

**Minister Paroled After
Serving Morals Penalty**

SALEM — (P) — William Henry Nagel, Portland minister who was sentenced to serve two years in the state penitentiary for contributing to the delinquency of a minor girl, has been paroled.

The state parole board said that Nagel was paroled August 5 after serving nine months of his sentence. He now is living in Portland, and can't resume his ministry until the two-year sentence has expired.

Nagel was convicted at Klamath Falls. The case attracted wide attention, with hundreds of church members asking Governor McKay to pardon him. He claimed innocence.

She was driving south when her automobile skidded on a highway shoulder, and swerved into the path of a northbound freight truck. She was alone in the car, which was demolished.

The truck driver, Harold C. Perry, Portland, was unhurt.

**Valuable U.S. Metal Gets
To Russia Via Britain**

WASHINGTON — (P) — Russia has got hold of 50 tons of U. S. produced molybdenum, a metal used to harden steel, and the government here is trying to find out how the slip-up occurred.

Russia is believed to be short of molybdenum.

The Commerce department said yesterday the metal was shipped to Britain as part of a perfectly legal transaction with a friendly western power.

Hour To Feature
2 Young Sisters**

This Sunday night will be "Children's Night" at the Outdoor Gospel hour, with the Westerlund girls from Eugene providing the special musical talent. Le Ann and Muriel Westerlund, ten and eleven years old, respectively, will sing and play duets on the piano and the vibraphone. Both girls have been singing and playing for about seven years. At present their musical training includes music theory and the study of harmony.

Le Ann, who is now ten years old, started to play the piano when she was two and a half years old. When she had reached the age of three, it was discovered that she possessed absolute pitch. In addition, Le Ann has begun what may become a career of composing, with the composition of her first song entitled, "My Testimony."

This 7 week's drive-in church service, which begins at 7:30 p. m., is planned with special emphasis upon children and young people. Every boy and girl twelve years of age attending the service will receive an autographed photograph of the Westerlund girls. The message, to be delivered by the Rev. Clark Robb, pastor of the North Roseburg church, will be entitled "Child-Like Faith."

**Soviet's Stooges Label
Truman Pseudo-Christian**

LONDON — (P) — The Moscow radio reported today that Russian Baptist leaders, in a protest to the United Nations Security council over American action in Korea, had labeled President Truman a "pseudo-Christian."

The Baptists called for support of Russia's Aug. 4 proposal to the council that foreign troops be recalled from Korea. Two similar appeals, also heard over Moscow radio, were made by the Albanian government and the head of the Armenian church.

**American Fur Farmers
Protest Soviet Imports**

PORTLAND — (P) — Fur farmers demanded yesterday that the U. S. stop Russian furs from coming into this country.

The national board of Fur Farm organizations, meeting here, said the imports were harming American fur growers and sending dollars to Russians, enabling them "to carry on their subversive activities."

The board also advocated labeling laws to let a buyer know what he is purchasing.

**Paralyzed Student To
Get Expert Attention**

REDMOND — (P) — Pete Satterlee, paralyzed since he suffered a fractured neck in a swimming accident last May, has gone to Portland's Good Samaritan hospital.

The 18-year-old Redmond high graduate, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Satterlee, entered the physical therapy department for treatment. Arrangements were made by Dr. Robert L. Unger through the University of Oregon Medical school, crippled children's division. Satterlee will be under the care of Dr. Arthur C. Jones, specialist in rehabilitation of the physically handicapped.

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**Teachers Back U.N. In
Korea, Rap Loyalty Oath**

DETROIT — (P) — The AFL's American Federation of Teachers supports the United Nations' South Korean fight and opposes teacher loyalty oaths.

Resolutions expressing the views were adopted at the association's annual convention here. The organization claims a membership of 65,000 teachers.

The convention held that there was "no good reason" to suspect the loyalty and patriotism of the "vast majority of American teachers."

"The record," it added, "proves that the taking of an oath cannot build the spirit of true loyalty to America nor serve to detect those whose loyalty lies elsewhere."

Such oaths, it was added, "seriously interfere with effective teaching, especially of vital, controversial subjects."

**Good Behavior Frees
19 Nazis From Prison**

LANDSBERG, Germany — (P) — Friedrich Flick, Hitler-era steel tycoon, and 18 other convicted Nazi war criminals scurried out of prison today — freed for good behavior.

The 69-year-old Flick, whose wartime steel empire employed 130,000 persons, was convicted by an American military court in Nuernberg Dec. 22, 1947, on charges of exploiting Russian slave labor and looting the German-occupied countries. The 2½ years he already had been in prison were deducted from his 7-year sentence.

Captures 16 N. Koreans

SEATTLE — (P) — A Seattle corporate man lying wounded in a Japanese hospital, admitted to his mother in a trans-Pacific telephone call yesterday that he single-handedly captured 16 North Koreans last month.

But Cpl. William F. Cogerty, 20, was surprised to find that his mother, Mrs. Virginia Cogerty, already knew of the incident.

**Arthur V. Buffington
Of Myrtle Creek Dies**

Arthur Vance Buffington 88, well-known resident of Myrtle Creek, died this morning following a long period of ill health. Mr. Buffington was born March 11, 1862, at Corvallis, Oregon. He spent his entire life engaged in ranching in eastern Oregon and at Myrtle Creek.

Mr. Buffington is survived by three sisters: Mrs. Clara Graham, Mrs. Affa Morrow and Mrs. Rusha Brown, all of Albany, Oregon and a niece, Mrs. Katherine Fullerton, Roseburg.

The body has been removed to the Long & Orr mortuary and funeral arrangements will be announced later pending the arrival of relatives.

**Boy Stabs Strange Girl
To Death 'On Impulse'**

KANSAS CITY — (P) — Police held a 14-year-old boy today who admitted he stabbed to death "on impulse" a girl his own age.

Pretty 14-year-old Kathryn Pieper and a girl companion, Frances Dee Day, were pushing their bicycles up a lonely path returning from an afternoon outing.

The boy, Thomas David Hart, told police he hid in some bushes beside the path when he saw the girls, then leaped from his hiding place and plunged a butcher knife 13 times into the Pieper girl's body.

The boy said he had no motive for the slaying and did not know the girl.

**School Aid Boost Bill
OK'd By Roseburg Board**

The Roseburg school board Monday adopted a resolution endorsing the basic school support fund law, better known as the "children's bill" as a possible means of providing relief from local property taxes.

Residents of Oregon will vote at the coming general election, Nov. 7, on passage of the bill, which seeks to increase state school aid per census child.

The board's action was made in response to a letter from a statewide committee sponsoring the bill in the state legislature, which asked the board to give its approval and endorsement of the bill.

**\$1 Million Hotel To
Rise Near Spokane**

SPOKANE — (P) — Plans for a hotel costing more than \$1,000,000 to be built along the western highway approach to Spokane were disclosed here.

It will be operated by a new corporation now being organized, including the Desert Hotel interests and Ward J. Walker as stockholders.

The Dessert company, headed by Mrs. Victor Dessert, now operates one of Spokane's main downtown hotels. The site chosen for the new structure is in a scenic location about one-half mile west of the city limits.

Old pioneer memories will be depicted at 10 a. m. Sunday when Scottsburg begins its centennial celebration with a parade through town.

During the day relics and keepsakes of bygone days will be displayed at various places throughout the town.

Around noon a potluck lunch will be served with coffee furnished by the Scottsburg grange. A formerly-announced salmon bake has been taken off the program.

The State Highway commission has furnished an historical marker which will be dedicated during the afternoon.

Speakers for the program include Stephen Fowler Chadwick, Seattle. He is the grandson of Stephen F. Chadwick, Oregon's fifth governor and Scottsburg's first postmaster.

Emma Hedden, granddaughter of a Scottsburg pioneer, Cyrus Hedden, is in charge of arrangements for the centennial.
