U.S. May Become Aggressor Nation, Navy Head Says

BOSTON (AP)—Navy Secretary Matthews says the United States may be forced to alter its policy of never drawing the sword unless first attacked.

He said that this country should proclaim its willingness to start a war, if necessary, "to compel cooperation for peace."

Speaking at the 150th anniversary celebration of the Boston naval shipyard last night, Matthews said the nation should get ready to ward off any possible attack and should boldly proclaim "our undeniable objective to be world peace."

"To have peace," he said, "we should be willing, and declare an intention to pay, any price, even the price of instituting a war to compel cooperation."

He said that self preservation in the present world can be purchased only by those capable of resisting successfully a violation of their rights.

"Only the forces who do not want peace would oppose our efforts to transform the hostile nations embroiled in the present international conflicts into a tranquil world," he said. "We could accept that slander with complacency, for in the implementation of a strong, affirmative, peace-seeking policy, though it cast us in character new to democracy—an initiator of a war of aggression—it would win for us a proud and popular title—we would become the first aggressors for peace."

"It is a role which, in my opinion, we cannot escape."

He said "it is a cause to which we shall be compelled to dedicate our total and ultimate resources. From no other course can there be effected the salvation of the free world."

Truman Soon To Ask War Fund Boost, House Told

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Mahon (D-Tex.) told the House Friday that the President soon may ask Congress for another \$10,000,000 to boost this year's military budget to around \$35,000,000.

Mahon, a member of the appropriations committee, gave the forecast during discussion of an emergency bill which the Defense department's share is approximately \$11,000,000,000.

This is exclusive of \$13,294,299,445 for defense in the compromise general appropriation bill passed earlier today by the House.

Even \$35,000,000,000 will be inadequate if a global war breaks out within the next two years, Mahon said.

Father, Son Saved From Overturned Sports Boat

ASTORIA (AP)—A Portland father and his 12-year-old son were rescued by the coast guard Thursday from their overturned outboard sports fishing boat.

The boat was pinned in a fast-ebbing tide against a double row of piling on the Columbia river's Chinook jetty spur.

Coastguardman J. C. Cathers said he believed the two, battered and exhausted, would have drowned in another five minutes.

The man was identified as Donald Kainsun. His son's name was not learned.

Cathers warned that the fast ebb of the Columbia is dangerous and "a lot faster than it looks."

Maj. Gen. Dean Believed Dead Of Battle Wounds

TOKYO (AP)—There is a conviction among some South Koreans that Maj. Gen. William F. Dean, missing ex-commander of the U. S. 24th division, died of battle wounds and was buried by friendly South Koreans.

There is no official confirmation that General Dean is dead. He is still listed by headquarters as missing in action since July 22 in the battle of Taejon.

An unconfirmed story circulating among South Koreans, which I heard repeatedly before returning recently from Korea to Tokyo, ran like this:

The general was wounded after escaping from flaming Taejon. A South Korean family gave him shelter and tried to nurse him back to health. But he died and was buried by his friends. They said nothing about it for fear of punishment by North Korean Reds who occupy the area.

It was felt that if the North Koreans had captured the general, they would have boasted about it over their Pyongyang radio, as they have boasted of the capture of many Americans of lesser rank. Stories published in Tokyo said unidentified prisoners reported North Korean Reds shot Dean and then staked him to death. But official sources at General MacArthur's headquarters disclaimed knowledge of such reports.

All that is known as reasonably certain is that General Dean escaped from Taejon unwounded. He left a party of his men on the hills outside Taejon to round up stragglers and lead them back to American lines. He has not been heard from since.

Sign Loyalty Oath Or Get Out, Edict To Professors

BERKELEY (AP)—Regents of the University of California voted Friday to enforce their loyalty oath requirements with a new "sign up or get out" notice to recalcitrant faculty members.

The regents voted 12 to 10 to require 31 faculty members who have not yet signed the oath to do so within 10 days or resign their positions.

The vote was an about face for the regents, who last month accepted an O.K. for the professors from the faculty screening committee which had investigated the ones reluctant to sign the oath and found them loyal.

The new vote likewise disregarded the recommendation of President Robert Gordon Sproul that the 31 be rehired.

Crackdown On Gambling Begins In Coos County

COQUILLE (AP)—Coos county's experiment with "common sense" gambling has failed, Sheriff William F. Howell said.

He began calling known operators of games of chance, telling them to close up shop or be arrested. Failure to do so will mean arrest, the sheriff said. The county's anti-gambling laws will be enforced to the letter, he told them.

Although laws prohibit gambling, peace officers decided on the "common sense" attitude just so as no one "got hurt," said James A. Norman, district attorney. The idea worked satisfactorily for a time, he said, but abuses soon appeared.

Accidental Shell Kills 8 Koreans In Night Sneak

ON THE SOUTHERN FRONT IN KOREA—(AP)—A line company of the army's 35th regiment Friday night cutt-out an American artillery outfit.

But this morning things were different.

The artillery unit dropped a shell apparently by accident within 150 feet of the 35th outfit's position. The infantrymen didn't like it at all and expressed their thoughts in blunt, even profane, terms.

They apologized at daylight. The round fell among eight North Koreans who had been sneaking up to toss a hand grenade into the position.

All eight were killed.

City Court Frees Jurist After Rap For Contempt

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—Judge Norval K. Harris of Sullivan fared better in municipal court Friday than he did before the Indiana supreme court in June. He won acquittal on an intoxication charge.

The Sullivan county circuit court judge was arrested on the public intoxication charge on the state-house steps last May 13.

Judge Harris said he was waiting to see some friends. "I was as sober as I am now," he told Municipal Judge Joseph M. Howard. He recently served 53 days at the Indiana state farm for indirect contempt of the supreme court.

Timber Lands Reappraised For New Tax Standard

tion to distance from rivers and railroads.

Thus a tract of timber that is of fine quality and easily accessible by road today might have a comparatively low tax. On the other hand, a tract of much poorer timber might be taxed unfairly high. Within each of the present zones the timber of different ownership is taxed at the same rate without regard to quality or other factors presently important to value.

Timber Deteriorates

Another inequality in taxation is due to the changes that have taken place in the quality and amount of timber since the original cruise. Much timber that was marketable 30 years ago is now overmature and defective. Other lands originally classified as without timber may be very productive.

A case in point is one tract described in the original cruise as having no timber. The reappraisal cruise showed the holding has 9,000,000 feet of good timber.

With these inconsistencies in mind, the county established the forest appraisal department. At the first of this fiscal year the original \$40,000 allotment was upped to \$45,000, marking the beginning of the second year one of the county's newest and most important operations.

The actual operation of the forest appraisal will appear in the second installment tomorrow.

First grade pupils must have birth certificates showing they are or will be six years old on or before Nov. 15.

Dr. Helsey will examine the children for health certificates. The Riddle school opens Sept. 11.

U. S. SEEKS WASP

BANGKOK (AP)—The United States department of Agriculture has started a one-year investigation of fruit flies and their enemies in Siam in the hopes it will find a Siamese wasp to defeat a plague of fruit flies in Hawaii.

The Hawaiian fruit fly is believed to have started during the war with the introduction of some infested fruit. Insecticides have failed to eradicate it.

All-Out Preparedness Needed To Ban Calamity Of 3rd World War

One of the questions most often shot at me by readers is whether there is any hope of an early end to the "cold war."

Professional observers generally take a dim view of anything like an early termination of the conflict. Even those who don't regard another world war as inevitable, believe the "cold war" will continue for a long time.

Whether the "Cold War" will develop eventually into a "hot war" will depend on the degree of military preparedness achieved and maintained by the democracies. Sound military preparedness presupposes sound economic conditions, and upon them depends the type of "peace" which we can have.

However, military preparedness and economic strength won't halt the cold war, for that is the weapon upon which Moscow depends to further the spread of communism.

The phrase "cold war" is merely another term for the "world revolution" which the Bolshevik government decreed upon its establishment a generation ago.

That ideological crusade is as unchangeable as the rising of the sun.

In many respects the unceasing grind of this cold war is more wearing on the nerves than would be a shooting war. The spying, the bickering, the devilish and costly schemes like the Berlin blockade—all these things are meant to be, and actually are, tough on morale and tempers.

Follows Lenin-Stalin Plan

Still, this is the way Lenin and Stalin originally laid it down that communism was to be spread into all lands. It is extremely foolish to listen to arguments and halt an ideological offensive which has brought vast returns thus far.

What we've got to get firmly fixed in our minds is the fact that the whole world is in an ideological upheaval.

It's something which has been developing for generations—and it may take generations to iron it out completely. The Communist assault is only one aspect of this change, although it is the most extreme.

The task is to keep this at times violent "cold war" from developing into something which might set progress back for generations. One of the brightest spots in this grim picture is the manner in which the United Nations has emerged in leadership through its handling of the Korean crisis.

This peace organization seems suddenly to have found its feet. I like the line used by Director General Trygve Lie in a recent speech. Said he bluntly:

PORTLAND (AP)—A 7½-mile timber access road will serve as a perimeter route for the Detroit reservoir when the dam is completed, the corps of engineers reported in setting its call for bids.

Construction of the dam on the North Santiam river has cut off some timber holdings. Col. Donald S. Burns, district engineer, said, the proposed road will start at Blowout creek some 3½ miles southwest of Detroit and connect with the North Santiam highway near Idanha.

Bids will be called about Sept. 1, he said. The job is to be completed in 380 days.
