**Indian Convicted Of Assault With Knife**

EUGENE — (P) — Bruce Tupper, 21, Klamath Falls Indian, was found guilty in U. S. district court here yesterday on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon the night of Feb. 23 upon a fellow Indian at the Klamath Indian reservation.

The jury returned the unanimous verdict necessary for conviction yesterday evening after about an hour and a half of deliberation.

Sentence will be passed Monday morning, Aug. 28, in Portland. Maximum penalty under the charge is five years. Tupper was charged with having stabbed Quincy Baker, 46, as a climax to a drinking bout.

**Nuns Forced To Toil In Ukrainian Coal Mine**

ROME — (P) — Quotidiano, newspaper of the Italian Catholic action, printed today a letter by a German nun saying she and 1,500 other members of her order are doing forced labor in Ukrainian coal mines.

Many have died said the letter. It added: "We envy them. We are treated like animals. We are whipped to work."

The nun said that she and others from the Order of Saint Vincent were taken from Soviet East Prussia to the Ukraine.

**Sun Bather Sues Aged Woman For 'Gawking'**

LOS ANGELES — (P) — H. I. Landlady "gawked" at him while he took his sunbaths and ate his meals, Charles H. Knox, artist and writer, charges in a \$15,315 invasion of privacy damage suit.

Mrs. Julia Chartard paraded back and forth across the rear of his lot while he sunbathed "continually looking at me," Knox testified yesterday. He is 35. She is 70.

He said he finally moved. Mrs. Chartard, who denies she tried to drive Knox from his quarters, was scheduled to testify later.

**Oregon Lamb Crop Increases Slightly**

PORTLAND — (P) — Oregon's lamb crop increased slightly this year, despite fewer breeding ewes, the Department of Agriculture has reported.

The number of lambs was estimated at 532,000, an increase of one percent over the record low crop of 1949.

There were only 566,000 breeding ewes, the smallest number in 27 years, but for the first time since 1941 there was an increase in the number of lambs saved.

The number saved was estimated at 94 per 100 breeding ewes. The average for the past 10 years was 92 per 100.

**Grass Fire Scars Slope Of Mount Nebo**

The Roseburg rural fire department was called out Wednesday about 5:15 p. m. to a grass fire on the slopes of Mt. Nebo.

The fire, starting along the road, was about half way between Military St., and the fairgrounds. Two trucks were dispatched to quell the flames, which threatened to spread up the precipitous slopes of the mountain, but the fire was controlled within half an hour's time, without causing any damage.

## State Purposes Again Require No Property Tax

SALEM — (P) — Oregon won't have any property tax for state purposes during the year ending next June 30, the state tax commission announced.

The state won't need such a tax because state income tax receipts are large enough to make the property tax unnecessary.

The last time Oregon had a property tax to finance the state government was in 1930. Since then, property taxes have been used only to finance such local governments as counties, cities and school districts.

However, unless the next legislative session finds some new tax revenues, a state property tax would be necessary for the following fiscal year.

The commission said present state expenses now exceed income tax receipts by more than \$10,000,000 a year. But that deficit is being overcome by using accumulated surpluses.

The commission reported that the total cash value of all taxable property in the state is \$2,905,735,612, with a third of this amount in Multnomah county.

**Soviet Crab Meat Under Embargo**

NEW YORK — (P) — The United States lines has placed an embargo on all Russian shipments after Boston longshoremen refused to unload one of its vessels carrying \$350,000 worth of Soviet crab meat.

On Monday New York city stevedores refused to unload a \$250,000 crab meat cargo from the Cunard liner Parthia. The longshoremen then adopted a resolution not to handle goods coming from Russia.

Yesterday, AFL longshoremen in Boston would not take off the \$350,000 cargo from the U. S. lines' S. S. American Manufacturer. The ship is en route to New York with the crab meat still aboard, but a company official said:

"The United States lines knowingly will not handle henceforth any cargo out of or to Soviet Russia directly or indirectly."

Both Cunard and U. S. lines officials said the crab meat will be returned to England. The British got the sea food in a trade agreement with Russia.

## Effective Bombing Of Reds By B-29s Makes A-Bomb Use In Korean War Unnecessary

WASHINGTON — (P) — The bombing of massed Korean Communists by B-29 Superfortresses underscores some of the reasons why atomic bombs are not now being used in support of American and South Korean soldiers.

With around 100 B-29s, the air force was able to spread approximately 1,000 tons of conventional bombs over an area in which North Koreans were concentrated for an expected attack.

The Superforts' bombing runs were made without interference by enemy fighters, since U. S. and Australian planes completely control the air over Korea.

Whether the expected Communist attack will be stopped indefinitely by the single massive bombing is a question.

Airmen say the total number of planes flying in Korea is not the maximum that could be used effectively there. But it is large enough to strike the enemy blow with conventional bombing when concentrated on a single target area.

Unless and until this conventional striking power proves inadequate, the use of atomic bombs is unlikely.

In the massive Superfortress bombing, the area attacked was seven and a half miles long and three and a half wide.

To cover such an area with atomic blasts of fatal force, it would take not one but something like half a dozen A-bombs of the power used at Hiroshima. Authorities agree, however, that they would kill far larger numbers of the enemy than would ordinary bombs.

For safety's sake, American troops facing an area under atomic attack would have to remain at a greater distance than if the zone were under attack with conventional explosives.

**Other Possibilities**  
Some American authorities also are fearful that use of atomic weapons, even against purely military targets rather than city masses, would tend to turn people elsewhere in Asia against this country.

Furthermore, President Truman has said that the use of A-bombs in Korea is not under consideration.

But if the United States were

fighting an enemy that had control of the air, stronger arguments could be advanced for using the atomic bomb against critical troop concentrations.

In such a case, fast jet bombers carrying the bombs could undertake individual sneak attacks. The 60-mile-an-hour Boeing B-47 might be used on such missions. Even if only one or two atomic bomb carriers got through to the target, they would exert as much destructive power as a substantial force of bombers battling their way through an enemy air force with conventional explosives.

**New O.N.G. Reserves Progressing Nicely**

PORTLAND — (P) — Recruiting for Oregon's new national guard reserves has been getting "good results" according to Brig. General Harry C. Brumbaugh, the commander.

He reported plans were underway to activate battalion headquarters at Lebanon next Tuesday for use of the 7th regiment, commanded by Col. Armin E. Berger, Salem.
