Launched in 1945, the Juneau is named after the 6000-ton cruiser Juneau which was sunk by the Japanese in 1942 with loss of all but ten aboard, including the five Sullivan brothers of Waterloo, Ia.

Cottage Grove-Disston Railway To Be Extended

EUGENE — (P) — The Oregon Pacific and Eastern railroad, branch line of the Southern Pacific system, owned by the Booth-Kelly Lumber Co., is planning construction that will lengthen its track mileage 50 percent.

With its main terminal at Cottage Grove, the OP&E is a common carrier road running through the Row river country to Disston, a distance of about 20 miles. Last Saturday, Booth-Kelly engineers announced plans to construct a 10-mile branch up Mosby creek to tap new timber stands.

The Inter City Sand and Gravel company of Eugene was low among five firms bidding for the construction contract. Officials of the firm said the bid was approximately \$109,000.
