CALCUTTA, India — (AP)—At least 11 persons perished and hundreds of acres of crops were laid waste by Tuesday's earthquake in the province of Assam. Damage was estimated at \$2,000,000.

Truth Told On Total Of Military Hospital Beds

WASHINGTON — (AP)—Dr. Richard Meiling, director of the Defense department's medical services, declined Thursday to tell a house subcommittee how many beds there are in military hospitals while reporters were in the room.

Such figures, even for hospitals in this country, are "restricted" or secret, he told a house armed services subcommittee studying hospital needs.

Several committee members, pooh-poohed that stand, but reporters were asked to leave.

One of them had a copy of a story which on Aug. 5, gave as 37,000 the number of beds now staffed in military hospitals in this country. The figure had been obtained from the Pentagon press section.

Although Meiling insisted on testifying secretly, the testimony did not stay secret long. A committee member informed a reporter the doctor stated that there are now 42,000 beds.

Lumber Needed In U.S. Defense Plans Estimated

WASHINGTON — (AP)—Defense requirements for lumber are estimated officially at 1,500,000,000 board feet in the next ten months.

The figure was given in a Defense department announcement that southern lumbermen met with representatives of the army corps of engineers.

The department said that Maj. Gen. Lewis A. Pick, chief of engineers, was told at the conference that defense lumber needs could be taken in stride.

It added that the department had been given new assurances that its requirements for the next 10 months can be met without unsettling the market.

The department said industry representatives agreed to hold lumber auctions once each month, or more often if the demand justified, at convenient locations throughout the south.

Highway Aid Money Cut By \$120 Million

WASHINGTON — (AP)—The Senate public works committee—acting in accord with President Truman's request—today cut \$120,000,000 from a federal highway aid bill.

Chairman Chavez (D-NM) announced that the group had trimmed the measure from \$620,000,000 to \$500,000,000.

"The reductions," Chavez told reporters, "were made in view of the changed international situation brought about by the Korean situation and in view of increased military expenditures."
