Institute On Psychology Will Include Pastors

An institute on pastoral psychology will be held at the Veterans administration hospital in Roseburg, Sept. 25-27, to which all ordained ministers of the state of Oregon have been invited.

The principal subjects to be discussed are emotional problems and mental hygiene. Leaders of discussion groups will come from members of the hospital staff and ministers of various denominations.

The conference is being held at the Veterans hospital in Roseburg so that ministers can be conducted on tours through the neuropsychiatric wards and be better able to deal with patients who will be returning to their homes and places in society. Similar conferences have been held at other VA neuropsychiatric hospitals and have been found to be helpful in rehabilitating mental patients.

Soundable and panel discussions as well as question forums will be held on topics already selected from questionnaires sent to ministers throughout the state. The chief speaker will be sent from the chaplaincy department of the Veterans administration in Washington, D. C., and has not yet been named. Invitations have been sent to denominational headquarters rather than to individual ministers, although all ordained ministers are invited to attend.

The ministers of Roseburg will provide housing for visiting ministers of their denominations as well as denominational dinners for all groups represented. About 100 ministers have already signified their intention of attending, with more to be contacted.

The program is being sponsored jointly by the Veterans administration hospital and the Roseburg Ministerial association, with Chaplain Albert Feller in charge of arrangements. Programs for the conference can be obtained by writing the Roseburg Veterans hospital.

Three women were being held in the county jail today each on \$750 bail, according to Justice of Peace A. J. Geddes. The three were charged with vagrancy.

Two Minor Fires Are Brought Under Control

A 50-acre fire on the Herman Oden place at Dodson mountain was burning itself out today after being brought under control, the Douglas Forest Protective association reported.

designate scarce items. Violators would be subject to penalties ranging up to a \$10,000 fine and a year in jail.

4. A \$2,000,000,000 government loan and loan guarantee program to encourage defense production.

5. Consideration by the President of the wage and price levels of the period May-June 24, 1950, in the fixing of wage-price ceilings. The bill permits but does not require a rollback to that period, with some exceptions which might include all farm commodities.

6. Setting up special machinery for the mediation and arbitration of labor disputes affecting national defense. The procedure would have to be in line with terms of the Taft-Hartley law and other existing labor acts.

7. Exemption from the anti-trust laws and the federal trade act in the case of voluntary agreements entered into by business firms at the request of the President.

Mr. Truman did not ask for authority to invoke wage-price controls and rationing, but he said he would be glad to have the standby power if congress did not restrict the use of it. He also said that he sees no need for using those powers at this time.

Senate administration leaders protested that Mrs. Truman certainly would have no free hand under the amendment requiring him to put wage-price controls into effect at the same time and virtually across the board if he invoked the controls at all.

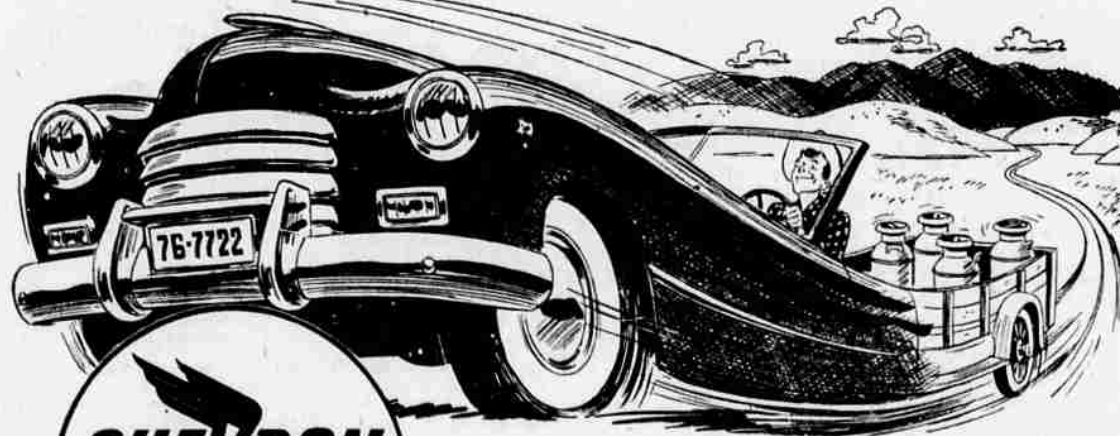
