Livestock Will Be Auctioned At Fairgrounds

Wilbert Anderson, Douglas county 4-H agent, announced Thursday a livestock auction will be added to the events scheduled for Saturday on the program of the Douglas County fair.

Slated for 2 p. m. in the livestock showmanship ring, the event will offer prize sheep, beef and hogs at public auction.

Anderson said the auction will give local persons "an excellent opportunity" to purchase fine grade meat for immediate use or for storage in lockers. He said some persons have already signified their intention to join with neighbors in the purchase of the animals, then divide the meat for use during the winter months.

Assurance that all animals will provide excellent eating was given by Livestock Judge Cal Monroe. "We will offer for sale only those animals which grade 'good or better,'" he said. "This means that the public will have the opportunity to buy meat which is better than 80 percent of all meat now eaten in the state."

Also not named were winners of county grange booth displays, exhibited by Evergreen, Myrtle Creek, Melrose, Riversdale, Lookingglass, South Deer Creek and Camas Valley Granges. Judges said last night they were unable to agree and would continue their scrutiny of home grown produce this morning.

Following the concluding act of the Active club-sponsored amateur program at the grandstand, crowds literally thronged to the fair buildings to view the various displays, livestock, poultry and rabbits. Food and soft drink booth vendors, who thought they had "overstocked" for the opening day, were hard pressed to meet the demand. Nearby carnival concessionaires experienced a sudden booming business.

Hoping to close the gates at the scheduled 10 p. m. hour, guards and exhibitors soon nearly an extra hour "shooting out" late comers.

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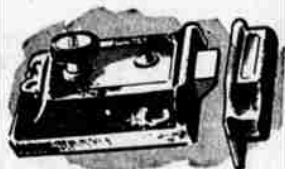
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
