

BERLIN (.P)-Gerhart Eisler, BERLIN (AP)-Gerhart Eisler, rumored next on Moscow's our e list, shumed his government prop-aganda headquarters in East Ber-lin today as Soviet zone police blacked out the tate of six of his party comrades.

Despite decades of unswerving devotion to Soviet communism, both in Europe and the United States, Ellser belongs to the "west-ern emigrants" on whom Moscow has authorized a merciless attack. The purge was announced Friday by the East German politburo, now rigidly controlled by Deputy Prem-ier Ulbricht, who holds dual Soviet and German citizenship.

OAKLAND, Calif. -(P) - The Oakland Post-Enquirer, an after-roon Hearst daily newspaper with a tabloid Sunday edition, sus-pended publication Friday.The page-one discontinuance an-nouncement said:

"Management of the Oakland Post-Enquirer announces discon-tinuance of publication with this issue. Present costs make this de-cision necessary.

"The leading national and in-ternational news and photo serv-ices, comics and other features carried by the Post-Enquirer ap-pear in the San Francisco Exam-iner and the San Francisco Call-Bulletin."

More than 250 employes were thrown out of work.

The afternoon daily newspaper, with a Sunday tabloid dition, had a circulation of around 75,000. Th Enquirer was established in 1886, and the Post is 1917. They were combined 29 years ago.

Both ditorial and typographical mployes evidently had not inkling of th immediate suspension.
