

Seattle Wins Twin Bill From Beavers, 7-0, 7-6

It was another long night in the Pacific Coast league, but it produced such memorable occurrences as a marathon game broken up in the 15th inning with a two-run homer and another shutout by the masterful Jim Wilson.

The 15-inning affair took place at Hollywood, where the Stars battled give and take with the San Francisco Seals and finally won, 9 to 7. The hero of the piece was Murray Franklin. He stepped up there with a mate on base in the bottom of the 15th and parked a 3 and 1 pitch out of the park to sew it up for the Stars.

San Francisco had tied the thing up at 4-4 in the ninth, then went ahead with a three-run 14th capped by Jim Moran's inside the park round tripper with one aboard. But Hollywood bounced back in the home half to tie it up again.

Wilson's shutout came in the second game of a doubleheader at Portland. He chucked a two-hitter

in the seven-inning affair and gave Seattle a 7 to 0 triumph over the Beavers. The Rainiers also took the opener, 7 to 6, on center fielder Al Lyons' ninth-inning home run with Walt Judnich aboard.

The shutout was Wilson's 21st conquest of the campaign.

Oakland, meanwhile, succumbed again to lowly Los Angeles, 5 to 3. It was a tight pitcher's battle until the late going, with Ralph Hammer, the Angel starter holding the heavy hitting Acorns in check until the ninth.

At Sacramento, San Diego's infield fell asleep in the fourth inning, committed three errors and allowed seven Sacramento runs to pass. The last place Solons won the thing, 13 to 5, with Steve Souchock hitting his 25th homer of the year to spark a 15-hit assault.

In that fatal fourth, Bobby Wilson miscued twice at second base, and third sacker Harvey Storey booted another. In between, Johnny Lucadello cleaned the bags with a three-run triple in behalf of the Sacs, but none of the seven runs was earned.

More than 5,000 spectators and 2,000 Indians were on hand for the initial activities.

While Webster was moving into the ranks of early leaders, two other former champions bumped into trouble. Two-time winner Ike Rude of Buffalo, Okla., lost his first steer completely. Gene Rambo of Shandon, Calif., presently leading the national all-around cowboy parade, was dumped by a horse named Pretty Boy and then needed 41.8 seconds to wrestle a stubborn steer in the bulldogging event.

Two persons were injured. Lee Pennell of Prescott, Wash., received a broken foot when a horse, Broadway Bill, fell on him during the amateur northwest bucking contest. Rich Thompson, Athena, Ore., rancher and a hater in the contest, was knocked from his horse by a plunging bronco and suffered a broken pelvis when his horse fell on him.
