

Changes To Greet Incoming Students As Schools Readied

Boundaries Of City's Four School Districts Given

A schedule of boundaries for each of the city's four elementary schools was released today by School Supt. Paul S. Elliott, as an aid to parents wishing to know in which school their children will register.

Youngsters in grades 1-6, living within the various boundaries, will report for registration Sept. 5 at the following schools; changes necessary to adjust the teaching loads will be made on registration day.

ROSE — All south of Washington street to the river, with the exception of first, second and third grade pupils living between the river and the railroad tracks, who will report to Fullerton.

FULLERTON — The first three grades mentioned above, plus all youngsters living west of the river, including Umpqua park.

BENSON — All students north of Douglas street and east of reservoir hill and as far north as the Snack Shack. This excludes first, second and third grade pupils living between Winchester street and the highway, who will report to Riverside school.

RIVERSIDE — All north of the Snack Shack on both sides of the highway, including Calkins road.

First graders are reminded that they must produce their birth certificates at the time of registration. Physical examination reports must also be shown registrars, if children were examined by private physicians and not at the recently-concluded physical examination clinics conducted by the school system.

A daily vacation church school will run at St. George's next week every day from 9 to 12 and will be under the direction of Gordon.

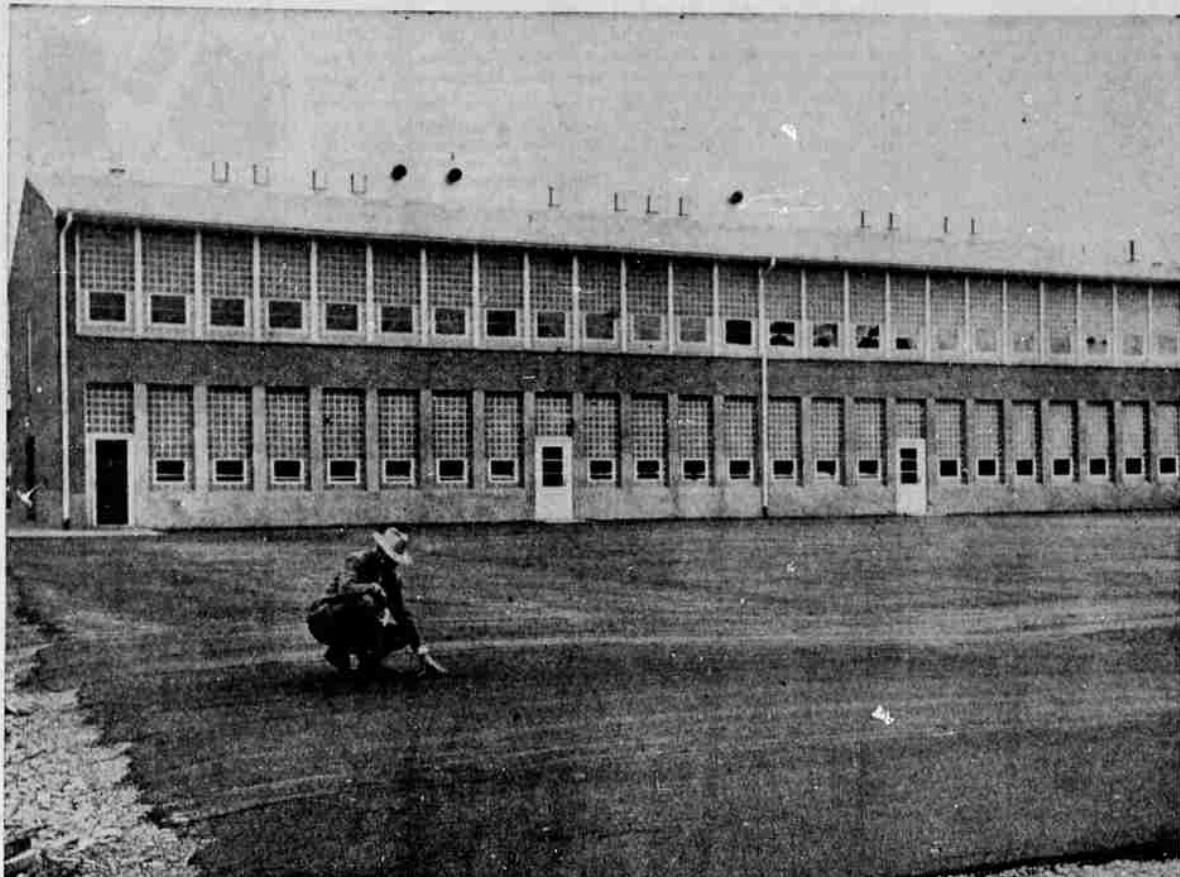

Alice Matthews died intestate April 1, 1945, at the age of 83 years, leaving real property valued at approximately \$10,000.

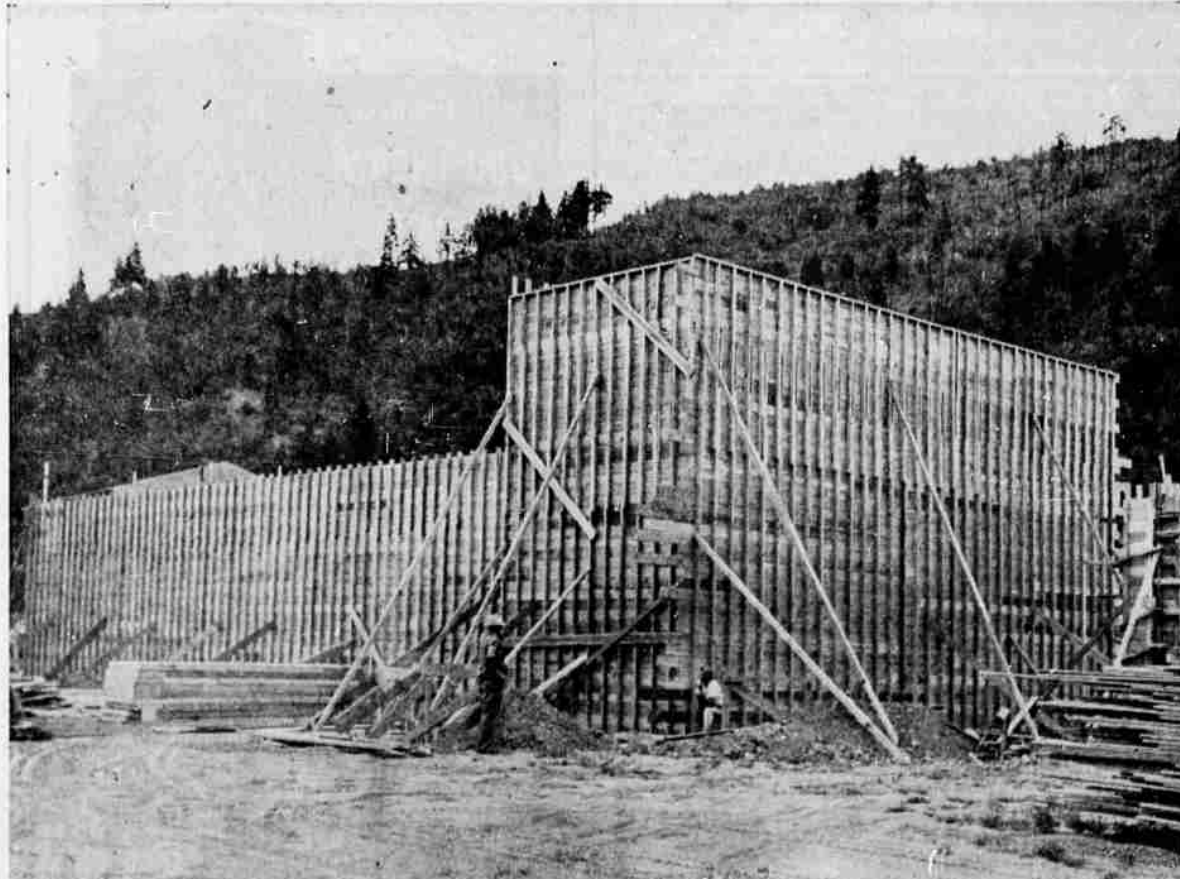
Also appointed in the order were appraisers Roy O. Young, W. I. Dixon and John Rohr.

City schools are expected to bulge with a record 3,000-3,100 pupils this year—the highest anticipated enrollment in the system's history and about 300 more than enrolled last year.
