SEATTLE — (AP) — Koshiro Furukawa received two notices Monday. One said his son, Sgt. Fred Y. Furukawa, serving with the 24th infantry division in Korea, has been awarded the bronze star medal for heroic achievement on July 6 near Pyongyang. Fred led a machinegun section to safety from an enemy trap. The second notice said that another son, Sgt. Isaac Furukawa, had been killed in action in Korea. There were no details. Both were World War II veterans.

Carson Endorsed For Justice By CIO Council

PORTLAND — (AP) — The CIO Oregon state industrial council has added its endorsement of Allan G. Carson, Salem, for the state supreme court.

Earlier the AFL Oregon State Federation of Labor gave its backing to Carson, attorney and member of the state senate.

The supreme court position, vacant because of the death of Justice Harry S. Belt, will be filled by a write-in vote.

Harold Warner, Portland, holding interim appointment from Gov. Douglas McKay, also will be a write-in candidate.

All Logging Areas In Oregon Are Reopened

SALEM — (AP) — Logging operations over the entire state returned to normal today after a heavy rain ended the severe fire hazard in northwest Oregon forests.

State Forester George Spaur, who reopened all areas to logging late yesterday, said there still is a fire hazard in eastern Oregon, which didn't get any rain. But logging is permitted in the eastern section of the state until the humidity falls below 30 per cent. Spaur said there are no fires anywhere in the state.

Federal Judge Black Of Seattle Passes Away

SEATTLE — (AP) — U. S. District Judge Lloyd L. Black, 61, died today in Swedish hospital. He was stricken while watching an outdoor swim show Sunday and underwent an emergency operation Monday. It was the first day the widely known jurist had missed from the federal bench because of illness in 11 years.

Standards For Oregon Schools Being Revised

SALEM — (AP) — The state education department has told every Oregon public school that they should have consistent plans for improving themselves over a period of years.

The department said it is revising school standards, which schools must meet in order to get help from the state basic school support fund.

Funeral services will be held in The Chapel of The Roses, Roseburg Funeral home, Friday, Aug. 25, at 11 a.m. with Chaplain Feller and the American Legion in charge. Interment will follow in the Masonic cemetery with full military honors.
