

Central Point Defeats Chiefs, Cinches Crown

Single run games seem to be the trademark of the Umpqua Chiefs and the Central Point Stars because they played another Sunday afternoon which the Stars took by a score of 1-0. This cinches the Southern Oregon Baseball league title for Central Point.

This was the second game won by that identical score this season between the two clubs and the third in two years. Sunday's game was not quite so spectacular as the one the Chiefs won a short time ago, but it was just as tightly played.

The Stars rapped up their only run early in the game. It was the second inning when left fielder Norm Lucich cracked a single to left and was sacrificed to second by Frank Roelandt. Then Clarence Melby got the most timely hit of the game—a double which hit the earned run that won the game. From then on it was topgolfing for both teams. Pitchers Bus Sporer and Paul Gehrman were almost extinct. The Central Point-

ers collected one more hit—A single by George Gitzen and that was all.

The Chiefs got half their hits in the first inning, but not when they counted. Lovell Baker, who also got half the teams' hits, slapped a single. He was cut off at second, however, on a fielder's choice. It was lucky for the Stars that pitcher Gehrman nipped him with the throw to second because George Sanders poked a single too that could have allowed Baker to score.

Right fielder Norvall Ritchey got a double for the longest Chief hit of the game. He died on base as the next two men grounded out.

The worst break of the game took place in the eighth inning. George Sanders had been walking with two men out. He decided to try a steal to second but Stud chipped Roelandt saw the play and whipped the ball to second. It got away from second baseman Don Fawcett. Sanders rounded second and lost his footing when he decided he couldn't make third. In

Aussie Tennis Stars Take Davis Cup From U.S. Team

FOREST HILLS, N. Y. —(AP)—The United States had held the Davis cup since 1939 but the Australians, unimpressed with power as in the case of most youth, won it back over the weekend.

And today, the Aussies began their quest for a double—the American national championship, which has been in this country since 1926. That year, Fred Perry of England beat Don Budge in the final for his third title in four years.

The Australians could do it, too. They have a better chance of winning the singles than they had of taking the cup which they grabbed in three straight matches. Yesterday's final two singles were anti-climactic. Frank Sedgman won from Ted Schroeder, 6-2, 6-2, 6-2, and Tom Brown salvaged something for the home cause by licking Ken McGregor, 9-11, 8-10, 11-9, 6-4, 6-4.

Schroeder, making his farewell in cup competition, was far below his best. He looked as though he wanted to get it over as fast as possible. But Brown played as though the entire outcome of the cup hinged on the match.

Brown dropped the first two sets to McGregor more because of poor strategy than anything else. He insisted on trying to handle the young Aussie's service from inside the baseline, a virtually impossible task. In the final three sets he moved about five feet outside the baseline and that spelled McGregor's doom.

With Budge Patty, Wimbledon winner, having defaulted because of an injured ankle, McGregor or Sedgman loom as the likely favorites to take the singles title. Our best, according to the form chart, is young Herbie Flam, national clay courts ruler. He was seeded No. 2 in the domestic draw behind Patty. Now he automatically takes over the No. 1 spot.

However, on the basis of his performance against McGregor, Brown, who was a star back in 1947, stands the best chance of getting over the hurdles thrown up by the foreign players.

Among the women, Mrs. Margaret Osborne DuPont, winner for the past two years, will have to get past such worthies as Louise Brough, Pat Canning Todd and Shirley Fry.

Silvers Performs Wrestling Magic, Troupes O'Reilly

Wrestling fans were treated to one of the best grappling shows seen in these parts Saturday night as one of the world's greatest fundamental wrestlers, "Rufly" Silvers, trimmed Jack O'Reilly easily in two straight falls.

It was a cat and mouse game as O'Reilly—no mean grunt and growler himself—fought a largely defensive battle as he realized the tremendous record the Chicago visitor had piled up behind him.

This record is 300 matches with only one defeat—a disputed decision. He was undefeated in college, AAU, NCAA and Olympic wrestling. Until recently he has been wrestling coach at the University of Illinois, his old alma mater. It has been said that even Jim Londis, while he was lashed as one of the greatest, wouldn't tangle with the 200-pound behemoth. An interesting sidelight to his career is the fact that he was riding in the jeep with Ernie Pyle when the latter was killed on Iwo Jima.

The muscular Chicagoan came pouncing into the ring like a playful bulldog and, after teasing out his opponent, put on such a show of fancy footwork and race holds as to make the fans sit up and take notice. He moved extremely fast and took the first fall with a reverse surfbord. Then he cinched the match with his favorite—the standing backbreaker, a hold never before seen in the local armory.

After Silvers disposed of O'Reilly he issued an open challenge to "the man who thinks he's pretty tough around these parts, Leo Walsh."

Jack Kiser picked up his second decision in as many weeks over Ace Abbott by reason of the un-sportsmanlike behavior of the Texan as cowboy in the preliminary. The crowd was on its feet screaming continuously for Kiser in the match that almost reached the point of barroom brawling, but the younger man lost the match by way of the regular fall methods.

Kiser took the first with a series of flying drop kicks and a body press. Then Abbott came back with vim to take the second with a reverse headlock and the third with him into submission with some spectacular flying drop kicks in the third fall but he missed one and got his legs caught in the ropes, falling to the mat and hurting his neck. After Abbott had been awarded the fall, Referee Elton Owen began working on Kiser's neck and Abbott loosed a kick in the direction of his prostrate opponent. For this Owen reversed his decision.

Arcaro Rides Winner At Longacres Track

SEATTLE —(AP)—The team of Eddie Arcaro and Two and Twenty won the horse, "Arcaro" said yesterday and the famous jockey said he knew the race was his when he hit the first turn.

"I knew then I was riding an awful lot of horse," Arcaro said. He booted the tall chestnut speedster across the line a length and a half in front of Whang Bang, stablemate of Two and Twenty. The two speedsters, running as an entry, paid \$440, 4.20 and \$3.50 in the mutuels. Roseaw was third and returned Backers \$5.60.

Three prominent jockeys were in saddles for the 13th running of the mile, which was worth a gross of \$12,700 with \$9,550 for the winner. Arcaro and Gordon Glisson flew here from Chicago and Noel Richardson came in from Denver. The latter rode Amble In, which he piloted to victory twice in the mile but which had none of the old speed yesterday.

PORTLAND —(AP)—The Big City All-Stars collected on a safety and then rammed across a touchdown in the third quarter Saturday night to defeat an Upstate team, 8 to 0, in the third annual Shrine Hospital benefit gridiron game.

Coach Ted Ogdahl's Portlanders held the Staters to their own territory through the first half and then, after an automatic safety two points, powerhouse to the touchdown.

Portland quarterback Dale Brethauer of Jefferson got off a 56 yard quick kick to the State 16 to set up the safety. Jack Morris of Medford was down in his tracks on the attempt to carry. After working out to the 23, a 15-yard holding penalty forced Morris to kick. Big Jim Roberts of Roosevelt powered through the state line to block the kick and it bounded into the end zone for the safety.

State kicked from its 20 and Portland's Don Foreman of Lincoln took off for a 25-yard run to the state 46. The city team was on its way to the touchdown.

Brethauer's pass to Duane Siebert of Grant was good for a first down. Another to Dwane Helbit of Roosevelt was good for 10 yards. Then Siebert plunged for three to the 22 and Brethauer smashed the line to the 16. Next Ed Wenn of Washington banged over for a one-yard advance.

Then after a temporary setback, Brethauer gained nine to the four. Fullback Al Hansen of Grant plunged to the one and Foreman raced around left end for the touchdown.

Don Ford missed the kick for the extra point but it was of no importance and the city team once again had blanked the Staters.

Marshfield's Barney Holland and Eugene's Don Siegmund staged a fourth quarter running spree but it bogged down on their own 46. Roosevelt's Claret Taylor recovered to a State passing fumble soon afterward and Portland took possession on the State 26.

Red Sox Looming Bigger As American Loop Threat

Credit Boston's bounce-back into flag contention to the re-discovery of the long lost "secret weapon"—coming from behind.

Overcoming enemy leads—something that was a lost art to the Red Sox earlier this year—plus a two week stay at friendly Fenway park have combined to rekindle the pennant spark in the hearts of loyal Boston rooters.

Currently the hottest club in baseball, the Red Sox have been catching up with the league leaders at a furious pace. Twelve victories in the last 13 games have helped Boston cut a once seemingly insurmountable eight-game deficit in half.

The Red Sox picked up a half-game on the league leaders yesterday when they overcame a 7-0 Cleveland lead to defeat the Indians, 11-9, while the Philadelphia Athletics were holding the Tigers even in two games. The A's won the opener, 4-3, and Detroit won the second 8-1.

The Sox triumph helped the New York Yankees gain undisputed possession of second place.

The defending champions eked out a 2-1 victory in 10 innings over the Chicago White Sox to cut Detroit's first place margin to one game. Cleveland trails by two.

The Indians appeared to have the game safely stowed away when 12 men came to bat in the third against Starter Willard Nixon and Jim McDonald and seven of them scored. The Red Sox, however, re-

fused to be counted out. They came storming back with five runs in their own half of the third to blast Bob Feller off the hill and six more in the seventh.

Tommy Henrich hit a pinch single with one out and the bases loaded in the 20th inning to win for the Yankees. Allie Reynolds yielded two hits for the victors to register his 12th victory. Bob Cain was the loser.

Sam Chapman's 22nd home run with a mate aboard in the eighth inning spoiled young Ray Herbert's major league debut as the A's came from behind to defeat the Tigers in the first game. Art Houtteman notched his 17th triumph in the second.

Washington and St. Louis split a doubleheader. After Joe Haynes had pitched the Nats to an 8-0 first game win in the opener, The Browns won the second game, 11-10.

Philadelphia's Phillies increased their national league lead to five games over Brooklyn, defeating the Chicago Cubs, 6-1, while the St. Louis Cardinals were battering the Dodgers, 13-3.

The Cubs battled the Phils to an 11-inning 4-4 tie in the second game of their doubleheader that was halted by darkness. The two teams were to play two games today.

New York's Giants and Cincinnati's Reds divided two games. The Giants won the opener, 11-6, and Don Mueller cracked out five hits. The Reds, behind the four-hit pitching of Howie Fox, won the second game, 3-1.

Champ's Champ Wins National Golfing Crown

MINNEAPOLIS —(AP)—Sammy Uzzetta, with his set of doctored up golf clubs bought from caddie money, is a champion's champion.

After the 24-year-old son of an immigrant janitor won the national amateur title Saturday, his opponent, Frank Stranahan voiced the opinion of all:

"Sam, you are a great golfer and a great champion."

Stranahan, who has won the British, Canadian, French and other amateur crowns but never has been able to nail the U. S. diadem in five attempts, was a champion loser.

He told the affable Uzzetta, the pride of Rochester, N. Y., that "of all the golfers I have played all over the world, both amateur and professional, you, Sammy, played the finest iron shots in our match that I have ever seen."

Uzzetta and the millionaire's son from Toledo, on Saturday battled 39 holes in the longest marathon in the 50-year history of the national amateur meet. Stranahan's drive went out of bounds and he eventually missed a 10 foot putt to take a 6 on the final hole.

Zetta's tee shot was in a trap, he was short on two but was on with his third for two putts and a winning par 5.

Uzzetta, was even par for the distance and Stranahan was one over. Frank was never up at any time, was outdriven on nearly every hole and was forced to make a half dozen pressure putts from 6 to 8 feet to halve holes. Four times he came from behind to square matters, but could never press ahead.

"I was really afraid it was all over on the 36th," said Uzzetta, who came up to the scheduled last hole all even. "That flubbed chip shot off the green went only three feet—it was the straightest wedge shot I hit all day."

Sammy was on in four, after miffing the shot, and holed a five foot putt for a one-over 5. Stranahan's chip was 12 feet long and he two putted for his halve. He misjudged the downslope of the green or would have a cinched a par for victory.

Arkansas Family Sweeps National Shooting Meet

VANDALIA, O. —(AP)—You may have your Daniel Boones, Annie Oakleys and Buffalo Bills.

If we want any shooting done, we'll call on the Pettys of Arkansas as we do for us.

Rudy Eichen of Bellevue, Wash., also broke 980 targets out of 1,000 to set a new week-long mark for professionals.

There are four of the Pettys—Mr. and Mrs. Julius of Stuttgart, Ark. No family ever dominated the shooting scene as the three Petty boys and the Petty girl—she's that pretty—did the 51st grand American trapshoot completed Saturday.

Julius, 39, and Paul 37, won the brother-brother championship with 197 of 200 from 16 yards. Julius also won the all-around championship with 392 of 400 on 200 targets at 16 yards, 100 on handicaps and 100 doubles title.

His 99 of 100 in the grand American handicap was the best in 51 years from the 25-yard mark, the extreme handicap distance, but a 100 straight by Oscar Scheske of Belleville, Ill., from 19 yards ruined Julius' chance of winning trapshooting's biggest prize.

Oddly, Julius missed 14 of the "easy" 600 targets at 16 yards, but no one has ever approached his handicap and doubles record for the "roaring grand."

In the preliminary handicap, second largest shoot in the meet, petite Mrs. Petty broke 98 to lead the ladies, duplicating her feat of a year ago in the grand American.

Thus the four Pettys, in the toughest matches on the program, broke 1154 of 1200 targets for a handicap average of 96.16.
