Boycott On Soviet Furs Is Extended To Airports

NEW YORK — (AP)—The union boycott on Russian imports has spread from New York City docks to airports.

The ban was first applied last week to Russian-produced crabmeat and furs. Monday AFL shoremen refused to handle any other cargo of Russian furs aboard the liner Queen Elizabeth.

At the same time the CIO Transport Workers union said local 504 of its air transport division was alerted to watch for air shipments of Russian furs.

A number of these have arrived in recent months.

Korean Red Radio Voices Admission Of Heavy Losses

TOKYO — (AP)—The Red Korean radio in a puzzling broadcast said today allied bombings had killed or wounded 11,582 civilians and destroyed 11 important industrial plants.

General MacArthur's headquarters said a 14,000-word report on the bombings is being broadcast in daily installments from North Korea.

If true, the accounts of destruction to industrial areas are vitally important to United Nations forces intelligence.

The broadcast said half of the casualties were killed. It said 16,504 houses had been damaged between July 2 and Aug. 3.

It listed as "out of operation" the Pyongyang railway factory, Pyongyang spinning mills, Pyongyang machine tool plant, Pyongyang Soy bean plant, Wonsan and Nampo oil refineries, Hungnam fertilizer factory, Hongu Carbide factory, Yongsan machine tool plant, Sarawan spinning mills and Nampo shipyards.

Some of these are factory complexes and not single buildings, MacArthur's intelligence section said.

One theory advanced at headquarters for Red admission of this damage was that the North Koreans hoped the allies would discontinue bombings. Another possible reason, officers said, was that "North Koreans may be trying to arouse sympathy among other Asiatic nations."

U.S. Aid Voted Terminal Marts For Farm Crops

WASHINGTON — (AP)—The House unanimously approved the idea of giving federal financial backing to builders of new wholesale terminal markets for farm crops.

The measure now goes to the Senate. The bill's backers said it would cut the spread between what the farmer gets for his produce, and what the housewife pays for it.

The bill would permit the Agriculture department to insure up to \$100,000,000 of mortgages on new terminals. They would be privately operated.

SALT LAKE CITY — (AP)—A Rambouillet ram sold for \$2,500 at the national ram sale Tuesday, the third highest price on record for a ram of that breed. It was the highest price on record for a ram of that breed. It was the highest price paid since 1921.

New U.S. Law Bars Sale Of Foreign Fish Cargoes

WASHINGTON — (AP)—The House has passed a bill to keep foreign fishing vessels from selling their catches on U. S. shores. It now goes to the Senate.

The measure would plug a loophole in the law by which foreign fishing boats have been coming to shore as cargo vessels and unloading their catches.

Under the new provision, the merchant marine and fisheries committee reported, the use of this device will be impossible.

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Military Hospitals Now For Casualties In Korea

WASHINGTON — (AP)—Veterans will no longer be sent—except in emergencies—to most of the military hospitals in the continental United States.

This new policy was announced by the Defense department and the Veterans administration. Army hospitals will be affected immediately; navy hospitals in the near future. The VA operates 138 hospitals of its own.

The policy was changed, the government agencies said, because army and navy hospital space is needed to care for Korean casualties and because more medical personnel is being sent to the far east.

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
