

Oregon's Fair Employment Practices Law Shows Good Results In Its First Year

SALEM — (AP) — Oregon's year-old fair employment practices law — which guarantees to every citizen that no employer or labor union can discriminate against him because of his race, religion or ancestry — already has shown big results.

This campaign against racial and religious prejudice has only started. Oregon was a pioneer, being the sixth state to have an FEPC law. The 1949 legislature passed the law, with only six of the 90 legislators voting against it. But even many of those who voted for it had deep misgivings about it. They feared that Communists might take advantage by promoting anti-Negro feeling, inciting Negroes to make fake complaints.

They feared that State Labor Commissioner W. E. Kimsey, who enforces the law, might be swamped with complaints.

These things didn't happen. In fact, in the year that the law has been in force, only 21 persons in the whole state complained they were discriminated against. Sixteen of these complained against employers, and five complained against labor unions.

Minister Aids Law
Kimsey is aided by an advisory committee, representing the various minorities, as well as agencies working toward breaking down prejudice.

Kimsey's administrator is William Van Meter, a 37-year-old Episcopalian clergyman. The committee makes the policy and sets up the educational program. Van Meter enforces the law on Kimsey's behalf, and carries out the committee's policy.

If an employer or labor union refuses to obey Kimsey, then he can go to court and get a circuit court injunction ordering the guilty employer or union to stop discriminating. If this order isn't obeyed, then a \$500 fine can be levied.

Actually, the enforcement part is the smallest part of the job. The big task is the educational program being carried on in civic organizations, schools, churches, political groups, and labor and employer organizations.

In Portland, discrimination against Negroes is the main problem. Upstate, where few Negroes live, the main problem is discrimination against Catholics and Jews. Of the 21 cases where discrimination has been charged, 19 of them involved Negroes. One involved a Jew, and the other a minister of a religious sect.

In addition to the specific cases investigated, there have been far wider results.

Negroes Gain New Hope
One positive result is the hope the law has given to Negroes. During the past year in Portland, 40 Negroes have been placed in jobs with firms that had refused to hire Negroes.

A big chain store in Portland has hired its first Negro. Negro young people now are interested in training themselves for jobs, because now they see a chance to get jobs. For instance, 64 percent of Portland's Negro high school students plan to go to college, compared with the 25 percent of the entire population which actually goes to college.

For instance, a man from New Mexico and of Spanish-American ancestry, was teaching in a country school. His school board said he was doing a fine job.

Ethiopian Province Rebels Against Selassie

CAIRO — (AP) — Ethiopia's largest and richest province is reported in revolt against the land taxes and rule of Emperor Haile Selassie.

An informed source reported that aroused peasants in Gojjam province of Northern Ethiopia had cut the throats of two wealthy district governors. Truckloads of government troops have been rushed to the province to quell the disturbances, which broke out late in July.

The peasants reportedly feel that health and education facilities in Gojjam are inadequate. The revolt was touched off by the arrest of some peasants and confiscations of their lands in an effort to collect delinquent land taxes.

The province, which formerly had its own dynasty of kings, has been inimical to the centralized government since it was established and the last king of Gojjam was deposed.

On his 58th birthday, last July 23, Haile Selassie remitted unpaid land taxes for the years 1942 to 1947.
