

Harvester Plants Tied By Strikes

CHICAGO — (AP) — Nearly 50,000 workers at 19 International Harvester company plants throughout the country were on strike today.

The farm equipment division of the United Electrical Workers (IUE) Sunday ordered its 27,000 members on strike in 11 plants.

The strike call brought the big implement manufacturing firm's operations to a standstill. Eight other harvester plants have been shut down since Thursday by a strike called by the CIO United Auto Workers, who represent 22,000 workers.

Announcing the FEUE strike after a mass meeting Sunday, Gerald Fielde, director of the union's harvester council, termed the company's withdrawal from a tentative contract agreement last week "the most brazen double cross in modern labor history."

He said the company's action was an attempt to impose a "wage freeze at the time of its greatest profits in history."

W. J. Reilly, Harvester's labor relations manager, said "the company has been and is willing to make very substantial wage increases for employees."

Fielde said the union now will settle for nothing less than a 13-cent general hourly wage increase.

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Albany Woman Killed In Plunge Of Auto

CORVALLIS — (AP) — Mrs. E. S. Kennell, about 65, of route 4, Albany, died in a local hospital Sunday night following a traffic accident late Sunday afternoon on highway 20 at the east edge of Philomath.

Her husband was seriously injured and Miss Daisy Buckner, 58, Albany, was less seriously hurt. Kennell's condition was listed today as "fair."

Philomath Police Chief Orval Pettengill said a car driven by Albert Lacey, 62, also of Albany was passing the Kennell car and forced it off the road when Lacey had to cut in suddenly to avoid an oncoming vehicle.

The Kennell car plunged into a deep ditch on the right side and crashed head-on into a 30-inch culvert under a driveway.

James Houston Mann, 96, Dies After Long Illness

James Houston Mann, 96, well known resident of Douglas county, died early today at the Roseburg sanitarium, following a prolonged illness.

He was born March 29, 1854, Macon, Ga., and was married in Kansas to Florence Woodard about 60 years ago. Murder, Suicide Take His Parents, Boy Says

UNIONTOWN, Pa. — (AP) — State police said a seven-year-old boy told them his coal miner father shot his mother to death after telling her "I've got something for you."

The coal miner, Chester Cole, 36, then turned the shotgun on himself, state police said.

Cole and his wife, Helen, also 36, had returned from a picnic shortly before the shooting yesterday. Seven-year-old Bobby was the only one of their four children home at the time.

Centennial Celebration Draws Hundreds To Historic Scottsburg



100 YEARS OLD—Crowds jammed Scottsburg Sunday to help pioneer descendants celebrate the community's centennial celebration. Early history of the 100-year-old town was recounted by several speakers during the two-hour afternoon program. Former residents of Scottsburg journeyed from as far away as Seattle and Los Angeles for their home town's birthday party, swelling the little community's population to an estimated 13,000 persons. Murphy and Emma Hedden, co-chairmen for the celebration, are shown in photo at upper left, cutting two of the mammoth birthday cakes contributed for the occasion. Only casualty of the morning's parade was the covered wagon in photo second from left. Miss Emma Hedden, in photo third from left, was busy Sunday directing the day's entire activities. Known throughout Douglas county as Scottsburg's postmistress, Miss Hedden is the granddaughter of Cyrus Hedden, one of Scottsburg's earliest residents, and now runs the general merchandise store her grandfather founded 99 years ago. Packard Strike Settled On Basis Of GM Formula

DETROIT — (AP) — Another important automobile producer—Packard—got into step with the industry's developing higher wage structure today.

Packard, giving terms following the General Motors "formula," boosted its pay nine cents an hour to settle the 13-day-old strike of its 8,000 workers.

The CIO union and Packard agreed to a five-year contract which follows almost to the letter the historic pact entered into earlier this year by General Motors and the UAW.

The settlement, following hard on Chrysler's \$25,000,000 annual pay boost of last week, shaped more clearly the general pay picture for the big auto industry.

Only Ford among the industry's "Big Three"—Ford, Chrysler and GM—remains outside this picture.

Ford's contract with the UAW does not expire until Jan. 1. It is assumed now without dispute that the union will press now throughout the industry for wage deals like that of GM, Chrysler and Packard.

The cost to Packard was not officially estimated. However, on the basis of a full work year, it would approximate \$1,500,000 annually.

Packard also granted pensions of \$100 to \$125 monthly, including social security, and an expanded insurance plan along with liberalized vacations and other benefits.

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New Methods Of Mapping County Forests Cheaper

may be determined. It is comparable to the methods employed by our armed forces to map large areas rapidly, accurately and at low cost. With this base map and the photos the cruisers go to work, planning and expediting the operation with these tools. From the cruising reports the timber volumes and other information are compiled and put on record forms for the Assessor.

Reference Value High

A by-product that will more than pay the cost of the photographing is a detailed base and forest cover map. When completed, it will be the most accurate, controlled map of its type in the state. It will show roads, clearings, timbered areas, logged areas, types of forest cover, and man-made features as they appeared when the areas were photographed. This map will be used by the county assessor's office as well as other county departments, and, according to Kleiner, made available to the public for a nominal charge.

The cost of the project is further minimized by the employment of a small, but highly organized staff of nine persons. Under Kleiner, who performs much of the field work, is William W. Knapp, head cruiser, and cruisers Earl T. Clark, Herbert B. Smith and Gene E. Johnson. Mapping engineers are E. E. Givens, Jack P. Bathrick and George E. Lipp. Miss Rosalind Randall fills out the staff as typist and stenographer.

The project will be one of from five to seven years duration and will produce a complete map of the entire country except the solid block of national forest on the

east. Actually this just the first—but most difficult—phase because of the continually changing timber picture. This initial phase will terminate with statistics on every acre of county and private land, with information as easily accessible as the nearest index. Most important it will provide means for equitable taxation of all types of forest properties in the county. Thus tax values will be based on a recent inventory which included all the important factors governing forest values.

Death Ends Police Chase With Fast Automobile

NEWPORT, Ore. — (AP) — Aimless gunfire and a fast auto race with police through the business district here Sunday ended in death for a Seattle man and injury for a Portland companion.

State Police Sgt. W. J. Mulkey said the two men had fired shots into the air from a pistol while in front of the Abbey hotel on the Yaquina bay waterfront. Police gave chase — at 80 miles an hour — through the business district along highway 101, just north of the city, the "souped up" 1927 hupmobile went out of control and crashed into a roadside cafe.

Killed outright was James Wright, 22, of Seattle. In the Toledo hospital with head injuries is Peter Francis Rawlinson, 23, Portland.

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
