

Northwest Golf Record Smashed

ASTORIA — (P) — A new course competitive record pushed young Bob Duden of Portland into a one stroke lead yesterday in the Pacific northwest open golf championship.

The 120-man field was to fire a second 18-hole round today and wind up with a final 36 holes tomorrow.

Duden, recently turned pro, fired a four-under-par 67 over the Astoria Golf and country club course. It was the best mark ever made here in competition and equaled the course record for all-type play.

Two other pros, John Langdon of Portland and Dave Killen of Olympia, trailed Duden by a single

U. S. Davis Cup Team Weakening, Tournament Shows

BROOKLINE, Mass. (P) — Students of tennis agreed today that the U. S. Davis cup team's grip on that international trophy was dangerously loose after analysis of the national doubles final match.

The consensus was that Jack Bromwich and Frank Sedgman, the backbone of Australia's challenging forces, had a comparatively easy time defeating Gardner Mulloy and Bill Talbert, 7-5, 8-6, 3-6, 6-1, yesterday at Longwood.

At 36 and 32 respectively, Mulloy and Talbert, virtually certain to play Davis cup doubles at Forest Hills, N. Y., late this week, have won the national doubles four times since 1942.

But it was obvious they have slowed down considerably during the past year or so. Conversely, Bromwich, who shared the national team titles with Australian teammates Billy Sidwell and Adrian Quist last year and in 1939, Seldom appeared in better form.

Young Sedgman, holder of his nation's singles championship, is verging on world-wide stardom and is expected to be outstanding in Davis cup singles competition.

The Australian veterans displayed almost every department of their games equally well while humbling Mulloy and Talbert. The former succeeded in dominating the play in all but one of the four sets and their attacking tactics were exceptionally sound.

The American veterans reached their peak during the third set, when they succeeded in gaining command at the net. But then they wilted without warning and were blasted off the court.

Four Northwest Golfers Hang On

MINNEAPOLIS — (P) — Four of the Pacific Northwest's five-man contingent survived first round play yesterday in the national amateur golf tournament. Two of them triumphed in matches that featured the first day's play.

Gene Littler of Seattle, who tied for national medalist honors in recent qualifying rounds, turned in the day's top upset when he scorched his way to a 6 and 4 victory over Ray Billows, three-time runnerup from Poughkeepsie, N. Y.

Al Mengert of Spokane won one of the day's longest matches, a 1 up verdict in 21 holes over Ed Lowrey of San Francisco.

Ray Weston Jr., also of Spokane, topped Capt. Fred Mosley, San Antonio, Tex., 1 up, and William Mawhinney, Vancouver, B. C., downed Capt. John Anderson, Dayton, O., 4 and 3.

The lone northwest loser was Carl Jonson, Seattle, who bowed 3 and 1 to Sam Penecale, Elkins Park, Va.

Littler was one under par for the first nine holes against Billows and built up a three hole lead going into the turn.

Today's second round pairings pitted Littler against Robert Graves, St. Paul; Mengert vs. William J. Schaller, Wauwatosa, Wis.; Weston vs. Fred Kammer, Grosse Pointe Farms, Mich.; and Mawhinney against Samuel C. Stout Jr., Hinsdale, Ill.

North American Trapshoot Starts

VANDALIA, O. — (P) — The North American clay target championship, toughest grind in the clay target sport, is programmed today at the 51st grand American trapshoot.

But the thousand odd marksmen from all parts of the country are still talking about the unprecedented feat of an 18-year-old girl in yesterday's inaugural.

Joan Pfeuger of North Miami, Fla., broke 100 straight in the champion of champions race and then broke 74 of 75 in a shootoff to defeat 37 other state title holders.

She is the first woman ever to break 100 straight in the big event. The feat boosted a feminine star to the top in that race for the first time in 31 years.

Despite a boil on her arm, the youngster is regarded as a decided threat in today's 200 target race at 16 yards for the North American title, one of the most coveted in the sport.

In yesterday's feature attraction Miss Pfeuger was tied over the regulation 100 by Dean Blank of Perryton, Tex., H. H. Crossen of Gardiner, Mont., grand American handicap champion in 1947; Mer-

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cer Tennille of Shreveport, La., who has won the national doubles championship three of the last four years, and Ned Lilly.
