Kiwanis Adopts 3 Resolutions, Rejects Fourth

SPOKANE — (AP) — The Pacific Northwest Kiwanis convention kicked off one proposed resolution on Canadian imports Tuesday but passed three others in routine fashion.

The delegates quickly turned thumbs down on a resolution that would support a curb on certain Canadian imports into the United States. Many of the delegates are members of clubs in Canada.

The other resolutions, passed without dissent, called on the United Nations to warn Russia that she would be held responsible for any further Communist aggression; approved the UN action in Korea; and, demanded an open investigation of persons connected with the theft of government documents in the Amerasia case.

Harold B. Blything of Portland was confirmed as the new district governor and 19 lieutenant governors were named at an elective session today.

Everyone Likes Blueberry Pie

Those plump, outsized cultivated blueberries are crying out loud for pie shells. Better give them a kind answer. Then everyone will be happy.

Fresh Blueberry (or Huckleberry) Pie
Two tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca, 3/4 cup granulated sugar, 1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 quart blueberries, pastry for two-crust 9-inch pie, 1 tablespoon butter.
Combine quick-cooking tapioca, sugars, salt and berries; let stand 15 minutes, or while pastry is being made. Line a 9-inch pie pan with 1/2 of the pastry rolled 1/4-inch thick. Roll remaining pastry 1/4-inch thick. Fill pie shell with fruit mixture. Dot with butter. Moistened edge of pastry with cold water. Cut strips from rolled pastry and adjust in lattice across top of pie. Flute rim.

Bake in hot oven (425 degrees F.) 45 minutes, or until syrup boils with heavy bubbles that do not burst. Note: For extra juicy fruit pies, serve them a little warm. For thicker pies, let cool about 4 hours or longer before serving.

Ever try a sweet omelet for dessert? Time you did if your family relishes good things to eat.

Blueberry Omelet

(2 servings)

To two eggs, slightly beaten, gradually beat in 1/4 cup confectioners' sugar. Add two teaspoons grated lemon peel. Fold into four egg whites, stiffly beaten with 1/4 teaspoon salt. Melt 1 1/2 teaspoons butter in a skillet. Pour in the omelet mixture. Cook over low heat, covered. While cooking slash across several times to permit heat to penetrate the slight bottom crust. When done but soft on the inside, crease through center with a knife. Add one cup cultivated blueberries. Carefully fold over on crease. Sprinkle with confectioners' sugar.

FISH FOR FAIR

Federal Reserve Board Moves To Check Inflation

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government has moved to curb bank credit in a new stop-inflation maneuver.

The step was taken by the Federal Reserve board last night when it approved a boost from 1 1/4 to 1 3/4 percent in the discount rate of the Federal Reserve bank of New York. Such rate changes usually spread to the rest of the federal reserve system.

The idea is this: when federal reserve member banks make a loan on a note, they can get the money tied up in the loan from a federal reserve bank, less a sum known as the discount rate. Increasing the discount rate thus tends to restrict bank loans.

The new 1 3/4 percent discount rate is effective Monday, Aug. 21. It was approved by the reserve board and the federal open market committee, an inter-agency body, after loans and holdings of corporate and municipal securities held by reserve member banks rose by \$1,500,000,000 within six weeks.

"Such an expansion under present conditions is clearly excessive," the reserve board said in a statement.

In another related move, Secretary of the Treasury Snyder announced that insurance companies, savings banks and other institutional investors now may buy up to \$1,100,000 worth of series F and G government bonds this year. The former limit was \$100,000.

This will provide the government with ready funds without contributing very much to inflationary pressures. Such investors usually buy government bonds as investments to lay aside until they mature. Commercial banks, by contrast, can use government bonds as the basis for loans, increasing credit.

New U. S. Notes Offered

Secretary Snyder also announced a big new offering of treasury notes. Two series of 1 1/4 percent 13-month treasury notes will be offered in exchange for four series of maturing securities totaling \$13,570,000,000.

Treasury officials said this is possibly the biggest refunding operation in department history.

The reserve board, in announcing approval of the new discount rate, outlined its views on the current economic situation.

"Effective restraint of inflation," its statement said, "must

depend ultimately on the willingness of the American people to tax themselves adequately to meet the government's needs as a pay-as-you-go basis.

"Taxation alone, however, will not do the job. Parallel and prompt restraint in the area of monetary and credit policy is essential."

Canadian Rail Strike Boosts Business In Seattle

SEATTLE — (AP) — Seattle hotels are bulging at the seams as hundreds of American and Canadian tourists re-routed their travels through this region because of the Canadian rail strike.

Hotel operators said they had been able to handle reservations thus far but the saturation point has been reached. The problem is being complicated by many tourists who had planned to go from

here to British Columbia. They now are finishing their vacations in the Puget sound country.

Heavy increases in rail traffic have been noted. Great Northern railway increased its one-section eastbound Oriental Limited to three sections Tuesday to accommodate the overflow from Vancouver and Victoria.

Three extra ferry trips have been added by the Black Ball ferry lines between Port Angeles, on the Olympic peninsula, and Victoria.

Canadian Pacific railway vessels normally carry hundreds of passengers daily between Seattle and Victoria-Vancouver.

Airlines also were stepping up their operations between here and British Columbia and east coast points. Most lines said they are booked several days in advance.

PORTLAND — (AP) — Evangelist Bill Graham preached in a pouring rain Wednesday to a police-estimated crowd of 4,000 to 5,000 persons in the south park blocks.

Several hundred sang hymns in the rain for an hour before the meeting started.

Police, who had prepared for a possible turn-out of as many as 20,000, said downtown traffic was not disrupted. The meeting was at S. W. Clay street, well south of the business district.

The school board passed a motion that the board, accompanied by L. N. Grey, should appear before the highway commission if possible, to state its case in an effort to reach an understanding.

Other action by the school board: James Deaton was hired as bus driver. Mrs. Alvira Ward of Days Creek appeared before the board in regard to a salary adjustment at the time of her termination of employment.

Other business discussed included plans for construction of the gym, reading and approval of bills and setting the date for the physical examination of first and ninth grade students.
