some instances lumber mills have been forced to shut down briefly, for lack of storage space.

Mercier said the company has spent \$275,000,000 for rolling stock since the war in an effort to meet the demand for increased service.

The S.P. is proceeding rapidly in shifting to diesel locomotives and in the Portland district the operation has been virtually completed as far north as Eugene, he said.

Mercier said start of streamliner service between Los Angeles and New Orleans Sunday would link Portland and the Louisiana city by streamliner all the way.

Soviet Lie Exposed On Weapons Given Koreans

SOUTHEAST KOREAN FRONT — (AP) — A U.S. army officer says that American combat troops have captured Soviet-made weapons and ammunition manufactured in 1950.

The Russians said recently at Lake Success that they have not provided arms to the North Koreans since 1948, when their occupation forces withdrew from the area north of the 38th parallel. The captured equipment includes 122 grenades, a submachinegun and other small arms, all manufactured in 1949 and 1950.

The officer said the weapons were turned over to a team of frontline United Nations observers operating with the American forces. It is expected the material will be sent to Lake Success. Markings on the gun and shells are in Russian.

Dog's Agility Decides Question Of Ownership

MEMPHIS — (AP) — The lack of a "middle-aged spread" decided the ownership of a frisky, friendly dog in general sessions court.

The pooch wound up in front of Judge William J. Bacon yesterday when two women went to court to settle whether he was "Duke" or "Flash".

Mrs. Evelyn Quinn said she'd had "Duke" since 1944. Miss Elizabeth Yarbrough said "Flash" was given her as a pup last spring.

Judge Bacon, patting the light brown mongrel, decided he was entirely too slim and alert to be six years old and awarded custody to Miss Yarbrough.

Filbert Control Sees 15 Percent Surplus

PORTLAND — (AP) — The Oregon-Washington Filbert Control board has recommended that 15 percent of this year's crop be withheld from the market and declared surplus.

The crop is estimated at 6900 tons for the two states. That is well below last year's record yield of 11,140 tons, when 25 percent of the crops was set aside as surplus.

The recommendation, made under the filbert marketing agreement, must be approved by the agriculture department.

HOBOKEN, N.J. — (AP) — Last night firemen asked a driver to move his double-parked car, in order to get their fire engines through a one-way street.
